

Chairman's Report – March 2019

Thank you to all the volunteers who helped organise another enjoyable Carols Round the Tree at the Community Centre – planning will start soon for this year's event by the groups involved.

Coddington was not proposed for minerals development in the previous draft of the Local Minerals Plan prepared by Nottinghamshire County Council. A revised plan is due to be issued soon, and residents will be alerted if this situation changes when the report is out for public consultation.

Demolition of the garages in Coddington is expected to start soon, followed by construction of the new social housing. This is certain to cause some disruption in the vicinity of the garages until the new houses are completed – please flag up any issues once the work starts via the usual channels.

Local elections are due to take place on 2nd May this year. If you are considering becoming a Parish Councillor, why not attend one of our meetings to see what is involved?

The Outreach Post Office service at the Community Centre mentioned in the previous newsletter has been delayed until BT install a phone line to the office, so that the full range of Post Office services can be offered.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Thursday April 18th at 7:30pm in the Village Hall on Main Street. This is an opportunity to hear from the organisations in the village of the previous year's activities. This will be followed by an open meeting when you are invited to discuss improvements needed within the village.

Don't forget Mothering Sunday on 31st March this year – important in Coddington from the local connection with Constance Penswick Smith who led a 30-year campaign to re-establish the religious celebration of Mothering Sunday rather than the Americanised and commercial Mother's Day.

PREPARATION OF NEW ELECTORAL ROLL

The Church electoral roll is the foundation of the whole structure of synodical government in the church. It contains the names and addresses of everyone who can vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. Every 6 years each parish is required to prepare a new electoral roll. This year, 2019, a new electoral roll must be prepared.

Notice is hereby given

that under the Church Representation Rules a new Church Electoral Roll is being prepared. All persons who wish to have their names entered on the new Roll, whether their names are entered on the present Roll or not, are requested to apply for enrolment not later than Tuesday, 12 March 2019.

The new Roll will come into operation on Tuesday, 19 March 2019. The Roll shall be published for not less than 14 days before the Annual Church Parochial Meeting (APCM). Which is to be held on Tuesday, 2 April 2019.

Under the Church Representation Rules any lay persons are entitled to have their names entered on the roll if they—

- (i) are baptised and aged 16 or over;
- (ii) have signed a form of application for enrolment;

and either

(iii) are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or not being resident in the parish having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment;

or:

(iv) are members in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves also to be members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.







Village Hall Improvements

After much work by all concerned we now have completed designs and specifications for the new toilet block, a new meeting room and entrance for the village hall.

In addition, the plans have received planning permission and building consent from NSDC.

We are now in the process of obtaining costs for the work to allow us to approach grant-giving bodies for funds. It is our wish to complete the work by autumn 2020 when we will have a village hall with up to date toilets and kitchen, together with an enlarged "reading" room (in place of the existing toilets).

The monthly work parties continue to make smaller improvements.

The large hall ceiling has been repainted and new fire doors have been installed. This spring we plan to install a loft ladder into the space above the kitchen to enable it to be used for some long-term storage. Work has continued to pave the area surrounding the large hall to give better access for painting and gutter cleaning.

This month there has been some removal of overhanging branches and general winter tidying of the garden.

HAVE A GO!



John's tale.

I was born in 1935 in Chester where my father was a Sergeant in the Regular Army. About 1937 Dad was transferred on promotion to Staff Sergeant at Preston, Lancs. and we moved there. In 1939 Dad was again transferred on promotion to Warrant Officer 2 in Hong Kong and we, Mum, myself and my sister 2 years younger than me went with him – by sea of course in those days on a journey that took some weeks. I can remember bits of that voyage – especially getting Prickly Heat in the Red Sea. Personally I have nothing but happy memories of Hong Kong. We lived in splendid quarters and had three Chinese servants.

I believe Dad was about to be sent "home" to be commissioned when the Japanese declared war on Britain and the British garrison was put on a war footing, Families were evacuated - in my Mum's case (with me including sister Margaret and a three month old baby, Jean) to the Philippines during the monsoon where it rained every day for the three weeks we were there. Mum had two suit cases during this period - one of which contained nothing but baby food.

`Hong Kong was greatly under staffed to resist invasion by the Japanese but was reinforced by Canadian troops of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI). These conscripted troops had had about 6 weeks training and had never fired lived ammunition! The Japanese troops had had four years war active service in China. There were no UK naval or air force resources and it was no surprise that that Hong Kong fell on Christmas Day 1941.

