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Chairman's Report - Dec 2017

The OVO Energy Tour of Britain (Cycle Tour) was a great success in September. Many residents came to watch the race. Thanks to all the Parish Councillors and District Councillor Lee, who helped decorate the village led by Cllrs Parrett and Hedge and those who helped in marshalling. Thanks also to Cllr. Dobson and Cllr. Lee who helped fund the event. The highlight was undoubtedly Mr. Des. Allen's sheep!

Christmas festivities are well underway, The Christmas tree will be put up in early December and once again the Parish Council will be donating two gift vouchers for a decoration from Coddington School.

Carols Round the Tree will take place on Wednesday 13th December 6pm at the Community Centre. Hopefully the weather will be favourable for us to sing outside but if it is wet we shall be in the Community Centre. There will be refreshments.

The Rights of Way Officer, Neil Lewis expects that the legal process for the establishment of permissive footpaths at Beaconfield will be completed by Spring. The proposed new routes should not be used until this process is complete.

Cllr Dobson reported that she has successfully applied for road repairs to be carried out on Drove Lane and Main Street and two new restricted parking 'hot spots' have been allocated for Coddington, outside the school and on the Morgan's Close estate, to enable buses to turn. Councillors agreed that the proposals were very sensible and long over-due. There were two letters objecting to the proposals at Morgans Close. They have been forwarded to the County Council as it is their responsibility. It is hoped that if residents can, they should park in their drives.

There had been consultation with the bus company as it is very difficult for buses to negotiate Brownlow's Hill and Morgan Close estate. Cllrs felt that the current door to door service was an essential, especially for the elderly and young families.

Councillors also had some concerns that cars parking outside The Plough on Main Street cause hazards to drivers negotiating the cross roads. This has been forwarded to the `Highways' at the County Council.

The Council has donated £100 to the Guides to support the purchase of T. shirts.

The Community Centre is run by a volunteer Management Committee, providing excellent facilities for the village and surrounding area. The AGM will be held on 21 November, which I hope you will attend.

Cllrs had attended a meeting with VIA Officer Jo Horton, which was arranged by Cllr Dobson to discuss traffic and parking problems in the village. Ms Horton had agreed to look into the possibility of railings on the C208, bollards for safer crossing at The Plough and at the A1S slip road.

There will be a 20mph speed limit on Brownlow's Hill next year. A map is available from the clerk. Whilst this gesture is welcomed, Cllrs felt that a 20mph speed limit on Beckingham Road would be more appropriate.

Cllr Gangel reported that the team of 5 volunteers had begun traffic monitoring with the speed gun and had received some positive feedback.

Nottinghamshire County Council is now preparing the new Local Minerals local Plan 2016-2036. The timetable is:

November 2017 Publication of the Issues and Options public consultation.

June 2018 Publication of the draft Minerals Local Plan and associated consultation.

November 2018 Publication of the final minerals and Local plan and consultation.

Summer 2019 Independent examination.

Autumn 2019 Adoption of the Local Plan by the CC.

There will be an 8 week consultation period between 20th November2017 and 14th January 2018.

The Council and other organisations have learnt a lot from dealing with the previous Mineral Plan. It is important to remember that any comments, which were submitted to the withdrawn Minerals Plan cannot be take in to account as part of the preparation for the new Minerals Plan. The Issues and Options consultation will not be considering or identifying new quarries. This process will be undertaken at a later stage. So we start again but we have experience now!

Cllrs unanimously supported Robert Jenrick MP on his campaign against the closure of the custody suite at Newark police station. The Clerk has written to the Chief Constable and the Police and Crime Commissioner to keep the suite open. The Council is dismayed that the Chief Constable Craig Gilbert has decided to mothball Newark Custody Suite.


It was agreed that a notice should be placed in the enclosed play area in Thorpe Oaks stating that dog waste should not be put in the open bin. Unfortunately dog waste has still been found within the playground and in the open bin. We will meet with Councillor Lee to respond to this problem and look at the provision of bins on Thorpe Oak playing field.

It was with great sadness that we leant of the death of Benard Masdin, aged 94 years. He was a driving force within the village. Some of you may remember him as our postman, as he and his wife ran the Post Office from the bungalow on Main Street. He was a local man; his father was a groom at Barnby Manor. He moved to the village in the 1950-60's. He served as chairman to the Village Hall and the Parish Council at the same time.

