

Chairman's Report - March 2020

Thank you to all the volunteers who helped organise another enjoyable Carols Round the Tree at the Community Centre – planning will start soon for this year's event by the groups involved. Thanks are also due to the allotment holders who kindly planted 100 hedging trees at the boundary of the village allotments.

Mary Molloson has recently retired from the Parish Council – her experience and expertise on planning matters will be sorely missed. The vacancy is due to be filled by interview over the next month or so.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Thursday April 9th at 7:30pm in the Village Hall on Main Street. This is an opportunity to hear from the organisations in the village of the previous year's activities. This will be followed by an open meeting when you are invited to discuss ideas for making use of Community Infrastructure Levy funds in the village, and the future of burials in Coddington as the space for burials at the Church is now almost full.

There have been several complaints about dog poo being left on paths and verges, rather than being bagged and left in the many dog and litter bins around the village. A person who doesn't clean up after their dog may face an on-the-spot fine - these fines are known as fixed penalty notices. If a person refuses to pay, they can be taken to the local Magistrates Court for the dog fouling offence and fined up to £1,000.

Residents and parents with children at Coddington School have asked for a one-way system to be introduced along Brownlow's Hill / Main Street on the South side of Beckingham Road. A petition has been launched soon to gauge the views of residents on this proposal, before taking this for assessment by Nottinghamshire Highways.

Don't forget Mothering Sunday on 22nd March this year – important in Coddington from the local connection with Constance Penswick Smith who led a 30-year campaign to re-establish the religious celebration of Mothering Sunday.

Finally, a warm welcome to all new residents of Coddington – you may attend Parish Council meetings if there is something you want to raise with the Councillors, as there is always time allocated at the start of every meeting for contributions from the public. Mr Mike Bache writes:

There are times when life gets on top of us, and pressures and demands just get too much. We may feel everything is under control with life running along smoothly, but one setback or disappointment can change our whole perspective and send us spiralling out of control.

Maybe it's trying to help a friend with a problem that goes totally wrong, or that little irritation that comes along and you know that you just have to deal with it.

The other day I noticed that the curtain pole was hanging off the wall - the rawl plug had pulled out of the wall and needed replacing. An irritation which I could have well done without, I was busy enough as it was, and my DIY skills are pretty limited, but I knew that if I didn't fix it, the whole thing might come crashing down. So I set to.

A quick fix - or so I thought. Having replaced the rawl plug, it still pulled out of the wall, and I had to drill deeper and as a result, the hole got bigger and I had to get a bigger rawl plug to fix it. Still it didn't work and still the pole pulled away from the wall - my frustration, as you can imagine, was growing by the minute. I had no choice but to start again, fill in the old holes and drill two new ones before the fix was complete.

All too many can testify to the mind numbing, strength sapping effect of stress, and that sinking feeling you get in the pit of your stomach which has the capacity to drive us to the brink of despair and beyond. However, I was not prepared for that curtain pole to get the better of me. During this little adventure the words of Psalm 130 kept running through my head:

"Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord; O Lord, hear my voice. Let your ears be attentive to my cry for mercy."

Faith does not supply easy solutions in times of despair, but it does give us something to hold on to. Put our trust in God and we will find that he is there to hold our heads above water until the storm subsides and calm returns.



Village Hall News

Hurray! You will have at last noticed that the boundary wall between the Village and Scout Halls has been rebuilt. This will mean that when the building works commence the path can be re-profiled so as to give good disabled access and will not bury the base of the corrugated iron original hall.

More good news is that we've also managed to obtain a detailed quote for building the extension to house new entrance and toilets. Now we need to raise the 6 figure funds to do it! We have had incredibly bad luck with potential grants closing down just as we were ready to apply. Any help with fundraising gratefully received – please support our events at the hall. We hope to have a quiz night in a while.

The monthly maintenance morning (1st Monday of the month) continues with many and varied tasks; a radiator had been hauled off the wall (no, we don't know who or how) and this caused pipes to be damaged below the wooden floor so this resulted in much work for the maintenance team and expense getting a plumber in to do the repairs – it was beyond our team's modest plumbing capabilities! Other more usual works have been done; garden tidying, the painting started in the Ladies loo, Christmas decorations being put up and taken down etc. However we are still in need of help with the regular weekly cleaning. Please consider offering 1-2 hours once a month to help keep your hall spick and span.

