Chairman's Report – June 2019

The Annual Parish Meeting in April was well attended by members of the Parish, with valuable reports from Village groups:

- Coddington Community Centre Association
- Coddington Village Hall Charity Trust
- Coddington Trust Fund
- Coddington C of E Primary and Nursery School

Issues raised by members of the Parish during the open forum included:

- Concerns about the limited space remaining for burials in the churchyard. The Chairman reported that the Parish Council was actively seeking to locate land for a new burial ground within the village or an extension to the churchyard if possible.
- ii. Villagers were saddened by the theft of lead from the church roof. It was felt that there was a need for more crime awareness.

Cllr Lee advised that a new campaign, 'Report It' was being proposed across the district.

- iii. Where will the bottle banks go when The Plough car park is sold for development? Cllr Armstrong said that it was regrettable that after considerable discussion, the Parish Council had been unable to find a suitable alternative location and the bottle banks would have to go. Cllr Lee reported that the District Council is planning to provide more facilities for home recycling.
- iv. Removal of trees from the Brownlow's Hill development site.

The Chairman explained that the Parish Council was in the process of lodging a formal complaint that trees and hedging had been removed without consent and during the nesting season. Cllr Dobson was asked to investigate whether the contractors had removed the hedge to gain site access from the C208 and whether the development was encroaching on County Council owned land.

- v. **Traffic and road surface noise on the C208.** County Cllr Dobson acknowledged that there had been an increase in traffic cutting through the village and would ask for the road surface to be looked at.
- vi. There were still serious concerns about safety at the staggered crossroads at the junction of the A17 and Drove Lane. Cllr Dobson stated that previous Highways inspections had reported that no change was needed.
- vii. Parked cars blocking the pavement on Brownlow's Hill. Cllr Lee responded that the mobile camera unit was patrolling the school area regularly.

viii. When will double yellow lines be installed outside The Plough?

Cllr Dobson confirmed that the work was scheduled for this financial year.

Coddington has again been entered for the Best Kept Village competition. The judging is expected to run across most of June. The village often does well – please support it again with your excellent gardens, in village tidiness generally, and by helping your Council with the litter in the run up to judging.

After spending many years and several public meetings on the Beaconfield footpath and waiting for the permissive routes across the site to be finally agreed, I am sorry to report that the land has now been sold for development. The only viable option for the village now is to pursue a claim for ancient rights of way, for which more substantive evidence of use will certainly be required from residents in the area.

If you have walked the route across Beaconfield to under the A1 bridge, please complete the Evidence of Use form included in the centre pages of this newsletter and return the form to the Parish Clerk via the letter box at the Community Centre. THEFT OF LEAD FROM THE CHURCH ROOF

As you will be aware, the lead from our North Aisle Roof was stolen overnight on 18 March 2019, causing thousands of pounds worth of damage. Our lead roof was just over a year old. Our church was not the only church to be targeted by the thieves, as a series of thefts of lead from church roofs in the local area has occurred in recent weeks.

A breathable roofing felt secured by tile battens has now been fitted as a temporary measure.

If you, or anyone you know, saw or heard anything suspicious which may possibly relate to this theft, then please contact the police. The officer in charge of our investigation is PC 3088 Christine Hewitt, Newark Police Station.





Village Ventures, reviews by Jorja Le Gallienne

A quiet Saturday evening saw a packed house of local people attend a Village Ventures production of the rip roaring fast paced drama about the eccentricities of British people titled 'Instructions for American Servicemen in Britain'. The drama takes place in the sleepy village of Nether Middleton although to be fair it could be almost any village in England including our very own Coddington.

It's 1942 and this quiet village has been taken over by the the inhabitants of an American airbase. They've experienced their first night in England where



they've perhaps had a little too much of the fine English ales resulting in some fighting with the locals, locking up the local policeman, some rather boisterous activity in the local allotments that no longer see their finer days, oh and scared off the vicar's cat.

This play was made even better by the interaction of the audience so much so that you would think that some of the locals were actually in the play. Ad libbing at its finest!. We all became the reprimanded soldier and those that were individually 'picked on' were involved throughout the performance!.

The English local army major Randolph Gibbons (left) enters the foray with a message from high. The entire camp has no choice but to take a crash course on English life as their punishment for the previous evenings shenanigans. Colonel Attwood (on left of pic) the extremely loud and arrogant American Leader feels he knows best and does a fast paced and laugh out loud tour of UK geography which is highly inaccurate thus adding to the laughter from the audience. Lieutenant Eugene Shultz (on right) makes an energetic and often failing attempt at keeping the peace between Attwood and Gibbons.





(The same two actors again on the left!) A wide ranging and hilarious approach to topics such as the ever so baffling monetary system that as someone born in 1971 made me breathe a sigh of relief that I never had to understand pounds, shilling and pence.

The Nazi spy school as inappropriate as it sounds was a clever move from the basic set and the change in accents made you feel like there were different actors entering act two.