He will, I think be remembered for his great passion: football. He created the football club, which we see prospering today. Bernard ran a football team for teenagers on what is now Thorpe Oaks playing field. He had the imagination and foresight to understand the importance of owning the grounds. As soon as land became available he organised the raising of funds to buy the land at the corner of Stapleford Lane near Stapleford Woods. Thanks to Cllr B. Allen for this information.


BOOK SALE

Sir William Robertson Academy to become a Multi Academy Trust

Sir William Robertson Academy is delighted to share the exciting news that its Multi Academy Trust application has been approved. Sir William Robertson Academy is currently a stand-alone academy but will now establish the Aspire Learning Trust as its Multi Academy Trust. The school is also delighted to announce that an academy order has been signed by the Regional Schools Commissioner to enable Bassingham Primary School to join the Aspire Learning Trust. Bassingham will become the first primary school to join the Trust.

Mark Guest, Headteacher commented: "Eighteen months have now passed since we submitted our application and I am delighted to share the news that our Multi Academy Trust has been approved. We are all very excited about this next stage in the development of our two schools which share many common values and place children at the centre of everything we do and believe. Our Trust will be one of the first Lincolnshire-based cross-phase Multi Academy Trusts and we believe it has fantastic potential to improve learning opportunities for local children."

Within a Multi-Academy Trust all schools which join are governed by a single academy trust. The schools' individual governing bodies will become Local Governing Bodies, subject to the oversight of the Multi-Academy Trust which has ultimate responsibility for the running of all of its academies. The Multi-Academy Trust will be accountable and responsible for the performance of all of the academies in the Trust and will delegate a range of decision-making powers to the Local Governing Bodies of the individual academies.

From February 2018, both Sir William Robertson Academy and Bassingham Primary School will be run by the newly formed Aspire Learning Trust. Both academies will have representation on the

main Trust board and each will have its own separate Local Governing Body.

Bassingham Primary School will concentrate on developing the primary phase of the Trust and Sir William Robertson Academy will develop the secondary phase. It will be very much business as usual at both schools. Collaboration between the two schools will bring new opportunities for pupils and enhance learning in both settings.



Coddington Farming History 1937 – 1962

I came to the village at the age of 3 yrs in 1937 when my father took on the tenancy of Hall Farm from Mr G.A.Ross and I left the village in 1962 although I still kept in contact for some years while my mother lived at "Rosealan" in Balderton Lane. My father had been a farm pupil with Mr Ross in the early years after being wounded in the first world war, until 1926 and told me a great deal about the history of the village and the people. I was educated at Coddington School up to 1944, when I went to the Magnus Grammar School and I worked at Hall Farm from about 1951 to 1958, but also worked threshing on many other farms.

What is astonishing is the number of farms and small –holdings that existed 50 years ago and now have gone. I will try to list them and give what details I can recall. Unfortunately I do not have a map but will try to give locations by starting at the Plough and following various roads.

- 1. Plough Inn. Was kept by Arthur Henton who also had a paddock of about ½ acre and a very large garden, both on the Newark side of the pub, one on either side of the bypass and he did some market gardening there.
- 2. Towards Beckingham about 100 yards from the Plough are two houses still there facing the Plough, in the one furthest from the road lived Fred Parkes, son of Sam Parkes who kept the Red Lion. Fred had a large grass field across the road from his house and a range of arable land about ½ a mile down Sleaford Road. This land was a strip of 3 or 4 fields back from the road on the Left leaving the village and the field nearest the road was next to the allotment field. Like most farmers at that time Fred carried on a wide range of activities including contract sheep shearing but I don't think he milked.
- 3. In Fred's grass field stood a modern house, about 100 yards from Fred's buildings, still there and it was occupied by Mr Fryer who retailed milk in Newark which I think he must have purchased from the Daybell's. He did this from 2 large cans balanced on a bicycle, which was no mean feat as he had an artificial foot.
- 4. Passing on towards Beckingham just past Stapleford Lane end is a track on the right which leads to the Folly, a long way back from the road, very isolated, used as a market garden by Roger Williams who transported his produce on a bicycle with a large basket on the front. After he left this was taken over by the Kirkham family, who later had a green grocery shop in Middlegate, Newark. At least they had a car or a van!
- 5. Carrying on towards Beckingham on the left about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile further was the Tinderbox, a smallholding where goats were kept. I do not recall who lived there.

