Chairman's Report

Dispel the gloom of winter by joining in our traditional 'Carols Around the Tree' on Wednesday 16th December 6pm at Coddington Community Centre. Carols will be sung, led by Head-teacher, Mrs. T Caputa and children from the school. Refreshments of mulled wine and mince pies will be available. Wrap up warmly as it is outside (weather permitting).

The Council would like to thank the Community Spirit Group for organising this event, to everyone supplying the mulled wine and mince pies and Cllr. Allen and friends for erecting the tree. I do hope that you will come to this celebration. The Christmas tree will be decorated and the Parish Council will give a prize for the best tree decoration. There was a wonderful atmosphere last year and I am sure it will be as successful as last year.

I would like to welcome two new Councillors to the Parish Council Mr. C. Gangel and Miss L. Rowden-Allen.

The defibrillator should now be installed at the Community Centre. The Coddington Trust Fund and Coddington Parish Council funded this provision jointly. The Council would like to thank the Trust and the Community Centre for such a positive response. Please look out for information about free training courses if you are interested. However the key to this equipment is that any adult can use it. Councillor Chris Gangel is the coordinator for this provision.

Walking is very important to our community. Progress in opening up the footpath around Yew Tree Wood has been slower than hoped. Cllr Dobson and the NCC's Senior RoW Officer have met the landowners to agree to a permissive footpath. Discussions are still taking place in negotiating a circular walk. There will be a second public meeting in early spring to fully explain the details.

Walkers however do need to be responsive to landowners' concerns.

Walkers do have the right of way if there is a public footpath, but they also have the responsibility to keep dogs on leads, follow the country code and to keep to the footpath.

A grant of £200 has been given to Coddington School to support the DARE programme.

Thanks to everyone who worked so hard to make the village attractive in the Best Kept Village competition. I thought you might like to read the comments from the judges. They are included in this magazine.

The Council has objected to the proposed wind turbines at Fulbeck Airfield, as the area is an important recreational amenity for the enjoyment of open countryside and contributes to the rural setting of the village. Councillors also wished to show support for neighbouring parishes that would be directly affected.

It was with great sadness that the Council learnt of the death of Hugh Daybell in October. He had been Chairman of the Parish Council and was the editor of this magazine for some time. Hugh's contribution to the village community was invaluable and he will be greatly missed.

Good-bye from Revd David

I wrote in the last edition of the Village News of endings and the anticipation of new beginnings. Little did I know what would happen in the life of All Saints' Church over the next few months.

Firstly we have faced the deep sadness of the death of our Churchwarden, dear friend and brother in Christ Hugh Daybell. I have written elsewhere about Hugh's life Although Hugh's time with us on this earth is over, we live in the anticipation that we will be united with him again in that time when God's perfect kingdom comes in all its glory. Rest well with God Hugh.

And for Emma, Martha and I came God's call to move on from here to something new. That call didn't come as a voice from a burning bush as it did for Moses, but in the form of an email from the Bishop of Barking asking if I would consider becoming the Vicar of St James, Collier Row and St Johns, Havering-atte-Bower in the Diocese of Chelmsford, just north of Romford in the London Borough of Havering.

At first this didn't seem right to me. For one thing I have always prayed 'Lord I will follow your call anywhere, but don't let that be to the South East!' We knew we would be moving in the next year or two, but we had our eyes set on going further north - much further north! But God has a sense of humour! We set off to meet the people of the new parish with trepidation. But it soon became clear to us that this was God's calling and we have since had several affirmations of that.

As always there is that sense of ambivalence about moving. We will miss this place and the people we have come to know and love. But there is the excitement too of joining in with something new. Many people have asked me if this is a promotion. The answer is no, but then neither would be becoming a Bishop. God calls us all to use the talents and gifts he has given in his Kingdom for the good of all. And to those he has given much, from them much will be expected.

Coddington WI

Coddington WI meet on the second Tuesday of every month in the Coronation Hall. The meetings, which start at 7:30, begin with the WI business and news of what is going on within the Nottinghamshire WIs, followed by a speaker or demonstration, and ending with a social gathering with refreshments. We welcome new members, so keep an eye out for the posters around the village giving details of our next meeting.

On a beautiful evening in August the members and friends were treated to a tour of St Ann's Heritage Gardens in Nottingham. A representative gave a talk on the gardens at our April meeting, so this trip was arranged so we could 'see for ourselves'. We were amazed that such a large area of green space existed so near to the city centre.

