Chairman's Report – September 2020

The Annual Parish Meeting due to be held in early April had to be cancelled due to the pandemic lockdown. The Parish Council will organise another meeting next year to discuss ideas for making use of Community Infrastructure Levy funds in the village, and the future of burials in Coddington as the space for burials at the Church is now almost full. We also cancelled the CVN due out in June as the lockdown meant there were very few events to be publicised.

We have continued to hold Parish Council meetings when there are planning items that need to be considered. The meetings are now in a virtual format until at least May 2021, using a combination of Zoom and people dialling in by phone. Members of the public are welcome to these virtual meetings as usual, and agendas with computer access details / phone numbers for meetings are posted on noticeboards around the village, and on the Parish Council website pages at:

A big thank you to the many people who volunteered to help self-isolators with shopping or a friendly phone call during lockdown, and particularly to Leon LeBlanc who developed the system we are using to manage help requests. We had over 20 people volunteer, and although lockdown has ended, we are continuing to operate the Coddington Volunteers scheme as some people still need to self-isolate. See later in this issue for a reminder on how to put in help requests or to volunteer.

Thanks are also due to the Collingham Area Pantry, who have delivered many food parcels to Coddington residents via Coddington School.

Residents and parents with children at Coddington School asked for a one-way system to be introduced along Brownlow's Hill / Main Street on the South side of Beckingham Road, and the petition for this has now been submitted to the County Council.

The Modification Order for Beaconfield Rights of Way has been submitted to the County Council with 33 Evidence of Use forms to add to those already received at County Hall – people are still welcome to submit further User Evidence forms via the Clerk.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH



Rev'd Phil Smith writes:

I find it hard to believe that the last service I attended at All Saints' was back in the middle of March, just a matter of days before our church was impelled to close its doors in an effort to contain the virus. At the same time, I, like many, had to leave my place of regular work – I am a care responder – and told I must now respond from home.

Change is unsettling especially when you do not know what lies ahead and you have to readjust your whole life accordingly. In the midst of this uncertainty there was however one constant – and that was God Himself – no matter what - He was not subject to any close down and was still available to us all which for me has proved so essential.

Having said that it was also essential to continue to engage in worship with others and like many it was to the internet we turned to seek on-line worship and the television listings for additional services help fulfil the void left by our inability to worship God in our normal church setting.

Another advantage, apart from not having to commute to work, has proved additional time and space for more personal prayer time at home. My wife and I have always tried to find a time each day when we can pray together and use the UCB's (United Christian Broadcasters) 'Word for Today' biblical passage and reflection as a basis for our own thoughts and discussion.

It was during such a time together we made the bold decision that as from May 1st we would read a chapter of the Bible every day until we had read it from cover to cover. It was pointed out to us that this was an enormous undertaking that would take us years – really? That person, our vicar Revd Louise was not wrong as there are in fact 1189 chapters in the Bible and at one each day, we are looking at 3 years and 3 months to complete!

It will however be a wonderful journey to have travelled and we look forward each day to getting one step closer.

You will be pleased to know that we have now just finished Exodus and now have the joys of Leviticus to look forward too.

The Bible proves that God is always with us even in the most difficult times and I for one cannot wait to share in His presence again in our churches this coming September.

PLANS TO RESUME SERVICES

Our PCC's have been very busy over recent weeks making plans for the safe re-opening of our church buildings for private prayer and public worship.

Both St Giles and All Saints, Barnby, have opened their doors to visitors wanting some quiet space to pray and reflect and we hope that many across our benefice will feel able to visit either church – St Giles is open each Wednesday between 9 & 11am and All Saints, Barnby, is open each Saturday between 12noon & 3pm. All Saints' Coddington is not open for private prayer just yet.

Over the last few days all three PCC's have met to make plans for resuming public worship and I am now able to inform you that we will be able to gather for worship for the first time on Sunday 6th September.

This is good news and I hope that you will feel able to share in the celebration as we are reunited after spending so long apart. However, we will need to adjust to the new normal and take time to come to terms with the necessity to do things differently. Our priority at all times as we have followed guidance and taken advice, has been the safety and well-being of each and everyone of our congregations and the wider community across the benefice.

