Chairman's Report - March 2017

Christmas seems a distant past but before welcoming Spring I would like to give thanks for all those who helped in the Christmas celebrations. Thanks to Mr. R .S. Gray and Son for supplying the Christmas tree, Mr. and Mrs. Barber, Mr. and Mrs. C. Parrett, Mr. A. Parrett and Mr. B. Allen for erecting it. A big "Thank You' for all the children who made decorations for the tree and congratulations to the winning decorations. Carols Round the Tree continues to be a great success. Thanks to all those who helped provide refreshments including C.C. Mrs. M. Dobson, Mrs. Jan. Allen, Mrs. Joyce Allen, Mrs. W. Parrett, Mrs. J. Hedge, Mr. B. Wellard and the W.I. The Council would especially like to thank the children and Head-teacher Mrs. T. Caputa. and members of the Community Singers, who provided us with excellent entertainment. Finally, a big thanks to everyone who came.

It is wonderful to see that the Plough Public House has opened. It has been refurbished, providing excellent beer, spirits and coffee. I would like to briefly explain some of the history since it closed and clarify some misconceptions. The Parish Council has always supported The Plough. It supported its registration as a public amenity. The Public House was sold and planning permission was sought to refurbish the Public House, create new apartments, create a new car park in the beer garden and build houses on the old car park. It was the development of these houses and the location of the new car park that the Council objected to. This application went to appeal and permission was granted. Further details can be found on the website.

Residents of Coddington especially value the allotments. There will be no increase in rent and water charges for 2017. Please contact the clerk Mrs. Y. Wellard, for any information you require.

I have been asked to remind dog walkers not to place dog waste in the litter bins in the play area, as it is a health risk. NSDC accept it in all other litter bins.

The Annual Parish Meeting is to be held on 20th April 2017, 7.30pm in the Village Hall. This is a meeting for residents to hear from the village organisations. This will be followed by an open forum to discuss concerns and ideas for future development in the village.

This is also the time when the precept is set. This is the amount of money raised from Council tax to fulfil the Parish Council's obligations. It was agreed to set the 2017/18 precept at £14,560, an increase of 2% on a Band D property, as a step towards restoring the precept income over a six year period to the precept level prior to the Boundary Commission changes.

You can see how this money is spent by going to the website or attending a Parish Council meeting. The Council is able to donate monies to local groups if they apply. Last year we supported the Scouts, the Guides for a tent and the school's Dare campaign.

The Council has supported the Dare campaign over many years. Cllrs Mr. C. Gangel and Mrs. W. Parrett attended the annual presentation. Mrs. Caputa informed attending parents that the Dare campaign had contributed in stopping the grooming of children using on-line sites. A criminal prosecution had been successful. It was the Dare campaign initially, that had given a child courage and confidence to speak out. Mrs Caputa reiterated the importance of vigilance of parents whose children are using the net.

Coddington Parish Council has received a planning application for the temporary use of land for proposed recycling of excavated material from the Newark Sewer Scheme including processing, crushing and screening. The proposed site is on the former airfield south of Newark Auctions, west of Drove Lane Coddington. The Council strongly objects to the site being used in this rural area when there are other sites available. We have safety concerns for traffic on Drove Lane and for the village itself.

The Millennium Garden, at the junction of Old Newark Road and C208 is being tidied and improved, supported by Coddington Gardening Group. Please look for notices of work dates and help if you can.

I look forward to seeing you on my walks around the village.

Be Aware

Action Fraud

(Action Fraud, Administrator, National)

Payment diversion alert

Fraudsters are emailing members of the public who are expecting to make a payment for property repairs. The fraudsters will purport to be a tradesman who has recently completed work at the property and use a similar email address to that of the genuine tradesman. They will ask for funds to be transferred via bank transfer. Once payment is made the victims of the scam soon realise they have been deceived when the genuine tradesman requests payment for their services.

Protect yourself

- Always check the email address is exactly the same as previous correspondence with the genuine contact.
- For any request of payment via email verify the validity of the request with a phone call to the person who carried out the work.
- Check the email for spelling and grammar as these signs can indicate that the email is not genuine.

• Payments via bank transfer offer no financial protection; consider using alternative methods such as a credit card or PayPal which offer protection and an avenue for recompense.

Coddington History Group

Recently one of our members found some vintage newspaper cuttings relating to Coddington which I thought you may find interesting. I've typed them as they appear. Firstly a topical one (since the Plough has just reopened) from the Nottinghamshire Guardian of 27th May 1852. The language is quite amusing.

'CODDINGTON.- This place has been the scene of gaity and pleasure during the last week, through the holiday of the servants and the Nottingham Imperial Order of Odd Fellows holding their anniversary, the catering being done at host Birkett's, of the Plough Inn. All passed off tolerably quiet. One son of Bacchus, however, was so pot valiant as to violate the peace, and actually to challenge the gent in blue out to fight. The latter properly adjourned the "set-to" to the Justice Room, when his adversary was glad to say "enough," being mulcted in a penalty and costs.'

Note: "mulcted" means to extract money from (someone) by fine or taxation and of course the 'gent in blue' is a reference to the police.

The second cutting is also from the same newspaper but a later date -20^{th} October 1882, it is a sad story.

