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#### Chairman's Report - June 2017

We have an active, hard working and committed Parish Council of 10 members. However in March Mrs. Mary Carver after many years of dedicated service retired. On behalf of the Council I would like to thank her for her commitment and work over many years and welcome Mrs. Kerry Hamilton from April 2017.

Part of the life of this village is entering the Best Kept Village Competition; perhaps the custom is a relic from our historical roots. The Victorian, Thomas Ordoyno was a respected nurseryman, seedsman and author of Flora Nottinghamiensis` A Systematic Arrangement of Plants Growing in Nottinghamshire. (1807) He lived in the village at Beaconfield House and he is believed to have planted Yew Tree Wood.

He was a prominent figure in the community. The yew tree hedge, in Beaconsfield Drive once surrounded a fountain, which is a remnant of the estate. His son lived in the farm at what is now Coddington House.

It is that time again, and we have entered the competition and look forward to seeing the village looking tidy, clean and beautiful. Thanks to Councillor J. Lee for providing clean up support on the C208 and Drove Lane.

During the competition (June-July) the judges will be able to see how much we care for our village by the continued commitment of the entire village.

You may have noticed that the Millennium Garden is in the process of refurbishment. Thanks to Coddington Garden Club and volunteers, who have undertaken the project funded by this Council. If you have a spare hour on the second Sunday in the month 10.00 am May to September to help the group by tidying up, it would be greatly appreciated.

The Council hopes that the bench at the Millennium Garden will be replaced in time. This was damaged last year and there had been a few problems in replacing it, which have now been resolved.

The Parish Council held the Annual Parish Meeting on April 20<sup>th</sup> at the Village Hall. The Chairman of the Parish Council and voluntary groups reported on their yearly activities and finances. Questions to the Chairman included the grass cutting and road sweeping. The grass cutting contract was put out to tender in 2015 and 2016 as it is a legal duty for the Council to seek tenders for any contractual work. Three quotations were received for the 2017-8 season, references were taken up and the contract awarded in 2017.

The road sweeping question was passed on to Councillor J. Lee as this was a matter for NSDC. The road sweeper now has made two appearances in the village. Cllr. J. Lee hopes that they will be able to come in June/July. Groups reporting were: Village Hall, Community Centre, United Charities and the School. An open forum followed. Topics included choice of secondary schools, reversal of primary school admission rules, the expansion of Dare to incorporate awareness of on-line grooming, and the dangers of crossing the road at The Plough crossroads, due to speeding traffic on the C208, and increased number of cars using Main Street as a cut through. Councillor B. Allen asked for safety measures at the crossroads of Drove Lane and the A17.

For many years the late Councillor Vincent Dobson argued for reduction of speed limits on the C208. Councillor M. Dobson has continued to argue for improved safety measures both on the C208 and at the crossroads, but commented that it was unlikely that the County Council would take further safety measures..

Councillor Parrett reported on the NSPCC meeting, which was a follow up to the DARE presentation held at school in March.

Within the precept the Council sets aside money to donate to voluntary organisations within the village. The Council is proud to support DARE at the school.

If there are any voluntary organisations that feel they can benefit from this commitment please contact the Parish Clerk.

I can give you some information on the further developments of the issue of the footpath and gravel extraction.

There will be a public meeting on July 5<sup>th</sup>, at the Village Hall, 8pm to discuss further options for the Beaconsfield footpath. This will be attended by Mr. N. Lewis, CC Footpath Officer and CC Mrs. M. Dobson. I hope you will attend this meeting to comment on further developments.

The enquiry of the proposed gravel excavation at Coddington will begin in late June. The Chairman and CC Mrs. M. Dobson will represent the Parish Council, with Councillor Mr. D. Armstrong representing Cage on July 4<sup>th</sup> at County Hall. They all are named speakers. However there is no guarantee that the Inspector will call us.