With this in mind we intend, from September, to begin with one service of Holy Communion in the benefice each Sunday. The service will start at 10am and the three churches will take turns to host. The pattern is as follows:

From Sunday 6th September:

1st Sunday of the Month the service will be at St Giles, Balderton. 2nd Sunday the service will be at All Saints, Barnby 3rd Sunday the service will be at St Giles, Balderton 4th Sunday the service will be at All Saints' Coddington When there is a 5th Sunday in the Month the service will be at St Giles

In addition to these services, there will be a service of Holy Communion at 10.00 am every Thursday at St Giles.

There will be a restriction on the numbers of people attending a service, so with that in mind, if you are able to come along to the service each Thursday at St Giles, you will be helping to free up a space for someone else at a Sunday service.

It is our prayer that, as restrictions ease, we will be in a position to add more services to this plan, but that very much depends on circumstances, going forward and the capacity of our team.

Clearly, this is very different from what we have been used to and the services will feel very strange as we, at this point, cannot sing hymns and take part in some aspects of worship as we would like. But the important point is that we can gather to pray, share in worship and celebrate Holy Communion and as we do, we can expect God to continue to lead us through this time of upheaval and change.

I would like to encourage you to join us at a service, if you are able. It doesn't matter which church you choose to come along to; we are all part of the same family within the benefice, with a real desire to build new and lasting relationships with the communities of Balderton, Barnby and Coddington.

In many ways, this time can feel like a new beginning as we discover more about God's love for all of us and how we can play our part in demonstrating his love to the people we live and work alongside.

Covid-19 has had a huge impact on how we live our lives and its impact has been devastating for many. Each of us is coming to terms with change in some form or other and that can be incredibly difficult. For many, the closed church building has been a symbol of absence of the Church at a time when it was needed most and for many of us that is a huge sadness and regret. My prayer for Balderton, Barnby and Coddington is that over the coming months we will establish new ways of being a blessing to our neighbours as we share our stories and celebrate alongside each other once again.

Village Hall News

Goodness what a year! The Village Hall Trustees hope to be able to reopen the hall fully soon, but there is much to be done with risk assessments and actions concerned with keeping our users and volunteers as safe as possible

Just before the lockdown we were very pleased to hear from the Charities Commission that we have successfully registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation with a new Registered Charity Number 1188363. This new CIO will actually own the hall when the transfer of assets etc is complete – previously old charities such as ours were not permitted to do so and it was held by a section of the Charity Commission. The new organisation comes with limited liability status similar to that of a limited company. Elsewhere in the newsletter you will find notification of the meeting to formally handover from the old charity to the new.

We did have some good news during the lockdown too, firstly that we were eligible for the £10,000 government grant which was available to most businesses. Secondly that we had made a successful grant application to the Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation who have pledged £10,000 towards the extension and alterations – we just need to raise the rest now! Actually, more good news is that we were able to use the hall's quiet time to spend some of the government grant to get the hall floor resurfaced so it looks wonderful again now.

The monthly maintenance morning (1st Monday of the month) was able to restart in July with a limited number of helpers doing various suitably socially distanced jobs including re-painting the floor in the Ladies toilets and catching up with the gardening. Hopefully more can be done before officially re- opening.

It would be nice to have another volunteer (or team of two) once a month for an hour or so to check that the hall is clean and fully equipped with hand towels and loo rolls and to help with the regular weekly cleaning. If you can help, please get in touch.

Live and Local.

Unfortunately our March (La Bella and the Lost Chord of Ulaanbaatar) had to be cancelled for obvious reasons. For a while the "Live and Local" team at Warwick were very concerned for the future of the scheme as a whole and of course it is still somewhat curtailed. The good news is that **probably** we will be able to have another performance this year. We are aiming at December and of course all the relevant Government Guidelines will be observed so there will need to be a limit on numbers attending. The smaller audience will have a small impact on the ticket price but fortunately a survey of our regular supporters explaining the situation showed a unanimous agreement that a modest increase would be reasonable and that many were anxious to see live entertainment again. More news on this later – many of you are on the emailing list and it will be announced there first.

Village Hall Help needed please!