Live and Local.

A full hall had lots of laughs for "Victor and Albert" in December. Then another full house for January's Kathryn Roberts & Sean Lakeman in Concert – see reviews elsewhere. Coddington Village 1939 - 45

It is 75 years ago that WW2 finished later this year, with this in mind Coddington History Group feels it is time that we had more information on the village, its occupants, how people lived, farming and who joined the Armed Forces.

Coddington was much smaller at the time, no Thorpe Oak Estate, Morgan's Close, very few houses on Newark Road and Balderton Lane, and there were only very old houses on The Green and Valley View. Most houses in the village had mains electricity, water, sewage, gas, and 14 houses had telephones.

Population: - It is impossible to give an accurate figure for the population in 1939 as the last available census was 1911 when there were 112 properties, 165 men, 165 women and 146 children. Like all small villages everyone knew each other. Christmas presents for children were an apple, orange, a new penny, a doll for girls a cowboy and Indian outfit for boys. At the beginning of the war major changes were made, everyone including children were given an identity card which had to be carried at all times. In 1939 - 38 million gas masks were distributed to every person in the UK including children (thank heavens they were never needed). Petrol, food and clothes rationing was introduced in early 1940 until 4th July 1954. Ration books were distributed to everyone, the foods rationed were bread, sugar, bacon, cheese, fats, eggs, meat and sweet, but to be realistic, village people did not suffer compared with those living in towns as they could produce their own fruit and vegetables, eggs, and some would have a pig and obtain rabbits etc.

War Effort: As materials were in very short supply everything was recycled:- paper, glass bottles, scrap metal (even metal railings at the front of houses were removed) hessian sacks, flour bags were washed and used for clothing and ladies longed to obtain silk from parachutes. The cubs and scouts collected paper and books for recycling.

The WI President Mrs Mary Handbury and her team of ladies worked exceptional hard eg: a letter of sympathy was sent to Mrs Albert Thompson after her husband was killed and a floral gift to his mother. The knitting team donated 3lbs wool [this was still on coupons] to knit shawls for persons in occupied countries. 1½ skeins of wool [coupon free] to knit garments to go to Coddington service men and £5 each to the mothers whose sons were P.O.Ws. In 1944 they were also asked to send knitting needles, crochet hooks etc to P.O.Ws.

Fruit juice and cod liver oil were distributed to all children in the country by the government .

W.O.Taylor gave a talk on the method of disposing of the new explosive incendiary bombs.

Mr Arthur Geeson had some of his fields seconded to the military. Every week school children purchased Government saving stamps at the school and some parents also purchased them. They were generally told it was to purchase "Spitfires". In the "War Weapons Week" over £300,000 was saved in the Newark District, by the end of the war Newark had saved £4 million. Some children wore "rope shoes" to save money.

Coddington Hall and Woodland: were requisitioned by the RAF; the Hall was the officers' mess and sleeping accommodation. Nissan huts were built for the other ranks, along with stores, ammunition dumps, bunkers, air raid shelters and even a tennis court.

Transportation: - There was a bus service to Newark every day and on a Wednesday and Saturday an extra bus driven by Mr Cave from Brant Broughton. It is estimated only 14 people had cars: - business men & farmers, a few men had motorcycles but bicycles and walking were the main means of getting about with trains being used for long distance travel. Mr Hugh Tallents a Solicitor from Coddington House cycled to his office in Newark.