The drains at the junction of the C208 and A1 slip road have continued to be a problem. There has been an improvement but there is still an occasional offensive smell. The Council has met with NSDC, Environmental Agency, Greenfields and Trent Drainage Board. We are determined to pursue this issue until it is resolved

Unfortunately there always will be inconsiderate parking within any residential area and we are no exception. CC Dobson and the Parish

Council have talked to the Police on speeding and parking issues at Thorpe Oaks.

Inconsiderate parking is a specific issue, with partial footpath parking causing inconvenience and sometimes danger for pedestrians, resulting in notices and visits.

CC Mrs M. Dobson reported to the meeting that there was to be another traffic monitoring session at Thorpe Oaks including the use of mobile cameras. Road markings on the bend of Lancaster Road would be re-painted.

You can contact the Parish Council or your County Councillor Mrs. M. Dobson to discuss any Highways matter with the Police or at the Safer Neighbourhood Group meetings. Please contact Councillor C. Gangel and Councillor Mrs. W. Parrett for information of the Safer Neighbourhood Group meetings where this issue is an active concern.

In the past resident groups have worked hard to reduce traffic violations in the village, mainly speeding and lorries ignoring the weight restrictions. Unfortunately these groups stopped. Councillor Mr. C. Gangel has organised the setting up of traffic monitoring for speed and abuse of weight restrictions within the village. My thanks to him as the village has long suffered from speeding traffic and inappropriate weighted lorries. I hope that this action will prove to be a deterrent. Please contact Councillor Gangel if you are interested in helping. Training is available.

You can still report lorries breaking the weight limit by contacting the County Council website.

Our thanks to District Councillor Lee for financial support for the hiring of the equipment.

The Council had been asked to investigate what could be done about the shortage of burial spaces in the churchyard and the rule of village residency for burial. Unfortunately these matters are at the discretion of the vicar and the Diocese. We would be happy to include this information in the CVN.

The Council has been asked to publicise the following information, this is especially relevant for residents who back onto any fields with horses, (some residents at Old Hall Gardens, Newark Road, Ordoyno Drive Beaconsfield Drive and Parklands). Throwing grass clippings into the field does not help feed the horses rather it is a very dangerous action as it gives them colic. Two young ponies have already died from colic, which is a very painful death.

Walkers across fields with horses in should always use the footpath and

not cut the wire to make themselves a way through to the farmer's field. Dog excrement is still an issue; one horse has had to have vet treatment due to the acid burning under the hoof.

Philip Hadfield, NSDC Environmental Projects Officer has told the Council that the recycling bins need to be removed from The Plough car park due to redevelopment. The Council has discussed possibilities for re-siting the bins, but was unable to find a suitable alternative, due to residents' dislike of close proximity to the bins. The Council is continuing to look for an alternative arrangement.

The County Council looks after the verges and footpaths on the C208. Mr. Mike Keeling NCC Officer has told us that whilst work by ViaEM to widen the overgrown footway between the Stapleford Lane roundabout and Willowdene had been booked for the coming year, there was no guarantee that it would successfully compete for funding against similar requests from other areas.

CC Mrs. Dobson reported:

concerns of the Council of the danger of the staggered crossroads junction of Drove Lane and the A17 had been logged again with a request for additional lighting. Any action would come through recommendation by the Accident Team.

NCC officers had visited the C208 cross roads at The Plough and observed only 4 children crossing for school. There is a pedestrian refuge in the road and visibility is good. NCC has decided that no further investigation is warranted.

Requests for further traffic counts will be delayed until the STW works end. The new link road may help.

There is a lot of information in this report, which I hope you will find useful and informative. Further details can be found on the Coddington Parish Council website.

#### 150th. Anniversary of Coddington Bells

In January 2016 an irresistible force met an irresistible force in the guise of Isobel Turner and Derek Tysoe (neither are immovable objects) when they had a difference of opinion about certain dates relating to All Saints' Church bells.