A VE day street party led to an 80th birthday celebrations for Falkland veteran Michael Scarborough. When residents of Newark Road, Coddington realised that Michael would be all alone for his 80th birthday they clubbed together to buy a celebration cake of HMS Belfast and his favourite tipple, a bottle of rum.

We all congregated to sing 'Happy Birthday', resident Bruce Richmond provided music of the era and we all toasted him and enjoyed a slice of cake with him.

It all started with residents clapping for the NHS on a Thursday evening, this resulted in a street party for VE day. Bruce Richmond has compiled photos of the street party and also of Michael's 80th to remember a unique time in our history.

My house was built about 1936. I have lived in the village all my life. A man who worked with my Father at Ransome and Marles lived in it first and in 1938 when he moved somewhere else, he persuaded my Dad to take on the mortgage. It was 10 shillings a month and that was a killer for my Dad. Mum and Dad had to go and get extra jobs doing gardening, house cleaning and things like that.

When I was at school (now the Scout Hall), the infants had the room where we go in now. Seniors were in the left hand room. In the large hall on the right were the juniors and at the other end was the gym and music room. There were sliding doors that divided the big hall. Later on when school dinners came in we used that end for school dinners. The dinners were cooked at the Tech. and brought to the school. My Mother and Mrs Wilbey were the first ladies to sort out the dinners.

When School first started to move to the new building. My Mother moved to the new school. At the new school they had their own kitchen. Mrs Wilbey who was serving meals from the Tech. and Mother were interviewed for new job, Mrs Wilbey's lasted for half an hour. Mother went in and was asked the Question " What is the difference cooking for 60 children and cooking at home" she replied "Common sense" and she got the job as cook. Mrs Moore was the supervisor at the time and later when she retired, the headmaster asked my mother why she had not applied for the job and she said she didn't have the qualifications listed, his reply was "Never mind you have got the job". He had been waiting for her to apply for the job because Mrs Moore was continually off ill and Mother used to take over anyway. Mother stayed at the school till she retired at 65.

When I was a lad we used to play around the limekiln and quarry. The pit itself was very large (or so it seemed to us as kids). It was the last field before you come to Greenways. The kiln is directly in front of the field that was the quarry. Dug for stone then filled in as a council tip till it caught fire. It burnt for many years and they put loads of sand on it first and that didn't put it out so they then started putting on the soil. The farmer regained a sizable field once it was filled in. It was divided into two fields but now it one large field again.

I have tried to remember the date when I moved down to The Mount School. They closed the senior part of the school and just had Juniors and Infants. During my teenage years there was scouts in the village, the leader I thought was Mr Townsend but I have since found out his name was Town. He ran a small group of Scouts, we met in a hayloft on one of the farms, and there were no Cubs here then. Later on I moved to Sea Cadets in town. We had a M.T.B. at Newark Wharf that attracted a lot of people. It was a very strong cadet force with its H.Q. in a building behind the Advertisers office. We used the chapel at the Friary for our Main Stores.

The school dentist was based at the Friary, he always smelled of whiskey. It later moved up Appletongate to an upstairs room between the Church Garden and Bridge Street.

When R.A.F. Winthorpe was active they used to store documents in the building that stood on the side of Beaconfield Drive (the last building to be knocked down a few years ago) and in the late 1950's we boys got in there and got the paperwork with all the details of the new Canberra aeroplane!!

On the path at the back of the yew wood back down towards the new A17 bypass, along the concrete road was one of the coal stores for the RAF Camp. It had a fence all round it and that was where they issued the coal. The military used to paint the coal blancho so when the guard went round at night they could see if any had been pinched away!!

The indoor arena at Beaconfield farm is built on top of the old Sick Quarters attached to RAF Winthorpe.

The group of friends I hung around with were Bob Bailey, David Andrews, Barry and Brian Hansard, the Boswells and Frobishers.

I went into the Navy in 1955, a fortnight after leaving school. I enjoyed it straight away, but the discipline was terrible. When I was at Vincent, the tried an experiment and a group of borstal lads came down, within two days they dumped all their kit on the parade ground and demanded to be sent back to borstal, they just could not take it.