After the "sojourn" in Manila, Mum and we three kids were shipped to Sydney, New South Wales. I clearly remember Australia and was very happy living by the sea in Manley, a suburb of Sydney. I was able to fish and swim every day that we were there. I don't remember going to school at all whilst we were in Manley. However, after some months the Japanese got two midget submarines into Sydney harbour – which failed to sink anything and were quite quickly destroyed by Royal Australian Naval vessels – or so I understand. But that incident caused us to be evacuated (again) to an up-state small town in New South Wales called Young. We boarded with a lovely family called Martins. Mrs Martin had 5 sons, all older than me, and I got involved in all the scrapes these lads got up to. The climate was great and I was sent to school there but don't think I learnt much at all.

It must have been about that time that Mum got a telegram from the War Office advising her that Dad had been" killed in action" and that "pension details would follow!" So there she was a young widow with 3 kids and whose only living relative was her mother (Nana) who lived on the other side of the world in Warrington, Cheshire. So Mum decided to get back to the UK.

The Army found a passage for us on a small Free French freighter that was carrying two other families also trying to get back to the UK. I remember that they used to put carafes of diluted Red Wine on the kids' table at lunch and dinner times which Mum said would be less risky to drink than the water. To lessen the chance of attack by submarines the voyage was far to the South of the Indian Ocean and eventually we got to Durban, South Africa.

There I understand that Mum, and no doubt other passengers, were put ashore as the Army had decided the Free French boat was too slow and in any case had no sort of defensive provision. I think this must have been in 1942/3. We lived in a hotel. I went to school there, which wasn't much help as much of the teaching was in Afrikaans and it was there that I contracted Rheumatic Fever and was hospitalised for, I think, for about 8 weeks and had to go back to the hospital each month for "monitoring" check ups. Anyway some time in May 1944 we were put on a lightly armed British passenger vessel that was part of a convoy of, I think, of similar vessels, escorted by Destroyers (which seemed to be always dashing about dragging targets for the gun crews to practise their drills on. Very exciting as the kids weren't

sent below and we could cheer when the gun crews managed to hit a target. And so we journeyed up the East coast of Africa and through the Suez Canal and docked at Alexandria,.

For reasons not explained we were put ashore in late May and "housed" in large tents at the edge of a desert. The tents were in a barbed wire enclosure and we were looked after by Italian troops who by that time were now the Allies' "friends". These Italians were splendid men who organised games and matches for the kids and every afternoon took us to the seashore for a swim in the Med. We stayed there until after 6th June – D day – and I guess the reason for our being dumped in the desert was to clear the seas of all but fighting vessels. After some weeks post D day we were again put on a ship, bound for Liverpool, and must have got there, I guess, in late June/early July 1945. It was awful – cold and seemingly always

drizzling - and we went by train to my Grandmother's in Warrington. I went to a C of E primary school in Stockton Heath and was put in a class of 50 kids, together with my sister, two years younger than me. I could read (more or less) but not write much. We had slates and chalk to write with and I don't think I learnt much at all.

FOOTNOTE

Following the dropping of Atom bombs on Japan in August 1945, Japan capitulated. The camp my Dad was in was "liberated" by Canadian troops of P P C L I – who "dealt" with the few Japanese guards who had not deserted. The Canadians were given a list of all the surviving prisoners in the camp. This was radioed to the War Office in London and Mum got a telegram telling her Dad was no longer "Killed in Action". It seems that the Japanese in Hong Kong did not release the names etc of prisoners. Some ten weeks later Dad arrived in Warrington.

Tragically, some of his fellow surviving prisoners found that their wives had remarried and had children with their new spouses – two were living in the USA. These marriages were declared unlawful by UK Courts and the children classified as "illegitimate". Two of Dad's colleagues to whom this happened later committed suicide.

For the rest of his life my Dad got a cheque from the Regimental Association of P P C L I at Christmas in recognition of his "support and comfort" of Canadian fellow prisoners and was awarded an MBF

Warm Homes on Prescription

Newark and Sherwood District Council is offering a scheme to provide adequately heated homes for vulnerable residents. The Government is funding the Warm Homes on Prescription project which aims to help people suffering with a long term health condition which is being made worse by living in a poorly heated home. The qualifying criteria are:

- Must be resident within Newark and Sherwood District.
- Must live in own home or in privately rented property. Must have a long term health condition which is impacted by the cold.
- Must have an annual household income of less than £16,000 a year.
- Must have savings of less than £16,000.