To cut a long story short: Following some research by Isobel, they were agreed that January 8th. 2016 was, indeed, the50th. anniversary of the first peal on the bells, but also that May 2017 would see the 150th. anniversary of the opening of the original 5 bells (they were augmented to 6 in 1965).

So on May 10th. a peal of Surprise Minor in 7 methods was duly rung to commemorate this event, the details of which follow below.

# FRIDAY, MAY 10, 1867.

CODDINGTON .- New BELLS .- Two years have nearly past, since a desire was expressed in our columns that a suitable peal of bells might presently be added to the other new fittings in the restored church at Cod-dington. We are glad now to be able to chronicle the fulfilment of this desire, and we have received notice from a correspondent that the peal of five bells, recently placed in the church tower by Mr. Taylor, the wellknown bell-founder at Loughborough, will be rung for the first time on Monday next, May 13th ; on which occasion the ringers belonging to the Newark Company will kindly lend their services, so that the bells may be rung to the best advantage. The inauguration will take place at 11 a.m., when an opening service will be held in the parish church. It is to be hoped that strangers from the neighbourhood, as well as the parishioners, will be induced to attend. The church-wardens will be in readiness at a quarter before eleven to show visitors into seats. At the clese of the service a collection will be made on behalf of the Church Bells Restoration Fund, in which there at present exists a deficiency of more than £100. Through the kindness of Mr. Thorpe, the Newark and the Coddington Change Ringers will dine together at the Plough Inn ; and in the course of the evening musical selections will be performed on the handbells for the amusement of the villagers.

### Village Hall news

The first item to report is the AGM at which Bernard Allen was once again voted in as Chairman with Mike Cox as Vice-Chairman, David Turner as Secretary. Derek Rigby resigned as Treasurer for health reasons but is willing to take up the reins once again when he has recovered so we are looking for a temporary Treasurer – anyone able to help please contact any of the above. We were also very pleasantly surprised to find the hall had made a record surplus; due in no small part to Jane Hedge ably keeping the bookings under control and fortunately she agreed to keep up the good work for another year.

Bookings are looking good; as well as the regular weekly/monthly bookings we once again hosted the annual Bee Keeping course (already taken place this year and booked for next!) and two War Gaming weekends (again booked for this year also). As well as the 'public' bookings, we have a few 'private' bookings such as ballroom and Irish dance. The latter includes practice time for 9 year old Shay Brunning who you may have seen featuring in the Advertiser as he holds no less than 5 National Champion titles – he is not eligible for World Champion until he is 11 so fingers crossed for him.

Our plans for the new toilet block are progressing slowly, we are currently interviewing people to draw up plans to submit for planning permission, which we need before we can do fundraising for the project.

Maintenance mornings have proceeded on an irregular basis (contact Dave Turner on 708781 if you'd like to help) due to holidays and hall bookings. The latest big task is laying paving along the east side of the hall to enable easier access to the building and the new garden – which is also progressing slowly. We have installed part of the new "feature" in the middle – which has doubtless caused comments among passers-by – as it is a large rough cube of concrete! It will act as the base for another more decorative cube of stone in due course when the path is finished. Both items are part of Coddington history, this base concrete cube represents one of the few relics we have in the village now of RAF Winthorpe, Bernard Allen kindly donated it from remainders on his land. The finished "feature" will be dedicated to two founder members of Coddington History Group; Mick Lord and Derick Kirton.

#### The Tallents Family of Coddington House

Godfrey Tallents (1848 – 1917) was the second son of Godfrey & Ellen Tallents, Godfrey was born 7th June 1848 in Newark. He was senior partner in Tallents & Co. Solicitors. Godfrey was solicitor to James Thorpe of Coddington Hall and when James Thorpe's mother Ann (who lived in Coddington House) died on the 22<sup>nd</sup> June 1877, Godfrey Tallents rented the property and shortly afterwards moved into the house. Godfrey had a distinguished military career and had the rank of Major of the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion Sherwood Foresters. On the 7<sup>th</sup> June 1882 Godfrey married Eliza Caroline Pardoe Matthews and there was a major celebration in the village on the 28<sup>th</sup> July 1882 when the newly weds came to live in Coddington House. Coddington House and gardens were purchased from the executors of John Somerled Thorpe in 1918.Godfrey & Eliza had three children: -The last member of the family to live in Coddington House was Eliza who died on the 20<sup>th</sup> August 1954 the house was then sold to John & Joyce Mumby.