When I joined at 15 it was 50% schoolwork, 25% drill and 25% gunnery. You earned certificates alongside your Naval Certificates. It was very strict, they gave you 5 minutes to get out of bed and dressed, if you didn't then you had to roll up your mattress with all you bedding and clothes and run round the parade ground in your pyjamas whether it was raining, snowing or whatever. We were in a 3-storey building and if you didn't get up straight away, there were some fire buckets at the top of the stairs and the Officers would push them down the stairs making a loud racket!!

I was on the Belfast. I spent my 21st birthday in Hong Kong and my 22nd in Vancouver. I went back to "school" at HMS Excellent" every so often for further training.

I got to many interesting places, most of the world in fact, especially aboard "Hermes", within 9 weeks of leaving England - Trinidad, Grand Cayman Islands and New Orleans for Mardi Gras week. I saw most of the parades, Penti Cola, back down to Fort Lauderdale then up to Bermuda for 4 days. Cruise ships don't see as much as that!

One of my favourite places was Hong Kong for the life; then again I liked the South Pacific because there was nothing laid on. You had to make your own entertainment.

I was in Tonga (Friendly Isles) for the Coronation of the King, son of Queen Saloti. It's a lovely island it had 1 club and 2 hotels. The Post Office was interesting; they had huge tinfoil stamps that the postmistress had to cut. They started off as round ones and took the shape of a banana and all sorts shapes.

When I was in Hong Kong I had two suits made, one was Mohair and Silk mix with a bright red lining and it only cost £10. You could not get it for that price anywhere else! It took 48 hours to make. You didn't go to the shop, the tailor came on board took your measurements and brought back the suit 48 hours later. If you put more than a 33% deposit you got a silk tie thrown in for free!!

I served in the Falklands on board the "Hermes" I was 5 miles away from the "Sheffield" when she went down. I was presented with a Certificate from Newark Town Council at the end of the war.

At the end of each commission on a ship you were given a commission book, they have the history of the ship. My grandest is from the "Ark Royal".

On board you did 3-hour watches normally; if you were on "action station" you did 4 hours on 4 hours off. When we left a ship we would all go on leave and then on to our next ship.

While I was in the Navy I met Prince Charles he was more at ease with the ordinary sailor than the officers.

I believe that the centre of Newark castle is filled with Coddington Stone. The lower part of the two mill houses that were on Clay Lane near

the windmill were of Coddington Stone as is the Friary in Newark. The way those two cottages were built was terrible. The two up two down had branches for floor joists and single brick walls. It wouldn't be allowed today for habitation. There were two other cottages opposite Hilltop Farm and over time they have been turned into one house and extended.

What really upsets me today is the covering of the brickwork on the windmill with that black paint, years ago it only had a band of black around it mid way up. It was still a working mill in my younger days, the sails were still on it but we were told that they were no longer used. David Andrews or maybe Martin Searson, who are a little older than me, might remember what happened to the sails.

I think the moat was part of the monastery. It was mentioned when Newark Castle was exchanged. The Bishop of Lincoln swapped Stow for Newark and in the deeds it mentions "one good fish pond" and that is a good fishpond. There is a sluice system leading from the moat to the fishpond opposite the school. The fry would be bred in the top pond near the moat and when big enough let through to the fishpond .No body seems to be sure of what was in the middle of the moat. There was a well in the middle of the moat when we were kids.

I read in a sort of "Who's Who" of Notts, and Derbyshire that when Colonel Thorpe bought Beaconfield he demolished a medieval house and replaced it with a great mansion. He was reported to be one of the richest men in England in malting and plaster.

I have a piece of the fountain in my back garden that I saved when they were talking of having a caravan site there. I also have a tap that once was part of the hot houses.

I remember some of the older people in Coddington speaking of going up some steps to a pub but I thought it was near the maltings, opposite the Green.

The three storey building on Main Street was a long row of two up, two down houses with a third floor. I'm not sure what the top floor was for.

Off Clay Lane was the isolation hospital and if you walk along there, the war trenches are still visible and the remains of the lime kilns. They were also a great place to play when we were children. When they put the cycle track in they should have joined it up to Clay Lane then you would be able to ride all the way into Newark.

