

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Chairman's Report

The days are pulling out slowly! I have noticed activity in gardens and allotments all which point an arrow towards Spring !

Christmas seems a long time ago but I think it is safe to say that the “Carols Round the Tree” was very much enjoyed by all who attended. It was a really festive evening with the Salvation Army Band, School choir, Carols, delicious mince pies, and mulled wine - all with lights and warmth from the fire pit ! We were truly Round the Tree and I thank everyone who helped to make it a super event for the Christmas season.

Thank you to everyone who entered the consultation on the one way system proposed for Main Street and Brownlows Hill. There were under 50 responses which were fairly evenly split, with 59% in favour of a one way system and 41% against – this would not be a strong enough positive response from the residents of Coddington to convince Nottinghamshire Highways to change from the status quo. A much more important reason for not pursuing the proposal is that several farming businesses reported that they would be unable to access their fields given the direction of the one way system. Choosing a one way system in the opposite direction would require re-routing of the No. 1 bus, putting the viability of the bus service at risk as new bus shelters would cost around £30k.

The Parish Council will now consult with the residents of Post Office Row, who originally proposed the idea, to identify alternative solutions for them.

You will see from the poster in this CVN that preparations have begun for celebrating the Coronation of King Charles III ! Sunday 7th May - Coddington Primary School Playing Field and on Monday 8th the Church will be open with displays from the History group. Preparations are in their infancy but more posters will be circulated as we get nearer the date. So dust off your bunting and look forward to splendid events!

I hope you will all participate in the latest CIL money (Community Infrastructure Levy) survey – details are in this CVN.

The “Speed Watch teams” will be operating on Saturday mornings on the C208, Community Centre and on Balderton Lane.

There will be an unveiling of the new Village sign hopefully coordinated with All Saints Church Coddington on Mothering Sunday 19th March, keep a look out for timings!

As always, a warm welcome to all new residents of Coddington, whether permanent or temporary. The agendas for the monthly Parish Council meetings are published as always on the notice boards around the village and on the Village Website - the public is welcome to raise any issues/ contributions at the start of the meeting.

The Revd Louise writes;

I love this time of year. In fact, autumn and spring are my favourite seasons. In autumn we get ready to hunker down in the darker evenings and watch as the wildlife settles down for the long sleep through winter, but in spring we have the joy of watching everything wake up and new life emerges once again. It is a season of hope and goodness don't we need hope. With so much happening around the world and on our doorstep that can bring about anxiety, it is good to be reminded of the hope of new life and new beginnings.

Hope - We hope for all kinds of things, from good weather and safe journeys to positive outcomes of exams and test results. The bible has a lot to say about hope. 

Parish Council Elections 2023

Saturday May 6, the date for the Coronation of King Charles, is not the only important one for the month, because two days prior to the London event is election day for local parish and town councils, when local residents have an opportunity to take steps to become involved in the affairs of their area by putting their name forward for their local council.

The message for Thursday May 4 is 'Make a change, become a councillor' with residents being asked are they passionate about their community and do they want to help make a long-lasting change or have concerns about a specific issue and want to do something about it.

The County wide message going out to all residents aged 18 or more years underlines the importance of getting people interested in the future of their parish and giving them an opportunity to have a say on the future of their area.

The message from the National Association of Local Councils is "If this is you, then we need you" saying there is a need for people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect their community to put themselves forward for election.

"Do you have innovative ideas for the council? Do you have concerns about a specific issue and want to do something about it? If this is you, then we need you. We need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect their community to put themselves forward for election. Make a change and become a councillor."

The Make A Change campaign encourages local councils to engage with as many residents from their community as possible and is aimed at helping improve local councils through various experiences, skills, and knowledge, and help councils become representatives of their communities.

The Nottinghamshire Association of Local Councils is well aware of the need to make sure local residents are given the opportunity to consider being involved with their local council and secretary Tanya Grimes, says "by becoming a Parish Councillor you become somebody your community will look to for help, guidance and support, and be a community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve."

“Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped to make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride,” she adds.

Branch Chair for Nottinghamshire is Councillor Mick Baker, and he says “Parish Councils typically meet once a month discussing issues such as crime prevention, planning, local amenities like village halls, community support and managing open spaces. Why not talk to your local councillors and find out what they think about the role. If you are interested in becoming a councillor, the clerk to your local council can help you find the necessary forms and to fill them in.”

“Although the elections are not until May 4th, nomination forms must be submitted to your District Council by 4pm on Tuesday 4th April so you don’t have long to think about it. If you miss this deadline, you will have to wait 4 years for another opportunity unless a councillor resigns in the meantime. Don’t wait: Make a Change NOW – become a Parish Councillor.”



Advice from Citizens Advice Sherwood & Newark on dealing with damp, mould and condensation in a rented property

As the weather has turned colder, I've noticed mould and damp in our flat. It's mainly in our bedroom, including some black mould on the carpet. I've been chasing our letting agency, who say they'll speak to our landlord. I'm really worried about how this might affect our health. Our tenancy agreement isn't up for eight months, what can I do?

It's good that you've already raised the issue with your letting agency. Unfortunately, it isn't always easy to work out the cause of mould or damp. This can make it difficult to work out if your landlord is responsible, unless there's an obvious cause, like a leaking roof.

There are many causes of damp that properties can get. The most common are rising, penetrating, construction and condensation damp. On our website there is information that may help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do. Check your tenancy agreement too for mentions of repairs and damp, and reach out to Citizens Advice on anything you're unsure about.

A landlord will have to act in relation to damp if it makes the property unsafe for someone to live in. This could be for example, if it is making the tenant or a member of their family ill. The landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if heaters are broken. If the damp has damaged items that the landlord is responsible for, such as carpets and window frames, they'll likely have to cover the cost of repairs.

One of the most common causes of damp is condensation. To prevent this, it's important to keep homes well-heated and well-ventilated, but for a lot of people this will be trickier to do given the colder weather and higher heating costs. You may be eligible for help to insulate and heat your home, and should visit our website to find out more.

On our website we also have advice on things that can make damp worse and may impact the landlord taking responsibility for repairs. These include drying clothes on heaters or blocking air vents.

If your landlord is responsible for the damp in your property but doesn't act, there are steps you can take, such as reporting them to the local authority. If you're in social housing you might also be able to use the landlord's formal complaints procedure. There is more information about this on our website. If it reaches the point where you want to get out of a fixed term tenancy agreement early, do speak to an adviser first, as there might be better ways to approach the issue.

With any building with a rich history such as the Village Hall, (the original corrugated building was erected in the late 1880s), comes a duty of care to maintain it in the best possible way. Needless to say, this all comes at a cost. To this end, the Trustees work hard to raise funds, either by applying for grants, such as the one awarded by Asda recently, which was used to upgrade the fitted kitchen or from fundraising events such as the popular "Live & Local" performing arts shows.

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WW1& 2 the Thorpe & Tallents Families' involvement

Godfrey Edward Tallents D.S.O. - 1st Royal Lancashire Fusiliers



He was christened at Coddington Church on the 30th August 1883 his parents were Godfrey & Eliza Caroline Tallents.

On the 1901 census aged 17 he was a "Gentleman Cadet" at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst.

On the 1911 census aged 27 a Lieutenant in the army living in Coddington House with his parents Godfrey 62, Lily 48 and his brother Hugh 27.

Severely wounded at Gallapoli

"The son of Godfrey & Eliza born 31st July 1883, like his father he was a military man; he saw service with the Lancashire Fusiliers in the 1914 – 18 war. In 1916 Capt. Godfrey Edward was awarded the D.S.O. for gallantry during in the Gallipoli landing, where he was dangerously wounded. On the 18th April 1923 he married Marjorie Peel Nuttall and they had two children. He retired from the army in 1951 with the rank of Colonel and came back to live in Coddington House before moving to the Old Vicarage on the junction of Main Street and Sleaford Road where he lived until his death on 22nd July 1967, aged 83. He was President of Coddington Cricket club for many years and an ardent supporter."