Godfrey Edward born 31<sup>st</sup> July 1883, like his father he was a military man; he saw service with the Lancashire Fusiliers in the 1914 – 18 war. In 1916 Capt. Godfrey Edward was awarded the D.S.O. for gallantry during in the Gallipoli landing, where he was dangerously wounded. On the18th April 1923 he married Marjorie Peel Nuttall and they had two children. He retired from the army in 1951 with the rank of Colonel and came back to live in Coddington House before moving to the Old Vicarage on the junction of Main Street and Sleaford Road where he lived until his death on 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1967, aged 83. He was President of Coddington Cricket club for many years and an ardent supporter.

Their third child Dorothy Marion was born on the 1st September 1888; on the 12th July 1909 she married Harold Thorpe at Coddington church. Dorothy and Harold had three daughters all born in Coddington:

Margaret (Betty) Anne baptised Newark P.C. on 20-4-1911

Joan born circa 1913

Bridget Mary (Biddy) born 6th November 1915, she married Captain Michael Nicholson.

Biddy died on the 28th April 2007 and is buried in Coddington churchyard.

In World War 1 Harold saw service in Gallipoli, Palestine and Salonika. In 1914 he was in command of A-Squadron of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. His second-in-command, brother-in-law Hugh Tallents, took over the squadron at Gallipoli when Harold was promoted. By November 1915 Harold had become temporary Lieut. Colonel and was Commanding Officer of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry.

In January 1917 Harold won the D.S.O. and in November [4] was mentioned in despatches. He was then 'of Coddington Hall, and a member of the firm of J Thorpe & Sons, Maltsters'.

At the 1918 sale of his brother's estate (John Somerled):

Harold bought lots 26 and 27 (for £420, 12a of arable land where S Parkes was the tenant), which he transferred to his brother Gervase. Harold's seal and signature is on many of the conveyances of village properties sold in the 1918 Estate Sale, along with that of his brothers and sisters.

In 1923 Colonel Harold, J.P and Dorothy lived at Coddington Moor Estate, where they farmed.

For many years, Harold was a Churchwarden at All Saints, Coddington P.C.

Harold was made a Magistrate in the early 1900's.On 12th April 1937 he was elected Chairman of the Newark [County] Quarter Sessions, and in 1940 he was Chairman of the Board of Magistrates. At an unknown time, he disposed of the family malting business and subsequently became a Director of Tully & Sons.

In the 1950s Lt. Colonel Harold D.S.O. T.D. J.P. had moved from Coddington Moor to The Old Vicarage, and his telephone number was 28. (Later his brother-in-law Godfrey Edward Tallents also moved to The Old Vicarage.) Dorothy died in July 1965 in Wales but is buried in the "Thorpe" tomb in Coddington churchyard.

The second son Hugh was born on the 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1885; he was educated at Preparatory School, Eton & New College Oxford, he joined the family firm of solicitors. Having graduated at Hythe, he served in the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry and in August 1914 he was promoted to Captain. In the 1814 – 18 war he saw service in Egypt, Gallipoli, Macedonia & Palestine. In August 1914 he was second in command of a Squadron, and in Gallipoli was placed in command of it on the promotion of Colonel Harold Thorpe (who later married his sister Dorothy).