Employment: - We have no factual information of where the men were employed. The best guess is as agricultural labourers, or cycling to Newark to work at Ransome & Marles (engineers manufacturing ball bearings) or Worthington Simpsons Engineers (making pumps, supplied to the aircraft industry etc). We know Charles Campion, Jack Hallam, Charlie Nenton, Mr Rawlinson and Tom Robinson worked at Ransome & Marle. Worthington Simpson (Pumps) employed Fred Fixter, and Jack Kelham and during the war both these companies expanded and needed extra staff. Other companies in Newark were:- boiler makers Abbott & Co. Farrar's. Agricultural Machinery manufactures. Nicholson's. Stevenson's, Sheet Metal Blagg & Johnsons (made parts for Bailey pontoon bridges), Cafferata brick and plaster works. Newark was a major malting town for the UK: Branston's, Gilstrap Earp (ABM), R. Peach & Co Ltd. Warwick & Richardson brewery, Holes Brewery. Were Coddington Maltings open in 1939-45? When girls left school at 14 they went to work mainly in Newark at eg Mumby's making military uniforms or Cooper's making parachutes. We were still in an era when the majority of married women did not go out to work - their household chores kept them fully occupied. They did casual work on farms hoeing sugar beet, turnips, mangels and potatoes, hay, cereal and potato harvesting. In the 1930's as soon as a woman got married she was not allowed to work for the government, insurance companies, banks etc. How did this change in WW2? We know that some girls joined the Land Army, we know Marjorie Raynor did who else?? (the Government took over Coddington Moor House for Land Girls and Timber Jills). We know women joined the armed services, became mechanics, engineers, worked in ammunition/tank and aircraft factories, the fire service, as plumbers, nurses, volunteers with the WVS. Where did Coddington women go to work?? Men who did not join the forces had to enroll as firemen, ARP Wardens (Air Raid Precautions, making sure all houses had their black out curtains drawn at night showing no light) or join the Home Guard.

Houses: - Only a few very large houses and properties built in the 1930's were connected to all the services, the majority of houses would have only electric lights in say 2 rooms (candles and paraffin lamps were still in use) and no "plugs", the kitchen range was still very important providing the cooking, heat and hot water. Only a few houses had a flush toilet with the majority having a "privy" at the bottom of the garden. Most houses would only have one cold tap in the kitchen. Bath night was once a week in a tin bath in front of the fire. There were no domestic appliances, so for example Monday was wash day, at 6:00am the copper had to be lit (coal), only a few modern houses had a gas or electric boiler, washing took all day using a peggy stick, washing board etc, ironing on a Tuesday using an iron heated on the kitchen range. Most houses would have a wireless mainly powered by an "accumulator" (rechargeable battery). There were no dustbins, the only household waste was tin cans which were thrown on the village dump.

School: - This was the Old School on Main Street which is now the Scout Hall which had approximately 70 children. The school had toilets, "Privies", sited near the rear hedge.

The headmaster was Mr John Fordham who taught the seniors, Miss Elizabeth Gomer "Middle School" and Miss Thacker who married and became Mrs Edwards then replaced by Miss Rhodes taught the juniors. Girls who passed their 11 plus went to Lilley & Stone High School for girls and boys went to the Magnus Grammar School. At 13 several children left and went to technical college before starting an apprenticeship. Children left school at 14 unless they were in higher education. Several children walked over 2 miles to school. Some children from Sheffield & Great Yarmouth were evacuated to the village and attended the village school. We know of Diane & Kathleen Cannon, June Ollie and Jessie Philpot. Many children only stayed a few days as they were homesick and returned to their parents.

Shops: - The baker was John William Knott and his wife Winifred Edith ran the shop which was a general store selling everything from bread, and sweets to paraffin for the oil lamps. The Post Office in Post Office Row was run by Mrs Sharpe and her daughter Molly, Mrs Parkes had a very small shop attached to the Red Lion Pub, Harold Simpson was the butcher he lived at Hall Farm where he had a slaughter house. The main meat being pork, beef, lamb and rabbit but no chicken as they were too expensive. Coal was the main source of fuel delivered to your door by Mr Harold Taylor; milk delivered to you by Mr Fryer who had a fixed wheel bicycle as he had an artificial leg and carried his milk churns on the handlebars. Fred Holligworth at Manor Dairy farm employed Tommy and

Jim Wright and Bob Checkley who delivered milk with a horse and trap in the village and surrounding area including Newark. Fred Black at Catch Inn Farm delivered milk on a horse and cart in Newark. Mr Lund from Farndon came round the village once a week with his horse and cart selling hardware, paraffin, pots and pans, tools etc. Mr Loftus collected newspapers from Newark and delivered them to Coddington , Beckingham and Brant Broughton where he lived.