Hugh Tallents D.S.O - Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry

He was the son of Godfrey and Eliza Caroline PardoTallents and he was christened at Coddington Parish church on the 6th August 1885.

On the 1901 census he was a boarder at Eton College.

On the 1911 census he was a solicitor aged 27 living with his parents Godfrey 62, Lily 48 & Brother Godfrey Edward 27.

D.S.O. for Major Hugh Tallents

“Major Hugh Tallents, who has been awarded the D.S.O.; is the second son of Mrs Tallents and the late Mr Godfrey Tallents, of Coddington. For many years past he has held a commission in the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. He came up with the regiment on embodiment in August 1914, and took part in Dardanelles campaign, the evacuation and the subsequent operations on Eastern battlefields. Although his many friends in Newark will regret the cause of his present stay in the town (the death of his respected father), they will be pleased to be able to personally congratulate him on his well merited honour. It will be remembered that Major Tallents, at a recent function in the Town Hall, made a very favourable impression when he addressed a few words to the company at the invitation of the Mayor. Major Talent’s elder brother (Major G.E. Tallents, Lancashire Fusiliers) and his brother in law (Liet-Colonel H. Thorpe) had previously been awarded the D.S.O.”

Hugh was a very successful Solicitor in Newark, a senior partner in Tallents & Co. The Tallents family were Town Clerks in Newark for many years:-

His father Godfrey was appointed June 1873 until his death on the 10th March 1917, Godfrey was replaced by his brother William Edward; unfortunately he only held the post for a year as he died in 1918. Hugh replaced him and remain Town Clerk until circa 1950.

Hugh married Nancy Elizabeth Beevor on the 4th February 1946 and they had one son John Richard who was born in 1947.

Col. Hugh died on the 3rd August 1978 and is buried in Coddington Church yard.

Gervase Thorpe D.S.O - Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders

Served through Boer war & severely wounded

Gervase, The fifth son of James & Annie Thorpe was born on the 10th June 1877 in Argyll. The three years old was at home in Coddington Hall on the Census night 1881.

Gervase joined the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders in 1897 and served in the Boer War. He took a distinguished part in the crossing of the Modder River (28th November 1899, as described in Mr Louis Creaswick's history of the Transvaal War) and was at the Battle of Magersfontein (11th October 1899).

He was shot in the chest at Paardeberg (battle dated 18th February and on 27th February 1900 General Piet Cronje surrender at Paardeburg).

He remained with the Regiment, becoming a Captain in 1904. By the end of 1915 he was a Major and about that time was mentioned in despatches and awarded a DSO (London Gazette 18th February 1915). In 1916, at the time of his brother, John Somerled's death, he was a Colonel on the Headquarters Staff.

In 1917 he married Margaret Burt-Marshall and they had a son Ninian(b.1921).

In 1919 he was awarded a Bar to his D.S.O. (LG 15th February 1919).

In 1927 he was Colonel of the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders, and in 1929 was a C.M.G. and a Brigadier- General commanding a Brigade at Bordeaux.

In September 1944 Lieut. Ninian Thorpe, Scots Guards, son of Major General and Mrs Gervase Thorpe was killed in action in N.W.Europe and was awarded a posthumous Military Cross (LG 21st December 1944)

General Thorpe, who lived with his sister Helen Thorpe in Hundley, Lincs visited Lunga often after his retirement. He died in Harrow, Middlesex, on 4th October 1962. His wife died two years later.

Harold Thorpe D.S.O. - Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry

He was the third son of James and Annie Thorpe, born on the 17th April 1875 at Pimlico, London and baptised at Coddington Parish church on the 8th June 1875.