#### D.S.O. for Major Hugh Tallents

"Major Hugh Tallents, who has been awarded the D.S.O.; is the second son of Mrs Tallents and the late Mr Godfrey Tallents, of Coddington. For many years past he has held a commission in the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry. He came up with the regiment on embodiment in August 1914, and took part in Dardenelles campaign, the evacuation and the subsequent operations on Eastern battlefields. Although his many friends in Newark will regret the cause of his present stay in the town (the death of his respected father), they will be pleased to be able to personally congratulate him on his well merited honour. It will be remembered that Major Tallents, at a recent function in the Town Hall, made a very favourable impression when he addressed a few words to the company at the invitation of the Mayor. Major Talent's elder brother (Major G. Tallents, Lancashire Fusiliers) and his brother in law (Liet-Colonel H. Thorpe) had previously been awarded the D.S.O.". Copy of an article in the Newark advertiser 13<sup>th</sup> February 1918

In February 1918 he was released from the army and elected Town Clerk of Newark on the death of his uncle William Edward Tallents on the 11 February 1918. Capt. Hugh Tallents M.A. B.C.L. D.S.O. Solicitor & Commissioner for Oaths, Town Clerk, Clerk for the Borough of Newark, Registrar of the Borough Court of record, Clerk to the Commissioners of Taxes, of the Magnus Charity, The Newark Navigation Commissioners & the Commissioners for Sewers, Steward of the Manors of Crowle, Edwinstowe & Ilkeston. The London Gazette of 4<sup>th</sup> Jan. 1924 includes the award of the T.D. to Major Hugh Tallents D.S.O. of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry.

In October 1928 he was promoted to Lt. Colonel. In April 1939 for World War 11 he was Food Executive Officer, Fuel Controller for Newark & District.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> February 1946 at Farndon Parish Church he married Nancy Elizabeth Beevor and they had a son John Richard who lives in Farndon in the family house.

On the 1<sup>st</sup> January 1970, at the age of 84 Hugh retired from Tallents & Co. and in the following May also resigned as Clerk to the Newark Navigation Commissioners, a post he held for 52 years. The Tallents had been Clerk to the Commissioners for 156 years: - William Edward Tallents 1814 – 1835, Godfrey Tallents 1835 – 1877, William Edward Tallents 1877 – 1918 & Hugh Tallents 1918 – 1970.

Town Clerk duties: - One of the duties of the Town Clerk is to proclaim the new monarch to the people of Newark. The Proclamation Stool is in Newark Town Hall museum it has Brass engravings; the Town Clerk proclaimed the new King/Queen at the Town Hall, Beaumont Cross and the top of "Beast Hill" outside the Ossington. The proclamations by the Tallents family were: - William Edward Tallents: - George 1V, 11 February 1820 & William V1 on the 9<sup>th</sup> July 1830

Godfrey Tallents: - Edward VII on the 26<sup>th</sup> January 1901, & George V, 10<sup>th</sup> May 1911

Hugh Tallents: - Edward VIII on the 23 January 1936, & George VI, 14<sup>th</sup> February 1936.

Hugh Tallents also escorted King George V and Queen Mary on the Royal visit to Newark on the 9<sup>th</sup> July 1928.

Hugh's recreations were: -

Hunting: - Since a very young boy he was a keen horse rider and from 1919 for nearly 35 years he was Hon. Secretary to the Blankney Hunt.

Shooting: - From a very young age he had a gun and even at the age of 88 he was shooting at Ossington Estate.

Fishing:

Cycling: - As a child he had several bicycles and rather than using a motor cycle or car he would cycle to work in Newark originally from Coddington then Farndon.

Motor Vehicles: - In about 1900 he had his first motorcycle and by the time all vehicles had to have a licence on the 1<sup>st</sup> January 1904 he was on to his third motorcycle registration AL 32 (the

32<sup>nd</sup> vehicle licensed in Notts.). He was a very avid motorist and his first car was a ???? Eventually he purchased a Bentley; which he kept for many years.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1978 he died at home Farndon Lodge aged 93, having been a solicitor for 60 years. Hugh was buried in the family grave at Coddington.

Hurray! At long last we have been able to put the display board with the results of our Graveyard Survey in the church graveyard (on the rear of the notice board at the south gate). Many thanks to all who helped with the survey, transcribing, research,

construction and installation of the frame.