6. Maybe not in Coddington Parish, the next farm was Flawford on the left set back from the road and kept by Archie Kerr, one of the South Scottish farmers who moved into the area during the depression. The Kerr's had a good herd of Ayrshire Cattle and sold milk, I think to the Co-op as we did. 3 daughters live locally.

Now back to Stapleford Lane.

1. Coddington Moor was the first farm on the right, with a substantial house but rather poor land. Colonel and Mrs Thorpe lived there. The Thorpe family had been the owners of most of the village until 1918, the eldest son John Somerled was killed in the First World War. Col. Harold Thorpe farmed at Coddington Moor he was married to Dorothy Tallents; the Tallents family lived in Coddington House. The Colonel's efforts at farming were rather dilettante to put it mildly. The place was greatly livened up when it became a hostel for Women's Land Army in the war and there was much social life for a time. After the war the moor was sold to Capt. & Mrs Cummings who had a herd of Guernsey cattle, they got more land and were much more successful than the Thorpe's had been. The rest of the Parish along Stapleford Lane, some I think being owned by the Thorpe's but much under the control of the Forestry Commission.

Back to the Plough and down Drove Lane.

1. First farm on the left was Hall Farm, my home. Typical mixed, about 12-15 cows, some milk retailed, some to Nottingham Co-op, beef cattle, about 6 horses 30 sheep, poultry, a few pigs, corn, sugar beet etc. The house largely built out of Coddington Limestone, the source of which is unknown to me might be of interest to find out, there is a field called stone pits on the farm, which had a little old quarry but there were several old cottages built of this material including one up Balderton Lane near the mill.

When the Hall was in its heyday and the Thorpe's were the wealthy estate owners and squires Hall Farm was the home farm for the estate and was managed together with Dairy Manor Farm by Mr Ross, father of the previously mention Mr G. A. Ross. There was a slaughter house where Aberdeen Angus bullocks from the Thorpe Scottish estate were killed for the Hall, much of the granary had shafting and belt drives for barn machinery, there was a threshing set and steam engine for driving equipment.

2. Round the corner onto the Green, what is now The Inn on the Green, occupied in my youth by Mr James Hollingworth senior who farmed Manor Dairy Farm with his sons Fred, James and Billy. The malt kiln was in the 1920s and my father used to talk of malt being delivered by horse and cart into the Vale of Belvoir, quite a trip at 3-4 miles an hour. Manor Dairy Farm

was of course noted for the leading herds of British Friesian cattle and they had a large retail business in Albert Street in Newark managed by Mr James Hollingworth's son in law.

- 3. Along Drove Lane for about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile are two grass lanes known as the cross lanes, one on the right led to the house recently occupied by Mr and Mrs Baden Troop. This was just farmland until the war when an army camp was set up there to maintain searchlight batteries, at one time this got quite big and a brick bathhouse was built which served the foundation for Baden's house. Most of the land down there was farmed by us or Hollingworth's, I think, if my memory serves me right that John Barton, Bill Phillips and Fred Tysoe were serving there or in the R.A.F. and married Coddington girls and stayed in the village.
- 4. The cross lane on the left led to a small farm, Drove Lane Farm, which had lost most of its land to the aerodrome. Latterly it was farmed by Wilf Richardson as a pig farm, he collected swill from army camps, restaurants etc. and actually lived in Newark. This farm was approached by a rough track, very isolated and must have been a grim place in the winter.
- 5. Back on Drove Lane the next farm on the right is Drove Farm, formerly Drove Cottage, now Mr Allen's, then farmed by Dick Slack, a smallish farm, mixed.
- 6. I am not sure where the Parish boundaries are and the next two may be in Langford or Winthorpe Parishes. Follow Drove Lane for about a 1/3 mile there is a sharp left hand bend, a track to the right leads to Langford Moor, a lonely but substantial farm, in my youth farmed by Mr Todd mainly arable.
- 7. 300 yards further up Drove Lane on the right is Lingspot Farm, mixed but substantial, farmed by George Taylor of Brough, I think much of the land must have taken for the aerodrome.