On the 1901 census he was 25, a malster living at Coddington Hall with his father James, J.P., aged 77, landowner & malster.

On the 12th July 1909, Captain Harold Thorpe married Dorothy Marion Tallents of Coddington House at Coddington Parish church.

Before the Boer War he was a Lieutenant in the Sherwood Rangers having received his Commission in January 1899. He was promoted within the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry in 1905 and 1910.

On the 1911 census he was 35, a Managing Partner in the family maltings, living at Coddington Moor with his wife Dorothy Marion (nee Tallents) 22 and their newly born daughter Margaret Annie.

In World War 1 he saw service in Gallipoli, Palestine and Salonika. In 1914 he was in command of A-Squadron of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. His second-in-command, brother-in-law Hugh Tallents,



took over the squadron at Gallipoli when Harold was promoted. By November 1915 Harold had become temporary Lieut.Colonel and was Commanding Officer of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. He was promoted to substantive Lieut.Colonel the following year.

In January 1917 Harold won the D.S.O. and in November was mentioned in despatches. He was then "of Coddington Hall", and a member of the firm of J. Thorpe & Sons, Malsters'.

He died on the 1st of December 1953 and is buried in the family grave in Coddington Church yard.

John Somerled Thorpe M.C. - 2nd Battalion Scots Guards

Killed in action France

He was the second son of James and Annie Thorpe and was christened at Coddington Parish Church on the 30th March 1873.

On the 1881 census aged 8 he lived at "Beaconfield Hall", Coddington with his father James 57, mother Annie 34, sister Cicely, Richmond 3, brothers Harold 6, William D 4, Gervase 4 and 13 servants.

On the 1891 census he lived at "Coddington Hall" aged 18 with his father James 67, sisters Helen M 6, Elspeth M 3 and brothers Harold 15, William 14, Gervase 13, Archibald 9 and 8 servants.

In 1904 he married Elizabeth Cecilia Meade and had two sons and a daughter.

John was a Captain with the 2nd Btn.Scots Guards; he was killed while acting as temporary commander (Major) on Friday 15th September 1916, aged 44. His wife is listed as Elizabeth Cecilia Thorpe, of "Coomelands", Pulborough, Sussex. He is buried in the

Cornoy Military Cemetery grave ref. Q39, located just north of the D938 from Albert to Peronne, about 10 kilometres east south east of Albert, Somme, France. He lived at Coddington Hall and Ardbrecknish, Argyllshire. John joined the Scots Guards in 1893. He served throughout the Boer War and was severely wounded. He rejoined the Scots Guards in 1914 and was twice wounded. Mentioned in dispatches, he was awarded a Military Cross "For gallantry and coolness in collecting groups of men at Loos and holding a defence position for 3 days and nights until relieved". The memorial tablet to John Somerled Thorpe can be seen at the back of the village church.

The following article was in the Newark Advertiser:-

**"KILLED AFTER MOST GALLANTLY LEADING HIS COMPANY"
"BURIED TO THE DIRGE OF THE PIPES"**

A wave of sadness and sorrow passed over the town and district on Wednesday evening, when the official news was received that Major J.S.Thorpe, of Coddington Hall, had been killed in France. Unlike his father, the deceased officer was not widely known in the town as he had chosen the career of a soldier and had not taken an active part in local affairs. But those who knew him best honoured and loved him most. He bore a name of note in this town, a name closely associated with its progress and prosperity. When he succeeded to the family estates, Captain J.S. Thorpe resigned his Commission in the Scots Guards and came to Coddington. Shortly afterwards he married Elizabeth Cecilia Mead, daughter of Canon the Hon. Sidney Mead, of Frankleigh, son of the third Earl of Clanwilliam; sometime British Ambassador at Berlin. There was great rejoicing at Coddington over the event, and the bride and bridegroom were welcomed with much pleasure and festivity.