The garage and cafe on the top of Beaconhill was white, it had a bowed end on the Newark side and at the other end it was flat, almost boat shaped. It was a cafe downstairs and a large dance hall upstairs where they had children's parties with Punch and Judy. In later years they ran a taxi service and had a fish and chips business. It was very much Art Deco inside and out. There were a lot of people who complained when it was pulled down.

The black and white house that was pulled down to make way for the A1 belonged to the Gilberts, Mr Gilbert was an inventor, and his main invention was the tubular fire escape still in use today. I think that Catch'em Inn was so called because it was one end of the Turnpike, to catch people who tried to get by without paying. Of course it was also an inn because of the curfew. If you were too late to get into Newark then you had to get a bed for the night. The Turnpike came through the village to Sleaford.

I took the photographs of what was left of the outbuildings of the Hall just before the buildings were demolished and the bricks were reclaimed. They show what was left of Freddie Boor's house and the hothouses, the coach house that has been refurbished recently.

Coronavirus Information Service on WhatsApp

The Government has launched a GOV.UK Coronavirus Information service on WhatsApp. The new free to use service aims to provide official, trustworthy and timely information and advice about coronavirus (COVID-19), and will further reduce the burden on NHS services.

To use the free GOV.UK Coronavirus Information Service on WhatsApp, simply add 07860 064422 in your phone contacts and then message the word 'hi' in a WhatsApp message to get started.

A set of menu options is then presented which the user can choose from and then be sent relevant guidance from GOV.UK pages as well as links to GOV.UK for further information.

MyNotts App.

Nottinghamshire County Council has launched a new mobile phone app – MyNotts which is now available to download.

The MyNotts app will make it quicker, easier and more convenient to access council services. It can be used to:

- Receive updates on school closures, check when holidays are and apply for school places.
- Report highways issues including potholes, faulty streetlights and overgrown vegetation.
- Find household waste and recycling centres and see what can be taken there.
- Access information about care services offered by Nottinghamshire County Council
- See what events are happening and keep up to date with news from across Nottinghamshire.

This is only the first phase of the app's development. Nottinghamshire County Council welcomes feedback on areas for improvement which can be sent directly via the app's 'feedback' section.

Notes from Collingham Medical Centre (CMC) with the Patient Participation Group (PPG)

All support at CMC is initially via telephone triage; online booking of appointments suspended until 2021. Clinical triage by telephone enables the clinical team to keep all safe - supporting either by telephone or faceto-face through the appropriate entrance zone. RED, AMBER and GREEN zones are operating within the surgery to ensure distancing.

RED is for patients with symptoms of COVID who will be asked to wait in their car and a staff member in full PPE will come to them. The patient will be asked to put on a mask before a consultation in the RED room at the end of the doctors' corridor. The rooms will be deep cleaned after each use.

AMBER is for shielded high risk patients who are asked to wait in their own car before being being shown to the AMBER room. This is so isolated patients can maintain their isolation bubble.

GREEN is for patients with non COVID symptoms who need to be seen by a practitioner after telephone triage. The waiting room is spaced to accommodate 6 patients only.

Pharmacy deliveries will continue for shielded patients until the end of June when CMC will review this in line with Government advice which is expected imminently. Those patients who are over 70 are being asked to consider alternative arrangements from July; it maybe that it is appropriate for the Pharmacy to set up a chargeable delivery service to those who wish to remain socially distant or for convenience.

The practice waits further guidance around whether a face covering should be worn in the surgery and there are measures in place (sneeze screens and distance marks in the Pharmacy and CMC reception) to help everyone reduce risks of transmission.

The meeting room is being used as a second dispensary until 2021 so that teams can work at a distance to maintain dispensing services on site.

Plans for the Saturday flu clinics are being put in place, provisionally for 26th Sept, 10th October and 31st October. Access will be strictly one-way with 2m spacing.

Eligible patients are being invited for pneumonia vaccinations now.

The telephone system is working well with 90% of calls being answered in one minute. The uptake for the NHS app is increasing and all are encouraged to download it.

The PPG have resumed meetings via Zoom. We have 2 vacancies and would love to hear from anyone who is interested. Please contact Linda on 07972 300346 or linda.dales@lindadales.co.uk