September saw a change to the planned programme as our speaker for the evening had to cancel at the last minute. Fortunately member Marilyn Harrison stepped into the gap. Marilyn started her talk by showing a pair of wellingtons that she had bought on her trip to Australia in the 60s. She had worked and travelled there after qualifying as a physiotherapist, and had been marooned just after setting off on her travels by the end of a drought. She had had to buy the boots from the local store and she still used them today for gardening. Marilyn talked about her trip through the outback and about her visit to the Opal mine at Cooper Pedy.

Several members also enjoyed an event planned by the County Organisation and had an informative talk at Nottingham Masonic Hall. The event ended with a scrumptious tea. As one of the celebrations for the WI centenary the County Organisation arranged a series of tea parties at a variety of venues. The last one was held in the Town Hall in Newark, when members were entertained by two speakers and treated to a delicious tea. The event finished with singing Happy Birthday and the cutting of a celebration cake. Our WI purchased a special rose and planted it in the Village Hall garden to commemorate the centenary.

We try to support the Robin Hood Theatre and a group of members enjoyed 'Abigail's Party' at the beginning of October. We are planning further visits to see 'Quartet' and the 'Pitmen Painters' during October and November.

As a celebration of the WI Centenary Coddington dedicated their October meeting to memories of the WI. Several members spoke on a variety of topics, including Jane Hedge on How Coddington WI contributed to the War effort. Nora Reed told members how we had obtained a Lottery grant for nearly 50 members to go to the WI College near Oxford. Pat Hemingway read her poem about her experience and Wendy Parrett and Joyce Allen spoke about how joining Coddington WI had changed their lives. Jan

Phillips then shared a few early reminiscences. The old programmes and the photo albums were on display for members to look back over the 81 years Coddington WI has been in the village.

We are now making plans for the Seniors' Lunch, which is financed by the Coddington Trust Fund. Member Nora Reed and her team of WI helpers cook and serve this lunch in January. Hugh Daybell (H, HD, Hudge) 25th December 1951 - 8th October 2015

Hugh was a Coddington lad and lived much of his life at the Homestead on Balderton Lane. The Daybells were a farming family in the parish for many years. He was fortunate to be here at all, born premature at only 27 weeks, a very early delivery for the mid 20th century, he was placed in one of the first incubators to be installed in Newark Hospital. He weighed just 2lbs and was described as looking like a skinned rabbit! But Hugh would grow to be a big man, and I don't just mean physically tall, which he was. He was big in character and in love. And he was a big part of the Coddington, Newark and surrounding communities - over 500 people who attended his funeral and memorial services and the tributes he received are their own witness to that. He wasn't egotistical, self centred. He enjoyed social gatherings in all sorts of settings, but he didn't enjoy them as the centre of attention or for the sole purpose of his own pleasure. What he enjoyed was seeing to it that everyone else was having a great time. That is what gave him pleasure.

Hugh was a family man, with Liz his wife, Toni, Sam and Ruth his children and Jack, Evie and Philippa his grandchildren - Hugh loved his family with that truly unconditional love.

Hugh was a hoarder. He kept things, and never gave up on anything. He would try and breathe new life into all sorts of things – he was reluctant to let go. Liz has kept finding things tucked away in the shed that she had told Hugh to take to the tip. But I think this never letting anything go didn't just apply to inanimate objects. He was the same with people. Many folk have said to me that Hugh was not one to be judgemental or to have favourites – he never looked down on anyone – he treated all as equals and never gave up on them. And he wanted the best for everyone.

Hugh had attended Magnus Boys' Grammar School as it was then. Andrew Fearn shared with me this story of their school days. The Magnus boys would join with Lily and Stone Girls' High School for the 6th form dance. Andrew tells me that back in the late 60's these were prim and proper events watched over by the teachers – in particular by

Miss Dibb the head of Lily and Stone who came across – at least in the minds of teenage boys as quite a tyrant, someone not to be crossed. So on one side of the room would sit the boys and on the other side the girls and the boys were eying up the pretty girls and plucking up courage to ask one for a dance. But not Hugh, no, he had gone over and asked Miss Dibb to dance!

I wonder what was going through Hugh's mind then— maybe it was that sense of seeing people in a different light — not wanting to leave people out, seeing in Miss Dibb something beyond the superficial judgements that his teenage peers had made.