Mr John Thorpe was always a favourite with tenants and villagers. They recognised and appreciated his genuinely modest and gentle nature, and looked forward to his settling down to the life of the country squire amongst them. For a short term he represented the Balderton Division on the Notts. County Council. He also joined his father's old regiment the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry in which he attained the rank of Major. At this period the annual encampment was several times by his kindness held in the Coddington Park or at the Moor, and on these occasions Newark was gay with the green and gold of the popular regiment, which owed much of its strength and efficiency to the Thorpe family. When the Great War broke out, Major

J.S.Thorpe was for a time stationed at Retford in charge of the Sherwood Rangers Reserve Regiment. But actuated, as always by a high sense of duty he soon felt called upon to take a more active part in the struggle in which his country was engaged, and in December 1914, he rejoined his old regiment, the Scots Guards, as Captain, soon afterwards taking his place in their ranks at the Front. It was with the Guards he went through the Boer War, and received the Kings Medal with two bars, and the Queens Medal with six clasps for Belfast, Diamond Hill, Johannesburg Driefontein, Modder River, and Belmont. He came through that campaign unscathed, so far as wounds were concerned, but his health suffered and for a time he went to recuperate at Cape Town.

Major Thorpe was a Justice of the Peace for the Counties of Nottinghamshire and Argyllshire and was the owner of the estate of Ardbecknish; in the latter county, in addition to his Nottinghamshire property. He was head of the firm of Messrs Thorpe and Sons, Malsters, and a director of the "Newark Advertiser" Co. Ltd.

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



CODDINGTON VILLAGE SIGN



Coddington's new village sign may by now be back in its place on the Millennium Garden, or very soon will be. It's a new interpretation of the old sign which has been painted by local-born artist Paul Handley who lives and works as a professional artist in Newark. This was a new venture for Paul - his work is mostly portraits and scenes of Newark, but he has very much enjoyed this commission as he explains here:

I was originally approached by the Parish Council over a year ago with a brief of simply copying the old village sign which had become very delapidated on to new pre-cut timber, but on receipt of a photograph of the sign, I decided that I would like to put my own mark on it whilst still retaining all the features of the original design.

There were two signs to complete (back and front), so keeping the original elements of the design - a mother with her children in generic 'period' costume adverting to Coddington's connections with Constance Penswick Smith the instigator of our modern Mothering Sunday, along with well-known local landmarks in the form of Coddington Windmill and All Saints' Church, I imagined a time and type of day so that the figures existed in a continuous space and with a coherent lighting system - in this case a summer's day about lunchtime because everyone loves lunchtime on summer days and anyway the shadows are short and easy to organise. Other elements included a fox and a badger, a tractor and farmer at work in the fields as symbols of the village's rural and agricultural links and last but by no means least, a Lancaster bomber representing Coddington's RAF connections in the form of a long defunct air base that was operational during World War Two.

Once the new design had been presented to the Parish Council for approval and various details discussed and agreed, the first sign was completed in artists' acrylic paint in three or four months, then the second sign was a fairly straight-forward copy of the first and took significantly less time to complete. In a shift away from my usual style, I have tried to produce something with a modicum of artistic merit whilst retaining the old sign's charm and accessibility. Anyway, after being pickled in layers of weather-proof varnish it was delivered to Coddington Parish Council where, I'm pleased to say, it was well received. The sign was a very enjoyable commission to undertake, despite it taking a bit longer to complete than I'd anticipated. Quite when it'll be up in situ, I'm not sure, but I'm certainly looking forward to seeing it there.

As if to further endear the audience to their North East roots, the band captured the seasonal mood of ever-urgent Christmas shopping as they regaled with their very funny “Geordie Wassail Song” – a very good, and oddly familiar, take on spending at the Sales.