Back to the Plough and up the bypass towards Newark and on to Newark Road

- 1. After ½ mile on the left was a dairy farm run by Ted Black, he owned property in Newark and sold milk there, again he lost land to the R.A.F.
- 2. The drive to the Hall was on the right. In my day the Hall had been demolished but the old walled garden was run as a market garden by Freddie Boor who sold his produce from a motorbike and sidecar.
- 3. Again down the Hall drive was Beaconfield Farm, fairly substantial holding but isolated, occupied by the Clark's as a dairy farm and later by Peter Hutchinson.

4. Next farm in that direction was on the left where the A1 now is, an ex-pub known as Catch-em-Inn. It was a dairy farm kept by an oldish man, Arthur Black, commonly known as "**Waddingtabs**" from his habit of always having his ears stuffed with cotton wool; he sold milk in Newark from a pony and trap. He was succeeded by Harry Davies until the A.1 bypass was built.

Back to the Plough and the village centre. Up what we used to call Ducky Lane.

- 1. The first farm was Sunnyside farm, the Kirton's, Derick and John know far more about it.
- 2. Next to it on the left was Manor Farm. The Simpson family had this and a small butchers shop before rationing came in, again a mixed farm.
- 3. Across the road was Charity Farm farmed by Harry Walster and rented from the Coddington United Charity, his land was miles away down Drove Lane and Stapleford Lane, very inconvenient. Harry was also a pig killer for the village. How many of these small farmers managed a living I cannot understand.

Next to the Manor Farm was the Pinfold, but I cannot remember it being used and behind Manor Farm was a cottage known as the Dovecote, which I believe had been a dovecote many years ago when pigeons were a useful source of meat in the winter.

Up the hill, past the old school was the business of the Hough brothers, not farmers but vital to farms, the Blacksmiths shop was there and Hough's did threshing, haulage, timber felling etc. Good engineers and practical men.

Up Balderton Lane was the empire of the Daybell family, descendants of Charles Daybell.

- 1. Vale Farm, now Martin Handbury's, was occupied by Martin's grandfather, Harold Handbury and his wife, Mary who was a Daybell. This was home to a dairy herd.
- 2. Next was a house and buildings (The Homestead) opposite the council houses, occupied by Ted Daybell.
- 3. The 3rd Daybell Farm (Hill Farm) was further on the left occupied by old Mrs Daybell and Frank and George Daybell, here were sheep and beef and a very well run arable farm, mainly managed by Frank.
- 4. Just past the lane end to Hill Farm was the Coddington Mill. In my day it was occupied by Sam Lee, a mixed holding, not very big but they had 27 acres belonging to Coddington United Charity. I cannot remember the mill

being worked by wind but some corn was ground for animal feed using a stationery engine in my youth.

5. On the opposite side of the road was Hilltop Farm right on the brow of the hill with a substantial house and again a mixed holding. I think someone called Robinson had farmed it hence Robinson's Hill, but someone called Atkins had it, later it passed to Daybell's and eventually the land to White's.

Another agricultural enterprise was Walter Hall's. He started getting wood from Stapleford Woods and selling it for fire wood etc. He had various bits of land all over and at one time got up to 6 horses and later a tractor, he was uncle to the Kirton's and Bernard Tilley so they all know all about him.

I make this somewhere about 25 holdings and just over 50 people were employed plus many who did jobs or casual work servicing the farms. What a contrast to today!







Our Speakers' programme so far has been well received with glowing comments about Chris King's talk on old buildings in Southwell in September followed by a most enjoyable evening of assorted archive films in October about Rural Life. Topics ranged from following a shepherd on his day's work (with a nearly frozen lamb being revived in the Aga oven!) seeing young and old helping with the hay crop, skating on a frozen pond, people crossing a risky-looking rope bridge over a stream and one about a village show which had us all laughing at the children's antics in various races – the egg & spoon, sack race, 3 legged race etc.

In order to try and reach a wider audience we have moved slightly further into the wide world with a Facebook page and postings onto "Nextdoor Coddington". Do take a look.