The alphabetical list of those with memorials in the graveyard together with the accompanying plan should mean that visitors can more easily locate graves. We installed the board in the only feasible place but (as we realised) it is not as obvious as we would have liked, being hidden behind the church notice from one side and behind a yew tree



from the other – however we hope to alleviate the situation with a direction sign.

We have come to the end of our speaker season which will recommence on the third Thursday in September. We've had some interesting speakers this year. In January Peter Hammond related the history of Claypole Workhouse – and the Allens added to recent history by showing us a photo of the building after it had been converted into "ordinary" accommodation when they lived there for a while. In February archaeologist Matt Beresford most ably told us of the community project exploring Roman Southwell, Then in March Richard Gaunt gave a most interesting talk of the detective work involved in discovering the identity of the artist of an anonymous sketchbook – which turned out to be Emma Wilmot 'the forgotten artist of the Victorian Dukeries'; female artists were relatively unusual at that period. Lastly we heard the fascinating story of how the Boots Company came to be founded by Jesse Boot. All excellent talks.

In the March CVN I put in 2 mystery photos from our collection. Well, 50% success! The scouts are identified as Max (unknown surname), Peter Chamberlain, Stuart Robinson, Chris Philips. Peter was recognised by a reader and his phone number passed to me; he supplied the names and said "It was taken at a wolf cub camp at Sutton on Trent about 1970. We are in our senior scout uniforms and all about 19 years old. Can you spot the old bell tent and wolf cubs in the back right of the picture?"

#### Internet Safety

A Personal Message from Coddington School Head Teacher, Mrs Caputa

This is a subject that is very close to my heart, especially following the events that happened in our School in 2015.

During a police investigation and as a result of our own research we uncovered a whole range of issues that our children face.

It is so important that you face this as a family and openly discuss the subject with your children. Some of the recommendations are that primary children do not have access to Instagram or Facebook (age limit is 13 years old), that they do not have unsupervised free surfing of the internet without a parental control system being used, webcams are disabled unless supervised, laptops are not left open (the webcam can be operated remotely by a third party) and that parents monitor this effectively at the risk of making themselves unpopular.

The table on the following pages lists the main risks to children as highlighted by the NSPCC, and some of the issues we have dealt with in school:

As well as awareness raised by the DARE programme, Coddington School will be introducing awareness sessions to the curriculum from September.

#### In summary, we advise you to:

- 1. Please observe all age limits.
- 2. Please do not let your children have devices in their bedrooms overnight this includes phones.
- 3. Disable webcams or cover with a plaster, especially if you allow your children to have them in their rooms.
- Think very carefully about allowing your child to have a smart phone before they reach secondary age.
- Monitor their online activity very carefully. Delve deeper to check they aren't hiding anything from you including keeping an eye on download history and programme settings.
- 6. Regularly monitor all chat threads and discuss issues as they arise e.g. what to do about bad language.
- 7. Regularly sift through friend lists and delete suspicious individuals.

### Annual Report of Coddington Trust Fund 2016

During 2016 the Trust Fund received an income of just over £18,000 from the rents of the lands and the Almshouses owned by the Trust. Over £8,000 was spent on maintaining the Almshouses and grounds during 2016 and a further £3350 was spent on relief in need. The Trust Fund continues to fund the Christmas lunch for Coddington Senior Citizens and to support the Collingham Rural Advice Centre, which enables the residents of Coddington to receive free advice should they be in need of it. Details of the Coddington Trust Fund and CRAC can be found in the Village News, together with how to apply for relief in need

In 2017 the Trust Fund anticipates spending further money on the maintenance of the Almshouses. We would also welcome applications from individuals for relief in need. If you know anyone in Coddington who is struggling to cope with the cost of visiting relatives in Kings Mill Hospital, after the withdrawal of the free bus, please encourage them to apply to the Trust Fund for help.