Gardens /allotments: families grew their own vegetables and had a few chickens for eggs and a pig.

Church & Chapel: this was an era when most people went to church or chapel on a Sunday with children attending Sunday School. They both arranged outings to the coast in summer. Revd. Bully was the vicar at the church and was extremely popular. He started a drama group and the Cubs. He was followed by Revd. Basil A Whitworth, Mr Downham was Church Warden. William Arthur Richards was the Sidesman before being Church Warden for many years. Church Fetes were held by Mrs Tallents at Coddington House to raise money for the troops. One of the people involved with the Chapel was Harold Taylor.

Sport: - In the village there were very active clubs, tennis (Ashton, Dernie and Walster families, Peter Campion, John Knott, R Hammond, Kand M Rawlinson, Reg and Jessie Simpson, P Sleight, Fred Theakston, Fred Tomlinson, Reg Simpson was groundsman. Cricket team:-

H Barber, E Banks, Arthur Beaumount, Bert Coddington, Peter Campion, Frank and Ted Daybell, Fred Fixter, Harold Handbury, Charles Henton, Pat Hough, John Kirton, John Knott, Robert Kelham, Reg Leader, Herbert Maltby, Bill Phillips, John Naylor, Reg Simpson, Owen Taylor, Frank, Eddie and Harold Simpson, Thomas Vasey, Tommy Ward, Jimmy Wright. Football team:- Peter Campion, Slug Taylor, Frank and Harold Simpson+? and darts at the pubs. Extra names of people who took part in these activities would be appreciated. Did any of the villagers attend Coddington Golf course?

The "Reading Room" (now the Village Hall, the first room before you go into the main hall) Whist Drives every week arranged by Mary Handbury. There was also a billiard table - Mr Knott was one of the main players, amateur dramatics and the RAF held dances there.

Public Houses: The Plough (landlord Arthur Henton) and the Red Lion (Landlord Fred Parkes) which had a bowling alley.

Garage and Cafe in Newark Road: - Mr Larkin

Farmers: - The larger farmers in the village were The Hollingworth Family at Manor Dairy Farm, The Daybells at Hill Farm, Harold Handbury at Vale Farm, Mr Geeson Hall Farm (owned by George Allan Ross), Harold Simpson Manor Farm, Harry Walster Charity Farm, John Smith and the Kirton Family Sunnyside Farm and the Clark family at

Beaconfield Farm. The main crops grown were grass, turnips and mangels for animal feed, wheat for milling or feed, barley for malting or feed, oats for animal feed, potatoes and sugar beet. It was not until the late 1930's that tractors were purchased by farmers, generally a Standard Fordson followed by the required implements. The Daybell and Hollingworth families both purchased tractors around 1940. The government formed the "War AG" to educate farmers to produce more food, ploughing up grassland, reduce fallow and to generally modernise, in fact from 1939 until 1945 farm production nearly doubled.

Military activity near the village: Due to the location of Winthorpe & Swinderby Airfields most days planes were seen over the village. Unfortunately a bomber crashed on Drove Lane and Sleaford road near the Golf Course. Incendiary bombs were dropped all over the village. The worst local tragedy was on the 7th March 1941 when a German Heinkel bomber dropped its bombs on Ransome & Marle's factory in Newark killing 41 people (none lived in Coddington) and injuring 165. Many villagers saw the raid.

Polish Airmen: Polish Airmen were billeted in 39 Nissan Huts in Parklands Close in 1939 before the Winthorpe Airfield opened in September 1940 as accommodation for the two Polish bomber Squadrons (No. 300 &301). CHG have a map of the area kindly supplied by Newark Air Museum.

Italian Prisoners of War: Hugh Daybell told us that the mains water pipe to Hill Farm was laid by Italian Prisoners of war; did they work on the farms in the village? Where were they billeted?

Coddington Men who served in the Armed Forces in WW2:

We have some information on the following men but we would like more + photographs:

Albert Thompson the only Coddington man that was killed in WW2.