Hugh was a man of faith, he had attended All Saints' Church regularly when living in the village and had been Churchwarden for many years, as his dad had been before him. But in the last few years of his life, that faith had taken on a new dynamic for him. After going through a hard time he had been invited to an Alpha course and through that his faith had become very much more alive to him. He came to appreciate more deeply the love of his Heavenly Father for him, and Jesus' death of his salvation and for the salvation of all. And he was more aware of the working of the Holy Spirit in his life. And Hugh being Hugh, he wanted to share that with people. He came to me asking if we could run an Alpha course at All Saints' and this we did – or I should I say he did as I said he'd have to organise it. I know there are people who are thankful he did as their faith has been awakened too, and Hugh has been faithful to them leading a Study Group that grew from that.

There is much more that could be said about Hugh's life, his involvement with Newark Rugby Club, his work as a teacher and head teacher - especially with children with special needs at Orchard School, his part in the Newark Shows, his work as governor at Coddington School, his time as a Coddington Parish Councillor and his interest in Coddington history, the list seems endless. Those of you who knew him and counted him as your friend will have your own favourite stories. And you will miss him dearly - especially his hugs and handshakes! I'd only known Hugh for the last seven years, but somehow it feels I'd known him all my life. It was, it is, a privilege to say he was my friend. And I believe that through God's grace I will meet him again in that time when death and all crying and all pain have passed away and God's new order is fully established. Rest well with God Hugh, 'thou good and faithful servant'



There are plans that she should visit again – does anyone else remember her? I'm sure she would like to say 'hello' again and reminisce over old photos etc.





We're working hard over Christmas to keep you and your family safe, but there are steps you can take to help us.

When you're out shopping

Keep valuables in inside pockets of clothing or bags.

Only carry the cash you need.

Park in an open, well-lit area. Visit www.parkmark.co.uk for details of approved car parks.

Avoid going back to your car to leave your shopping part-way through your trip. If you have to keep presents

In the car, make sure they are out of view in the boot, the car is locked, and keep the receipts with you.

At cash machines

If you see anything suspicious alert the bank or call the police on 101.

Shield the keypad when typing in your PIN at a cash machine or in a shop.

Only withdraw as much as you need and avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Put your money and cards away (not in your back pocket) safely before leaving the machine.

When you're out for the evening

NEVER leave your things unattended.

Make sure someone knows where you are going and when you'll be home.

Avoid walking home alone and never with someone you don't know well.

Drink responsibly, arrange for a member of your group to be a designated driver.

Check your taxi driver's ID and never get into an unlicensed taxi.

At home

Don't leave presents under your Christmas tree if they are visible from windows or doors.

Never keep large amounts of cash at home.

Make sure you keep your doors and windows locked at all times.

Keys should always be kept out of sight and not left in doors or in view of windows.

Make your house look occupied, use a timer switch to operate lights as it starts to get dark, leave a radio on.

Don't open the door to anybody you don't recognise. Not sure? Don't open the door!

Mark your valuables with your postcode. CREMARK and similar property marking systems are available to buy from Nottinghamshire Police's Pre Crime Unit.

It's been all change at the 1st Coddington Rainbows this Autumn with 13 seven year olds moving up to the two Brownie groups, and therefore we have taken on and enrolled a whole group of new Rainbows!

In September we visited the Happy Egg Farm just off the A17, part of the Tesco Farm To Fork project to learn all about chicken farms and how eggs are produced in bulk. We had an educational tour in the evening and we were all very impressed. With this farm visit under our belts, we were able to work towards the Roundabout Seasons badge which included a session on mud modelling, making sun catchers and a paper snowball fight!! As part of the Rainbows programme, we undertake activities that cover the elements of 'Look', 'Learn', 'Laugh' and 'Love', which are simple for the children to understand and make for fun sessions. Dog Fouling

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. If you are a dog owner, you have a legal duty to clean up every time your dog messes in a public place, *including public footpaths and any open land* to which the public has access. Always carry a bag when dog walking, and place the used bag in a waste bin. DO NOT LEAVE THE BAG LITTERING A FOOTPATH as some people have been doing.

Not only is dog mess unsightly and unpleasant, it can lead to toxocariasis in humans, which can cause serious illness and even blindness, particularly affecting young children. Dog mess on grass paths and open spaces is even worse than on the pavement as it often can't be seen until stepped in, or is spread around over a wider area by a mower, and the parasite eggs in the faeces which cause toxocariasis can survive for many months in the soil

The Parish Council would like to make it clear that anyone seen not clearing up after their dog will be reported to the District Council or the police. Offenders can receive an on the spot fine of £75 or up to £1,000 if taken to court. WE APPEAL TO ALL DOG OWNERS TO KEEP CODDINGTON PATHS AND OPEN SPACES CLEAN AND HEALTHY FOR EVERYONE.
