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Chairman's Report - June 2018

This is my first report as Chairman of Coddington Parish Council following the Annual Parish Council Meeting on May 3rd 2018.

My thanks to Linda Cox for her sterling work carried out as Chairman, particularly on the increasing number of planning applications for development in the village. She continues as Vice-Chairman, and as Chairman of Newark Health Consultative Group.

The Annual Parish Meeting in April was well attended by members of the Parish, with valuable reports from Village groups:

- Coddington Community Centre Association
- Coddington Village Hall Charity Trust
- Coddington Trust Fund
- Coddington C of E Primary and Nursery School

Issues raised by members of the Parish during the open forum included several to be followed up by the Parish Council or Parishioners:

- Parking on the road immediately outside The Plough will continue to be raised with the Police at the Safer Neighbourhood Group.
- Concern about safety at the staggered crossroads of the A17 and Drove Lane will be brought to the attention of the County Councillor.
- An increase in the amount of litter in dykes extra hours and equipment for the Village Handyman will be considered.
- Dog mess appears to be increasing photographs can be submitted as evidence, and the dog warden will monitor if offences are committed at regular times of day.
- A one-way system for Brownlow's Hill was suggested evidence and support from residents will be needed to campaign for this.
- The lack of visible progress on a replacement Post Office was of concern, and will stay on the Parish Council agenda.
- The Parish Council will follow up its plan for a WWI commemorative display case with Coddington Church.

The Parish Council has purchased its own speed gun following successful trials with loaned equipment. Led by Councillor Chris Gangel, volunteers regularly monitor and report speeding traffic to the Police – the aim is to make our roads safer for all users by encouraging

driving within the speed limits, and more volunteers to help would be appreciated.

The Parish Council continues to support Coddington Against Gravel Extraction. The last round of consultation on the New Minerals Plan finished in mid-January, and none of the objections made have yet been published. However, the next version of the Local Minerals Plan, including Coddington as a proposed new large quarry, is expected to be out for public consultation during the summer.

You may know that the Parish Council purchased and maintains with the Community Centre a defibrillator installed at the side of the Community Centre building. If you come across someone who may have had a cardiac arrest, it's vital to call 999 and start CPR – the emergency services will provide you with the access code to the defibrillator if it is needed. These types of defibrillators are often known as public access defibrillators (PAD) as anyone can use them in an emergency. You shouldn't be afraid of using a defibrillator if someone has had a cardiac arrest, but the first action should be to call 999 so the patient's symptoms can be assessed.

Coddington has again been entered for the Best Kept Village competition. The judging is expected to run across most of June. The village often does well – please support it again with your excellent gardens, in village tidiness generally, and by helping your Council with the litter in the run up to judging.

There has been a significant increase in the number of planning applications for new houses in Coddington over the past year, with several extra Parish Council meetings arranged to allow residents' views to be heard. Please keep an eye out for planning items in meeting agendas on noticeboards and Facebook – attendance at District Council Planning Committee meetings by residents is also encouraged to provide valuable support to representations by the Parish Council.

OPEN CHURCH ROTAS

The English Heritage Lottery Grant received towards the repair of the chancel, nave, and south aisle roofs requires the church to be open for 40 days per annum, and 1 day is equivalent to 6 hours.

Being open for services/events does <u>not</u> count towards this requirement. Consequently, we are looking to extend our small team of friendly and enthusiastic volunteers to facilitate this requirement.

All Saints' is your village Church, a beautiful and historic community building, here for all in the parish and beyond. But it needs looking after, and keeping open, and for this we need volunteers to help.

Could you lend a little of your time and talents for this?

The Open Church Rotas operate every Wednesdays 0900-1500, from the end of March to the end of September; one Friday per month 0930-1530, from May to September (inclusive); and one Saturday per month 0930-1530, from March to October (inclusive) i.e. this is <u>not</u> an all-year round commitment. Volunteers do not have to be church-goers and do not have to do this on their own.

The rotas are staffed by volunteers in 'one-hour slots' so there is flexibility to choose an hour to suit your other commitments, and it does not have to be a regular commitment.

This is an opportunity to spend an hour away from the hustle and bustle of life, where you could read/exchange/buy a book, knit, chat, spend a quiet hour with a friend, enjoy a cup of coffee or tea, or find out more about the history of the church and the village. It is also an opportunity to meet some interesting people who will visit the church from far afield and locally.