'EXTRAORDINARY DISCOVERY AT CODDINGTON.- An inquest was held at Coddington on Wednesday on the body of a male child, name unknown- William Robinson, gardener at Coddington Hall, said that on Monday he went out ratting. He went into an old shed in which lay some chaff. He put his shovel in it and dug out a parcel tied with string. On opening it he found that it contained the body of a child, wrapped up in a female's striped petticoat, and also a white linen petticoat and a white apron, which appeared much stained. He put the body back again and gave information to the police.- Charles Gomer said he was in the hovel when the body was found. He had been in the place several times but had never disturbed the chaff.- Robert Miller and Henry Leggett gave corroborative evidence as to the finding of the body.- Mr Samuel Job, surgeon, Newark, said he had examined the parcel, and found it contained the body of a full-grown male child. The body had evidently been concealed for some time, as it was in an advance state of decay. It was impossible to tell in the present condition whether the child had died naturally or not. The clothing found about the body appeared to have belonged to a domestic, as it was of coarse texture. He did not think the body had been in the place where it was found all the time.- The jury returned a verdict of "Found dead".'

Lastly, a cutting that refers to the toll-bar which was on Balderton Lane. At that time the Newark-Leadenham Turnpike (we would now say the A17) ran from Newark Road up what is now Brownlow's Hill onto Main Street then

turned a corner onto what is now Beckingham Road. It was a toll road. The cutting is very early, from the Nottingham Review of 6th February 1829.

'NEWARK PETTY SESSIONS, Wednesday Feb. 4th., before the Rev. J. Staunton, LL D. and Sir R.H. Bromley, Bart.- James Cocking, of Bassingham, servant in husbandry to Mr. Bycroft, was convicted in the penalty of £5, for violently and forcibly passing the toll-bar called Coddington side-bar, and refusing to pay the toll (which he did at the desire of his master), and in default, to be committed to Southwell House of Correction till paid.'

We also have cuttings advertising the letting of the turnpike tolls which refer to the Beckingham Toll-gate, the Beacon Hill Toll-gate, and the Coddington side-gate. The tolls were let by auction to the best bidder. The winner of the auction would then collect the tolls and hope it was more than he had paid for the privilege. It seems to be an annual process and information is given about how much was collected at each gate in the previous year. In 1815 the Beckingham Toll-gate took £411 3s 71/2d, the Beacon Hill Toll-gate took £251 3s 9d, and the Coddington side-gate took £3 13s 11/2d. Obviously Balderton Lane was rather less busy than it is now. Maybe we should reintroduce the toll to give an incentive to drivers to use the main roads instead of rat-running the lanes!

However, we also had our usual "fuddle" in the village hall before Christmas and on Boxing Day enjoyed a walk in Stapleford Woods (very little mud there!) as there is now no circular walk of suitable length available from the village.

We are grateful to the church for giving permission for us to photograph more parish records which we will transcribe for our archive in due course (volunteers welcome!).

Keep your bicycle safe and secure

Around 3,000 bikes are stolen in Nottinghamshire every year.

Bicycles are often targeted by thieves because they are left poorly secured or not secured at all. It takes just a few seconds for the opportunist thief to steal a bike that is left unsecured.

Follow this advice to help protect your bike from being stolen and to increase the chances of it being returned to you if it is stolen.

Securing your bike

Lock your bike tightly so that your bike is difficult to move when parked.

Ensure you lock both wheels and the frame to a cycle stand or another immoveable object.

Always park your bike where it can be clearly seen. Where possible use designated parking areas or secure cycle storage.

Make it impossible to a thief to smash the lock open. Fill the 'D' part of your lock with as much of the bike as possible. Never leave the lock lying on the ground where it could easily be smashed.

Use locks of gold 'Sold Secure' standard. Also, use two different types of lock, with at least one being a high quality D-lock. It takes thieves a few seconds to cut through poor quality locks - make it as difficult for them as possible.

Take the same care to lock your bike securely at home. Bikes get stolen from communal hallways, gardens and sheds.

Protecting your bike

Get your Bike(s) Insured. Ask your insurer to extend your home contents insurance to cover your bicycle. Ensure it covers you for thefts outside the home. If your bicycle is particularly valuable, you may need to insure it separately.

Register your Bike(s) Immobilise is a national property database that enables police to reunite stolen items with their rightful owners. Register your bike for free at the Immobilise website.

Mark your Bike(s) There are a number of bike marking products available. Always ensure you use a marking scheme that is approved by the Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPO), and preferably use a visible marking product, Smartwater kits and Selectamark are examples.

Bike Passport(s) If your bike was stolen, could you describe it? Take a photograph of your bike many people forget details about their bikes that could help. Consider creating a bike passport containing details of your bike.

If your bike has been stolen, contact the Police; give them as much detail as possible Make, Frame Number, Colour, Size, Photo and any other details.

DOG WALKERS PLEASE TAKE NOTE

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. If you are a dog owner, you have a legal duty to clean up every time your dog messes in a public place, including public footpaths and any open land to which the public has access. Always carry a bag when dog walking, and place the used bag in an appropriate bin. As long as the bag is well sealed, it can be left in a litter bin, but PLEASE DO NOT PUT DOG WASTE IN BINS WHICH ARE SITED WITHIN OR AROUND CHILDREN'S PLAY AREAS as some people have done.

Dog walkers have a duty to keep the streets, footpaths and open spaces clean and healthy for everyone. Anyone who is observed not clearing up after their dog will be reported to the District Council or to the police. Offenders can receive an on the spot fine of $\pounds75$ or up to $\pounds1,000$ if taken to court.