Shakespeare’s Fool - 20th January 2023

Top class village entertainment was on offer on Jan 20th with the appearance of the multi-talented Robin Leetham with his one-man, one-mouse and one-marotte performance of Tortive Theatre’s, *Shakespeare’s Fool*, as he took on the rise (and fall) of an Elizabethan Fool in the 16th century.

Written by T. G. Hoffman, this was a proper, yet witty, drama brought to Coddington from its Premier at the Edinburgh Fringe in 2021 and the wait was well worth it.

Rob began his portrayal of William ‘Cavaliero’ Kempe with the clear intention to restore the ‘Fool’s’ reputation back to a likeable character within the



historical story of William Shakespeare.

In a tale that drives strong opinions about historic accuracy, Rob managed to deliver a tightly scripted and flawlessly delivered monologue, making his version of Kempe absolutely believable and thoroughly real on the stage.

His technique of adding Maurice, the unfortunately damaged mouse, and a very cheeky marotte (jester’s staff) to the evening’s cast, made for a captivating interaction of dialogue.

Familiar elements featured in the story such as Kenilworth Castle and The Globe as Rob bounded across the stage, his projected voice booming from atop a tiny prop of a footstool as he tested the acoustics of Coddington's village hall.

The captivating drama covered all the key players of the late 16th century period; Richard Tarlton, Earl of Leicester, Edward Allen, Richard Burbage, et al, and, of course, Shakespeare himself. But Kempe's love interest, Rebecca ("what was her second name?" demanded by the ever-present jester-staff) was given dramatic prominence throughout the performance.

Here Rob helped us though the choice between the Admiral's men and Lord Chamberlain's men as he continued his flawless delivery of a clever, contemporary script that was nonetheless, never far from Elizabethan times and was only enhanced by occasional references to quite modern wit.

Towards the end of the evening the emotional elements of the performance came together with Maurice (the nearly dead but then sadly deceased mouse) threatening to steal the final scene.

The evening, as everyone in the hall admitted afterwards, was well enjoyed leaving a wonderful feeling from what was, quite simply, a jest and a jig - yet another success for live entertainment in Coddington. Well done Rob!


Yoga with Clare

Coddington Community Centre

Hello Everyone,

I would like to start by thanking the trustees of the Community Centre for their work keeping things running in order.

We are seeing increased activities over the weekends with more birthday parties being booked. We are also hosting the first visit by Red Fox Fairs at the end of April - something to be looked forward to.

The car park has become an issue again with people thinking the car park should be for the community to use for and in which every way they think fit. I can assure you that this is not the case.

I have been advised that cars are being damaged by inconsiderate parking of vehicles in the community centre car park.

The Community Centre was built by the Newark and Sherwood District Council to provide a local meeting hall for the community to use. At the time of construction there was no connection to the school. The school approached the District Council and obtained a licence to use the council land for school exit as they have received some money to build the access. Providing car parking for school drop off and pick up was never part of the agreement, it was just accepted that it would happen. At the time the school was continuing to grow, but car parking was not an issue. As the school has grown more and more cars have been using the car park to the point where the facility is being abused by drivers parking on the yellow lines and on the grass spaces. There are even some drivers who use the disabled bays without displaying a blue badge.

The car park has always been managed by Newark and Sherwood District Council using a Traffic Regulation Order which lists 'users of the Community Centre' as the only authorised users, anyone else is liable for a parking ticket along with people who are not properly parked in a bay which includes parking on the yellow lines.

The yellow lines were put down to allow a good view of people crossing the car park as crossing from behind a parked car is hazardous. Additionally they prevent people, who are parked in a bay, from being blocked in. If someone who is obstructed tries to get out they run a high risk of damaging a car around them.

Would you go into a car park in Newark and park on the double yellow line because it was full?

We try to accommodate the school drop off and pick up times to provide a safer environment for young people getting to school but the actions of a few drivers is increasing the risk for everyone.

The car park will always be available for use at school times providing the Community Centre does not have a booking which needs the parking. However I support any action the Parish Council takes to enforce the safety in the Car Park.