The PPG have been supporting the CMC in obtaining your feedback using the Friends and Family Test (FFT). Thank you to all who have participated, the feedback has enabled CMC to make some important changes. The results of the FFT tell us that 84.5% would recommend CMC.



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

Village Hall News

Sadly, all is fairly quiet on the new extension, negotiations between architects and the council proceed slowly – but hopefully, surely. Unfortunately we cannot begin the painstaking process of applying for grants until they have finished and have obtained estimates for the work.

Wall. Before we can build the extension, the wall between the Village and Scout Halls will have to be rebuilt as part of it is in poor condition and the remainder is without adequate foundations. This will cost about £15,000. We have made a joint application to the County Council's Local Improvement Scheme for half the cost and hope for a favourable response in June. The Scout Hall and Village Hall will have to provide the remaining money unless we can find other funding sources; please let us know if you can help in any way.

Chairs. Following the user consultation at the hall, we have selected the most popular choice and despite not yet having raised enough money, we have ordered the new chairs and the trolleys to hang them on. The rest of the money will need to be from general funds. We now need to replenish our funds since the building works will not all be covered by grants so are welcoming sponsorship of the new chairs, a suggested donation of £50 per chair would be extremely welcome - we have already two sponsored!

Village Ventures. The two music events in March and April were well attended and much enjoyed, there are no more until next "season" – from September 2018 to May 2019. Four of us attended the "Preview" meeting (the launch of the event listing for next time) with over 90 acts to select from. We have again requested three, but with no guarantee as to how many we get. However...

The Churchfitters have been independently booked for Sunday 14th October – get your tickets early, their previous 3 gigs at the hall have been sold out.

Maintenance mornings (generally on the first Monday of the month; contact Dave Turner on 708781 if you'd like to help) have continued when the weather permitted, the path to the north of the hall is underway using donated paving slabs – it is not a particularly visible area so the "freebies" were very welcome.

Peggy Harwood

1933 - 2018



It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of Peggy Harwood (nee Troop) in March. She will be very much missed by her family and all her friends in Coddington and Barnby, for her dedication to the church and contributions to the community.

Peggy was born at Moor Farm, Barnby in 1933, one of six children. After early years spent at Barnby Village School she learned secretarial skills at Newark Technical College and eventually became Office Manager at the Newark Advertiser. She and her husband Ken were married at Barnby Church in 1953 and moved to Folly Farm, Coddington in 1961.

Until Ken became ill, Peggy and Ken always cut the grass in the churchyard, and after Ken's death in 2003, Peggy continued to work tirelessly for All Saints' Church, in later years as volunteer verger, donating her fees back into church funds. She never missed a wedding, funeral or baptism and could always be relied on to make sure that the heating was switched on in good time for services. For the last 7 years, Peggy opened the church for the Wednesday coffee mornings throughout the summer from 9am to midday. Undeterred by the remoteness of her home, she was always available to open up the church for tradesmen and builders, sometimes as early as 6 o'clock in the morning, and if anyone wished to visit the church, she would be only too happy to organise it with them.

Her support and generosity were unfailing, providing the church with primroses for Mothering Sunday, oranges for Christingle, raffle prizes for events and a very generous donation towards the installation of the Church toilet. Peggy raised a lot of money for the church by potting up and selling plants, running her plant stall at the Summer Fair and in the church on Saturday mornings during the summer. She took great pride in her beautiful garden, which was always a riot of colour and a haven for wildlife, especially her favourite pheasant Charlie. The bird table was replenished several times a day and there was a special feeder for a woodpecker visiting from nearby Kelwick Woods.

Peggy's life revolved around the church, but she was also committed to doing her very best for the community. For over 25 years, she distributed and collected boxes for the Children's Society and also supported the Newark women's refuge. It is sad that she died so soon after Coddington, Balderton and Barnby became one benefice. Peggy worshipped at all three churches and she had looked forward to this change, saying that Coddington fitted better into the village group rather than being linked to Newark parishes. She always made sure that her friends had transport to church, medical appointments, shopping, etc. and even when she was receiving serious medical treatment herself, she continued with her church and community tasks. Many people have cause to be thankful for her

WW2 Memories

Bernard Allen My Memories of WW2

I was born in 1925 and my parents were Fred and Hilda Allen (their second child) at Odd House Farm, Claypole, Newark. I had four brothers Donald, Maurice, Trevor, Keith and a sister Jennifer. The relatively small mixed farm was located on the outskirts of the village. Dairy being the main enterprise, the hand milked cows were Lincoln Red cross Friesian, pigs:- 3 sows and followers, hens and geese. The majority of farmers had cows as they could easily sell their milk and it was their main income.