Herbert Barrett: Royal Navy. Did he go on Arctic convoys?

Mr Beacroft: he lived with his wife Edie in a caravan on Beckingham Road.

Lieutenant James H (Jim) Dernie he fought in the Middle East and was a prisoner of war.

Frank Draycott: .Quartermaster Kings Royal Rifles Corps. Service number 113925

Norman Fryer.

J Goodband (Royal Navy).

Richard(Dick) Hall; he was in the Welsh Regiment of the British Army.

Col. Frank Hough DSO. Royal Engineers.

Captain Pat Hough DSO fought in Africa and Italy. He returned from Italy with an Italian bride Sylvia.

Lenonard Howell (RAF). He married Joan Kelham.

John Naylor

Edwin Thompson, Albert's elder brother.

Harold Thompson met his wife to be Edith, born in Swansea when he was stationed in Wales. He was the brother of Albert and Edwin. We are told he may have been in a "Special" unit in the UK which was involved in Camouflage (erecting mock buildings away from towns, to fool the German bombers).

Kenneth Town.

Donald Walster he was one of the first members of the SAS and joined in Italy. He was taken prisoner at the same time as Col. Stirling during the final push up the desert near Tripoli.

We have names of the following people and no information:-

Pamela Woodhouse was in the WRENS but might have joined up just after the war..

3 other names, not Coddington men, who were later associated with Coddington and served at the Drove Lane searchlight unit or in the RAF and married local girls were **Fred Tysoe**, **Bill Phillips and Johnny Barton**

There must have been many more Coddington Men who served in WW2 if you have any information on these men or on the village 1939/1945 please contact me.

Jason Mordan - Timber Framed Buildings of Nottinghamshire.

As Senior Practitioner Historic Buildings at Nottinghamshire County Council and author of the book "Timber framed Building of Nottinghamshire" Jason is well qualified for this talk.

Thursday 16th April 2020

Sam Millard - The Rufford Park Poachers.

This is the true story of an incident that happened on the old Rufford Estate in Sherwood Forest. In October of 1851 a group of poachers from the Mansfield area were confronted by gamekeepers in the employ of the Earl of Scarborough. The resulting violent affray left many injured. One of the gamekeepers died from these injuries. The forces of law and order rounded up likely suspects and, on the thinnest of evidence, they were put before the court. The crime was manslaughter and affray. The sentence for four of the suspects was harsh, 14 years transportation. Given all of the evidence, one of those sentenced was nowhere near the scene at the time.

Matt Beresford - Medieval Graffiti.

A welcome return visit by Matt, Senior Archaeologist at MB Archaeology, he previously gave us an excellent talk about Roman Southwell. He was Project Director for the Derbyshire & Nottinghamshire Medieval Graffiti Survey and this is the fascinating results.

PPG into the New Year

The Collingham Patient Participation Group (PPG) working with Collingham Medical Centre (CMC) have been busy throughout the Autumn working on various initiatives.

The PPG was present at the Community Fair which was held to coincide with one of the Flu Clinics leading to a very successful event, sponsored by Robert Jenrick MP. Although the refreshments were free our generous villagers donated £100 which was given to Collingham Village Care

The Befriending Service was launched in April last year after a feasibility study by the PPG in conjunction with CMC. So far there have been 21 referrals to the service and 7 volunteers to deliver the Befriending have been recruited. We have raised a total of £2845 so far, which has been given to the Befriending Service. We will be hoping to raise a similar amount in 2020.

Once again CMC have held a very successful flu campaign resulting in 80% of patients being vaccinated by the end old October. This is to be commended as it helps with the winter pressures.

In October two members of the PPG visited the Women's Fellowship at the Methodist Church to deliver a presentation about CMC and the role of the PPG. I am always astounded by the opening facts, that CMC delivers their services to over 7000 patients, living in 34 villages and covering 132 square miles and in 2 counties!

There is a dedicated group of PPG members who attend various clinics at CMC to collect information via the FFT. Prior to the PPG members attending the clinic only 1 response was recorded. Over 250 responses have now been collected!