Many of you will remember Revd. Wright who was our vicar for many years. His son got in touch and has passed on some interesting papers that his father had saved, we are slowly working our way through them, where appropriate we will pass them on to Notts Archive for safe keeping.

Several members are transcribing the more recent marriage records for our archive. A copy of the transcribed parish records will be at the church in due course.

I thought I would add a bit of further information about topics in Alan Geeson's recollections elsewhere in this newsletter.

Firstly, houses changing names can be a challenge! We believe that 'Rosealan' was later named 'West View' and is now 16 Balderton Lane.

Sadly, Hall Farm (see first photo) has now gone which is a great shame – we understand it was not listed as such but recorded as a building of local interest and note; it was probably the last house standing that was built of local Coddington stone. It was on Main Street next to the inn on the Green where the close named Hall Farm now is. Oddly, the brick built barn was saved and converted into one of the houses.

Lastly, Alan refers to two grass lanes on Drove Lane known as the cross lanes. This is just onto the airfield side of the A17, the northern one still leads the bungalow, the southern one is still grassed and is part of the field but you can see the hedge lines (see second photo); we have heard of it being referred to as Waites Lane since it used to lead to their property.

Seasonal safety tips

As the festive season is now upon us, a timely reminder that opportunist thieves will be preparing to take any advantage to steal goods. With us being busy getting ready for the celebrations we are perhaps not as security conscious as we usually are.

Protect your home

- Make your home look occupied. Burglars do not want to be seen or disturbed. Convincing them that someone is inside is undoubtedly the best deterrent.
- Make sure that you lock all outside doors and windows and, if you have a burglar alarm, make sure it is set (even if you only pop out for a few minutes).
- Use automatic timer-switches and low energy bulbs to turn your lights on when it's dark. You can convince any potential burglar that you are at home by having plug-in timer controls for lamps.
- If you are out you could also arrange for your curtains/blinds to be closed in your absence for lamps.
- A plug-in timer for the radio would make it sound as if you're at home. Tune the radio to a station that has more talking than music.
- Keep Christmas gifts out of sight until last thing on Christmas Eve and if you 'hide' or store larger items such as bicycles in your sheds garages or outbuildings, make sure they are secure. Record the frame numbers of new cycles and the serial numbers of new electrical equipment for future reference.
- Remember also after all those boxes have been emptied on the festive morning don't then go and leave those empty boxes outside on display next to your bins as this only advertises new goods you have receiveddispose of packing carefully

Protect your car

 Car crime is often thought to be committed by sophisticated high-tech criminals. In reality most of the crimes are opportunistic. Thieves simply wander around looking for any item left on show and then steal it by smashing a window. Similarly, older cars with no additional security devices are stolen using basic techniques, whilst more modern cars tend to be stolen by first stealing the keys.

- Always keep your vehicle locked (including windows) even if you only leave if for a few seconds.
- Get into the habit of not leaving any items in your car. The cost of replacing a broken window is often far more than the value of goods stolen. If you can, take your belongings with you, rather than leaving them in the car or leave them at home.
- Don't leave keys in a coat pocket and leave the coat unattended. And be aware of dropping keys into bags or briefcases where they might remain visible

Have fun but stay safe

- Organise how you are getting home from a party or night out at the beginning of the evening and arrange to travel home with a friend.
- On a night out always leave your drink with someone you trust; don't share drinks and never accept a drink from a stranger. Don't get so drunk that you don't know what you're doing or where you are. Stay in a group with your friends and avoid walking home alone.
- Always use licensed taxi firms and never accept a lift from a stranger.
- Avoid carrying unnecessary amounts of cash and watch where you leave your purse/handbag.
- If you have no option but to walk home alone, stick to well-lit main roads and avoid shorts cuts. Let someone know you are on your way home, what route you are taking and how long you will be. Walk confidently and avoid wearing earphones which could prevent you from hearing somebody approaching.
- On public transport try to sit close to the driver or attendant, avoiding an empty upper deck on buses or empty carriages on trains.

Road Safety

- During the winter months ensure your car is ready for the season change in weather - are tyres, brakes, windscreens, wiper blades and windows free from defects and clean?
- Be aware of changing road conditions; don't put yourself and others at risk.
- Drink driving don't risk it, if you are out partying be aware of your alcohol consumption.