All the children went to the village school and it was here that we were all supplied with gas masks and we were shown how to wear them and from then on we had to carry them all the time until the war finished. I started to milk the cows when I was seven, in a morning before I went to school then after I returned home. As children the only present we got were clothes at Christmas, however our relations gave us toys:- Meccano set, Snakes and Ladders board game, playing cards.

Our house had no electricity, gas or water, there was a hand water pump in the kitchen which was supplied from an underground tank which collected rain water from the roof. We also had a water pump from a well in the yard to supply the farm animals. The earth toilet was at the bottom of the garden, the coal fired kitchen range was used for cooking, baking and had a small hot water tank, lighting was from paraffin lamps or candles. Just before the war started we had black out curtains on all the windows. Living on a farm meant no major food shortage as we could have a pig killed every year, plenty of rabbits and dad grew his own vegetables.

Dad did not have a tractor but a horse and for ploughing he borrowed a horse from one of our relations. Arthur Revill my grandfather in say 1930 was the first person to have a tractor in the village an American "Overtime", he used this on his farm and with his threshing machine and threshed for all the farmers in the village.

I left school aged 14 in 1939 I had to help Dad do the milking morning and night so I went to work 8:30 until 3:00 on George Wright's farm (one of our neighbours). Soon afterwards a local farmer Bill Scott was ill and went into an old folks home so I had to milk and look after his cows. He died when I was 15 so I went to work for 2 years at George Arnold's farm, this was great as Mr Arnold had the first milking machine in the village for his 45 cows (the largest herd in the village). The milking machine had 4 units and powered by a "Lister" engine. Mr Arnold took the milk at 8:00am to Newark where 4 dairy delivery men delivered it to housewives in Newark. The first tractor I drove was at Mr Arnold's a Standard Fordson.

In the late thirties the Ministry of Agriculture encouraged farms to modernise and buy a tractor, so by 1939 a few farms had a Standard Fordson (Blue) when the war started new tractors were painted green and only had very narrow mud guards to save metal.

The Ministry of Defence decided to build an airfield in our neighbouring village Balderton, they decided to build on land owned by Handburys and Jack Richardson. They were told to sell everything and move out, my uncle bought some cheap hay. Jack Richardson moved to a farm at Danethorpe Hill, Newark. The MOD went to see my grandfather Arthur Revill and decided to hire his 4 wheel industrial trailers but not his Overtime tractor as they said it did not have enough horsepower. I got a job mowing the grass at the airfield with 2 horses everything worked extremely well until a Hampden bomber flew over and I am pleased to say I managed to stop them bolting, next time it circulated over thankfully they were a little calmer.

My next job was to look after my uncle's farm as he went to work for Cafferata in Newark, so I was back to milking cows by hand. As milk was a very important food I was exempt from joining the Home-guard. Brother Donald joined the Home-guard and one night his platoon was split in two sections, one section was sent off to guard a railway bridge and a quarter of an hour later the other section set out to attack, guess what, when they got to the bridge nobody was there, the other section had gone to another bridge. Once a week at night along with another man I had to do fire watching, 2 hours on 2 hours off, 2 hours walking round the streets of the village then I went to bed for 2 hours while the other man took over. I had also to check no lights were showing from houses, paraffin lamps had to have a hood over the top, all vehicle lights had to have a hood over them, flash lights had to have a shade. There were no street lights in the village.

Every house in our village had a radio powered by an "Accumulator", we used to have a good laugh listening to Lord Ha Ha, everyone in the village used to listen to Churchill's speeches this was a great motivator for everyone

and boosted moral. For entertainment we had a pub in the village and a billiard table in the Village Hall. I was never interested in billiards, but went to the village hall every Friday night to the whist drive (I only played once) followed by a dance which was most enjoyable, it gave us a chance to forget the war for a few hours. The profit from the whist drives was shared between all families that had family in the Forces at Christmas. I enjoyed dancing and sometimes I would cycle the 10 miles to Collingham village to their dance which carried on until 1:00am the next morning. One night after arriving home very late I was hungry so started to eat a pork pie that mother had just made. Next thing I knew was a hand on my shoulder "Are you going to get changed before you start milking?"