The entire play was frenetic and fast paced and a greatly accurate portrayal of the silliness and quirkiness of the English. We all laughed at the characters and of course in turn were laughing at ourselves and those we know.

A slapstick comedy with talented and hard working actors who had a vast amount of lines to learn and did this to an excellent degree.



And who would have thought that after an evening of audience participation they ended the show with us all Morris dancing in our seats!

Ninebarrow, a folk duo from Dorset, graced us with their presence at the Coddington Village Hall in April and as a lover of folk music I was looking forward to the night ahead.



What a fantastic evening of music and conversation. The duo comprise of Jon Whitley, a former primary school teacher (vocals, mandola, harmonium, piano) and Jay LaBouchardiere a GP (vocals, harmonium). They played traditional folk songs, their own pieces and some covers. Weave the Garland, Prickle Eye Bush were perhaps two of my favourites and Hour of the Blackbird was truly atmospheric and as with every single song the harmonies were flawless. Their musical talents also showed their abilities to make folk music accessible to all and I could have listened to them for many more hours. An encore truly deserved by this talented duo. As a centre we are doing well, regular bookings are up, we are well booked for parties and the badminton court continues to be popular.

The Funday represents our first attempt at raising money for the centre and one of our local charities, in this case the Emmaus Trust. The monies raised will be split between the two. For our part, what money is raised will be ploughed back into the centre to enhance our services and to pay towards future events. Whilst the centre trustees give their time on a purely voluntary basis the centre does have a monthly wage bill to find for our booking clerk and centre manager both of whom are essential to the smooth running of the centre. Due to the Parish Council taking over ownership of the centre from Newark and Sherwood D.C it was deemed appropriate that we should have a new sign for the car park, which should be in place by the time you read this. Also there will be double yellow lines added to ensure that people are more aware of where they can and can't park their vehicles. We hope these measures will go some way to eliminating the stress of parking at the centre during busy times, keeping everyone safe whilst using the car park. I am assured that any misuse of the car park will be strictly enforced by the District Council, but my hope is that everyone will park respectfully needing no action from the D.C.

HIGHWAYS ENGLAND NOTIFICATION OF ESSENTIAL SAFETY IMPROVEMENT WORKS

Safety improvement works to the A46 roundabouts are due to start in early January, scheduled for completion in July. Diversions will be in place between the hours of 8pm and 5am, Monday to Friday with occasional overnight weekend work. There will be 40mph speed limits and a mix of lane, road and layby closures throughout.

The three schemes will be delivered sequentially:

<u>A46 Cattle Market Roundabout</u> - widening and re-alignment of the Great North Road arm.

<u>A46 Brownhills Roundabout</u> – widening of the A1 northbound exit slip road and re-profiling of the embankment to reduce the slope gradient.

<u>A46 Friendly Farmer Roundabout</u> – reduction of lanes from 4 to 3 on the A46 approach and re-alignment of the footway on the south east quadrant.

Full spiral markings will be introduced at all three roundabouts to assist drivers in following a lane around the roundabout, to reduce the number of collisions.

In addition, there will be the following associated works:

- resurfacing the roundabouts and immediate approaches.
- replacing/adding High Friction Surfacing.
- replacing lighting columns and lit signs.
- updating signage.
- installing a new drainage system for surface water.
- renewing the footway/cycleway.
- renewing the landscape within the central island.



I was born in 1927 at Bracebridge Heath, Lincoln, my parents were Arthur (b.1890) and Mary (b.1893), I had two brothers Ronald Arthur born 1921 and Jeffrey Hubert born 1923.

Originally Dad was a wheelwright before joining the Royal Field Artillery, Gunner 1st Class, Signaller reg.no. 49330, on the 15th January 1908 at Manchester. After his initial training he was posted to India on 16th October 1908 and returned to England on the 7th January 1913. He left the forces in January 1914 on reserve. He was recalled in July 1914 and his regiment was posted to France, he was involved in the retreat from Mons and on the 3rd November 1914 at Ypres, he was badly wounded (shrapnel in his legs) being the only survivor of the gun crew. He was repatriated to a military hospital in Oxford on the 5th November 1914. He returned to France and in the rat, flea and lice infected trenches he contacted trench fever and nephritis and was repatriated to England 3 times. He was also gassed several times and finally returned to England on the 29th January 1917. He was awarded the Military "WW1 Silver Badge" which he wore at all times before the war finished so that ladies did not give him a white feather

I remembered gas masks being given to all the family in 1938, in a way everyone was surprised to hear Neville Chamberlain on the radio to say that Britain was at war with Germany. That evening I and my friend were out in the village when the air raid siren went off, in immediate panic us two boys ran into each other and I fell and broke my nose but instead of being one of the first when war broke out to be in Lincoln hospital my father straightened my nose and told me I would be OK.