Victor and Albert review by Ian Gerrard Comedy at Coddington Village Hall

A full house at the Hall on 13 December enjoyed a comedy like no other, with audience participation on and off the stage, baffling magic, amusing original music and song, and some very ingenious ad-libbing

when a number of supposed guest artistes unsurprisingly failed to appear (all part of the act of course).

Victor and Albert (real-life twins) are billed as a musical comedy act providing a fun packed evening of entertainment, slap-stick, some very



original poetry, music and non-stop belly laughs. Add in a few double entendres and occasional references to the village (which always amuses the audience even when humorously uncomplimentary), and the result is an hilarious night out.



With cleverly а soundtrack integrated to some of the performance, the duo moved seamlessly from hilarious trick involvina а disappearing squashed banana to an extract from Peter Pan involving five audience

members ranging in age from 6 to sixty something, all of whom enjoyed their few minutes on stage almost as much as the audience. Phil much impressed all of us by actually following the (joking) instruction to do a number of press-ups! You can see the speed of the action by the blurring of the photo!

It's the first time I've seen the whole of the Hall audience on their feet to participate in an act (although some of them needed a little persuading).



Another piece of entertainment was a Houdini-like escape from a strait jacket – inspected for authenticity by Mike and Linda!

The show ended with an encore on the keyboard with the duo very capably playing Bach's Toccata and Fugue with much foolplay, dodging around and in a

variety of contorted positions which had to be seen (and heard) to be believed. The applause was rapturous.



Judging by the amount of laughter throughout the performance I wouldn't be surprised to see them asked back to do another of their many and varied shows.



Coddington Community Centre

As many of you know the Community Centre is a well used facility with many activities throughout the week. Our activities range from baby and toddler groups to fitness classes for adults of all age groups. We have educational groups which focus on GCSE targets and several Badminton groups. The centre is also used by our local Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Ranger Guide units. We have a Friday Coffee morning and the centre is also used as a base for the SNU church on Friday and Sunday evenings. All of these users pay for the use of the car park and have a right to park there.

Our biggest single user of the centre facilities, who do not pay anything, are the few parents of pupils at Coddington School who get in early enough to find a space in the car park. With the growth of the school parking in the local area has become very difficult at drop off and pick up times. The Trustees of the Community Centre are responsible for the safety of people using the facility, recently we became very concerned so the lines were painted and restrictions reinforced. Things are much improved and we are working with the users of the centre to ensure that the spaces are used properly. However we are still seeing people parking on the double yellow lines. Parking is not allowed in these areas to make sure that everyone can see clearly the cars which are moving and to allow people to get out once they have collected their passengers.

Having observed the way the car park is used I can say that on a school morning it works well up to 9am when all the last minute arrivals pull into the car park and just stop where ever to drop off children. We are doing our best to accommodate this with our morning users not stating until about 09:10 am. The afternoon pick up is not so good as people arrive very early to get a space leaving nothing for the parents who have a legitimate reason for arriving as the school finishes

I have been asked if we have plans to close the car park to parents. To me the car park provides a safer environment to drop off and pick up children from school so I do not plan to close the car park. However should there be a safety concern the trustees will discuss any action to be taken to keep people safe. We are having to reserve an area for our users who need to get parked, when the school is opening or closing, to allow them access to the facility they are paying for in order to set up.

It has also be brought to my attention that parents are arriving early to collect their children and sitting with the car engine running to keep warm. Let us think of the environment, if you need to arrive that early put a warmer coat on and turn off your engine.

Unfortunately the Post Office has not attracted enough business, I have been advised that the opening hours will be reduced to 1pm to 3pm.

The Community Centre is a great location for parties and celebrations on a Saturday evening with a good sized car park. Please note when trying to book, the phone number is not always manned but any messages will be answered promptly. I recommend an email of using our booking form which can be found on our website: http://www.coddingtoncommunitycentre.org.uk/

We are still looking to expand our Trustee Membership to help us effectively manage the Community Centre. If you would like to be part of this essential community facility please contact me to find out where you could fit into our organisation. We would love to have your help.

Lastly, if you would be interested in having a say in the running the Community Centre then please contact me and we can have a talk over a tea or coffee.