We did not have an air raid siren in our village but you could hear those in Newark. When the MOD thought an invasion was imminent they dug a trench across large grass fields and erected poles in arable fields to stop enemy aircraft landing. On the afternoon of the 7th March 1941 a chap in the village came riding a cycle down the road and when I inquired why he was wearing a tin hat he said that the ball bearing engineering firm in Newark Ransome & Marle had been bombed, I never saw a German bomber in the sky.

My elder brother Don worked on several aerodromes in the area Bottesford, Ossington, Balderton and Syerston driving a tractor and trailer for Arthur Wright. He said most of the labourers on sites were Irish men.

By 1944 most farms had POW's working on them as labour was very short, also they were seen as cheap labour. We had a lazy Italian, a poor worker who did not speak English and a very hard working German who could speak excellent English and had a very wide vocabulary. I later found out that he had been trained to be a translator.

Also in 1944 the Americans seemed to take over Balderton airfield, many American planes came to the airfield along with several gliders. On fine days for most of the day they would tow gliders off (sometime 2 gliders at once) with a Dakota, when they were airborne they let the gliders off the tow and they returned to the airfield for another glider. Unfortunately the Americans came to our village dances and swept our ladies off their feet.

Living so near to Balderton airfield one got used to bombers flying over the house so you slept through it, one night a returning Hampden bomber came very low over house, I woke but turned over and went back to sleep, in fact the bomber had crash-landed in our field and skidded right through it and crossed the dyke into the neighbours field. Apparently soon afterwards men from the airfield came knocking at the door whilst I heard the noise I did not get up but fortunately dad heard them and got up. Very sadly the rear

gunner had been killed on landing.

Mother's brother in law Humphrey Dicks a dentist was captured by the Japanese in Singapore in 1942. I am unaware how he suffered but after the war finished when auntie went to meet him at the railway station she did not recognise him and in fact had walked past him. Actually he lived well in to his 80's.

To show how things have changed I remember just before Christmas just after the war had finished I went into Newark one night and walked past Billy Pike's shop a "Fish & Game Dealers" which was closed but the Rabbits, Pheasants and Partridges were hung outside the shop all night with just a light sheet to cover them and this was at a time of food rationing, today even during the day you would not dare put them outside the shop.

Who's taking care of your Waste?

Fly Tipping (Information taken from NSDC web site)

Fly tipping is the illegal dumping of waste and it is your responsibility to know what has happened to your waste.

If you have any work done on your property or if you pay someone to take waste away for you, make sure they are registered with the Environment Agency.

Fly tipping is an issue that that the police do not deal with however we the police do take an active role in trying to reduce the amount of waste that is being dumped in and around the local rural communities.

Penalties

If your waste is dumped illegally, you could be fined up to £50,000 and/or receive a prison sentence. At the Crown Court the fine is an unlimited fine and up to 5 years in prison.

The courts can also disqualify someone from driving and order the confiscation of any vehicle used in the commission of the offence.

Fly tipping on private land

The council responds to all fly tipping reports and aims to clear the rubbish within 24 hours, provided it is on a street or some other public place. If the rubbish is dumped on private land such as farmer's fields and other areas not in public ownership, we will not clear it without charging the occupier for doing so. We will investigate such incidents and prosecute offenders when we have the evidence. We also apply for costs in court on behalf of the landowner/occupier.

Illegal dumping

There are people who go round offering to take rubbish to the tip for a few pounds. They will see it on the front garden or down the side of the house or just cold call. It is important to realise that, unless they are registered waste carriers (and most legitimate companies do not cold call); these people have no option but to fly tip that rubbish. If you want to find legitimate registered waste carriers, please use the Environment Agency's Public Registers, to find registered waste carriers within your area.

If you allow someone you do not know to take your waste to the 'tip' and it ends up being fly tipped, you'll get a letter from the council wanting to interview you about fly tipping and you may get a bill for the clear up. To avoid this, take it to the tip yourself or get a trusted friend to do so.

You can also use the council's own excess waste collection service for which there is a small charge, or for larger quantities we can provide you with an individual quote.

Witnessing and reporting a fly tipping incident

If you find evidence, please leave it where it is and let us know as soon as possible. If you seize evidence such as letters etc and remove it from the site you should be prepared to make a written statement saying that. Otherwise we may not be able to take any further action.

If you find some fly-tipping or have witnessed fly-tipping taking place, please contact the Newark and Sherwood Waste Management Department on 01636 650000, or you can visit the Newark and Sherwood District Council web site at www.newark-sherwooddc.gov.uk and report any fly tipping on line. Please submit as much information as possible to enable us to take positive action.