Before WW2 started Dad was a painter and decorator and the largest job he ever did was painting the Hangers, Offices, Workshops etc on Waddington airfield to camouflage them.

Before the war my father had taped the windows (diamond shape) and instead of black out curtains which every house had he made a wooden frame covered in roofing felt which could be easily attached to the outside of the windows. As we lived so close to the airfield Dad built us an air raid shelter in the garden. As we lived in a village food rationing was not a major problem and we ate horse meat and pork, vegetables which were grown in the garden or allotments. The family always had a Christmas cake.

We lived 1 mile in line with the control tower at RAF Waddington airfield so most days I saw planes on the airfield, taking off and landing

or in the sky, (Fairy Battles, Wellingtons, Hampdens, Avro Manchester, Lancasters, Stirlings). When Wellingtons came back from air raids over Europe you could often see holes in the fuselage. Wellington bombers on one raid dropped thousands of propagander leaflets over Germany but several most had stuck to the plane as they were scattered all over the airfield. Searchlights were a common occurrence, unfortunately so were plane crashes (take off, landing or missing the runway). Very sadly Mum died in February 1941 and Dad died in May 1941, just after Dad died the Germans on a moonlight night bombed the airfield destroying an air-raid shelter killing RAF personnel both male and female. Heinkel machine guns sprayed the airfield with bullets. They also bombed the village Church. On several occasion I saw "Dog Fights" in the sky above the airfield and village. After Dunkirk (1940) the government must have been very worried about a German invasion as all road signs were removed and in the large fields around us where German planes/gliders could land, telegraph poles were erected to stop them being able to land. After Dad died our aunt (Dad's sister Alice Wright nee Dickinson)) came to live with us before I moved to her house in Claypole, Newark in August 1941, this was a major change in my life as my two brothers did not come to live with us. I attended the village school. Balderton airfield was only a mile away so on a daily basis I saw many aircraft (Hampden, Blenheim, Halifax, Lancaster, and Dakotas). There were many military airfields in close vicinity:- Winthorpe, Swinderby, Wigsley, Fulbeck, Ossington and Syerston so most days the sky seemed full of aircraft. The family moved to Balderton, Newark when uncle died. Interestingly like the majority of civilians in the area I was not aware that Frank Whittle's jet engines were being tested on Balderton airfield. In 1944 I remember I was near Balderton airfield when I saw a plane in the sky circling the airfield, it made a funny noise and had no propellers, it landed and went straight into the hangar. Later I learnt it was a plane with Frank Whittle's jet engine in it, a Whittle's Meteor. I remembered the day when a Hampden bomber crashed in Grove Street Balderton killing a mother and her 4 children. I attended the local school in Balderton. All "street lights" were turned off and all motor vehicles headlights had a "hood" fitted (black out Lights) which meant the beam only shone directly in front of the vehicle so driving at night was extremely difficult.

Before D-Day (1944) on the sides of the road between Stubton, Dry Doggington and Westborough thousands of rounds of ammunition were stored on the grass verge with a couple of Home Guards stopping people pinching it. Also alternative black and white lines were painted on the

fuselages and wings of RAF planes for the purpose of increased recognition by friendly forces to hopefully to stop friendly fire.

The heavy clay land on which Balderton airfield was built (originally grass runways but concrete in 1943) was owned by a farmer, Jim Hall. My uncle George Wright had a Dairy Farm, and his son Arthur when Balderton airfield was built supplied agricultural tractors and trailers for carting soil, carrying building materials etc to the local aerodromes Balderton, Fulbeck and Ossington. To earn money after school and at weekends I worked for the local garage "George Walmsley's" whose main work was repairing small trucks that worked on Balderton airfield.

I often saw search lights and when there were heavy bombing raids by the Germans on Nottingham or Sheffield you could see the flames from Newark. Sadly many planes crash landed in the surrounding area mainly due to pilots being trained at most of the local military aerodromes. Many parachutists did their training flying in old WW1 Handley Page bombers, opening the cockpit then walking on the wing before pulling the rip cord. There were also a large number of gliders. In 1944 the American air-force arrived in big numbers.

I joined Balderton Scouts and every weekend we collected waste paper with a small pony and dray, the paper was baled and sold to the local waste paper collectors, this money sponsored the scouts. Later in the war Italian prisoners of war were billeted on Sconce Hills in Newark and they worked on the local farms. I went to work for Brooks Garage on Farndon Road, Newark, interestingly the department for Agriculture parked their trucks on land behind the garage. Brother Ronald married in August 1941, he worked for Barnes Removals of Lincoln and often collected evacuees from the major towns:- London, Sheffield and Coventry and brought them back to Newark. He joined the RAF in late October 1941 and was posted to West Africa before returning to 58 Maintenance Unit, Lincoln Road, Newark. One of the jobs was to collect crashed aircraft using a mobile crane. Brother Jeff worked for the railways and when he asked to leave and join the Navy his request was rejected as it was a "Reserved Occupation".