The scheme provides complete funding to home owners for a new boiler/heating system where the boiler is faulty or broken. Landlords are required to pay 50% towards the cost of the work where their tenants meet the above criteria.

HIGHWAYS ENGLAND NOTIFICATION OF ESSENTIAL SAFETY IMPROVEMENT WORKS

Safety improvement works to the A46 roundabouts are due to start in early January, scheduled for completion in July. Diversions will be in place between the hours of 8pm and 5am, Monday to Friday with occasional overnight weekend work. There will be 40mph speed limits and a mix of lane, road and layby closures throughout.

The three schemes will be delivered sequentially:

<u>A46 Cattle Market Roundabout</u> - widening and re-alignment of the Great North Road arm.

<u>A46 Brownhills Roundabout</u> – widening of the A1 northbound exit slip road and re-profiling of the embankment to reduce the slope gradient.

<u>A46 Friendly Farmer Roundabout</u> – reduction of lanes from 4 to 3 on the A46 approach and re-alignment of the footway on the south east quadrant.

Full spiral markings will be introduced at all three roundabouts to assist drivers in following a lane around the roundabout, to reduce the number of collisions.

In addition, there will be the following associated works:

- resurfacing the roundabouts and immediate approaches.
- replacing/adding High Friction Surfacing.
- replacing lighting columns and lit signs.
- updating signage.
- installing a new drainage system for surface water.
- renewing the footway/cycleway.
- renewing the landscape within the central island.

Road safety advice for



Having seen the information in the previous Village News I would like to highly recommend the above service. It does indeed help to reduce plastic pollution and it is rather nice to have glass milk bottles again, I missed them when we moved here as we had had a similar system where we lived previously, and in fact I had never lived anywhere where we didn't have a milk delivery.

You have a regular order, delivered three times a week, plus other items which can be ordered very easily, as can changing a milk order. If you are technical you can go on line and amend or add to your order, or for those less techy a note with the empty bottles works just as well. Our milkman delivers very early so the milk is always there before breakfast.

It is a national organisation with our milk coming from their Grantham depot. There are regular leaflets telling you what other items they have to offer, of which there is quite a wide range.

A bonus is that we no longer have to lug big plastic cartons of milk back from the shops, and then have to dispose of them. We are now all so much more aware of the harm that plastic pollution can do.

Local Elections 2019

The Newark and Sherwood District Council and Parish Elections will take place on Thursday 2 May 2019. Polling stations will be open from 7am until 10pm. Polling cards will be sent to registered voters.

You can only vote if your name is on the Register of Electors.

The Register of Electors

The current register was last published on 1 December 2018. If you are not registered to vote, have moved address, changed your name or nationality, you can apply to register **online**. Your application must be received by Friday 12 April 2019 to register for these elections. If you cannot register online, please contact Newark & Sherwood District Council. If you are already registered correctly, you do not need to register again for these elections.

Postal and Proxy Voting

If you would like to vote by post, you will need to complete a **postal vote application form** (PDF File, 235kb). Your application must be received before 5pm on Monday 15 April 2019 if it is to be effective for these elections. If you are granted a postal vote, you will not be able to vote in person at these elections. This form must not be completed with an electronic signature. If you cannot print this form please contact us.

If you would like to appoint a proxy to vote on your behalf, you will need to complete a **proxy vote application form** (PDF File, 113kb). Your application must be received before 5pm on Wednesday 24 April 2019 if it is to be effective for these elections. If you have appointed a proxy to vote in person for you, you can still vote yourself, but ONLY if your proxy has not already voted on your behalf. This form must not be completed with an electronic signature. If you cannot print this form please contact us.

LOCAL ELECTIONS THURSDAY 2nd MAY

Anyone who wishes to stand as a member of the Parish Council can obtain nomination papers from the NSDC web site or from the Returning Officer at Castle House – contact joanne.dunn@newark-sherwooddc.gov.uk for an email or paper copy. The nomination period will start no later than 26th March, and completed nomination papers must be returned to Castle House by 4pm on Wednesday 3rd April. Each nominee will need a proposer and a seconder from the Parish electorate, and must be:

- A British/Commonwealth citizen over the age of 18 on the day of election.
- A local government elector having resided in the Parish or within 3 miles for at least 12 months prior to the day of election or having owned land or premises or had their principal place of work there.
- •Disqualifications may arise if the person is a paid Officer of the Council, or due to bankruptcy or criminal convictions within 5 years of the election.
