Chairman's Report - December 2020

At the time of writing we are about to leave the recently introduced Tier 3 of the COVID-19 restrictions in Nottinghamshire, and to start the second lock-down across England from early November, lasting until at least early December and possibly longer. In these circumstances the Parish Council have unfortunately decided that they cannot host the Carols round the Tree event at the Community Centre this year due to the social distancing restrictions in place.

We are continuing to operate the volunteering scheme in Coddington as although the number of requests for help have dropped off these may increase under this new lockdown. See later in this issue for a reminder on how to put in help requests or to volunteer. Thank you to all the volunteers who have helped so far, and to the Collingham Area Pantry, who have continued to deliver many food parcels to Coddington residents via Coddington School. Food and cash donations can be made to the Pantry, and I would like to thank Coddington Trust Fund who made a large donation earlier this year. The contact details for the Pantry can be found at:

Rev'd Louise writes:

SHINE A LIGHT THIS CHRISTMAS

I'm sure I'm not the only one who will be pleased to see the back of this year. 2020 has been a challenge on so many levels and there is no aspect of our lives, as individuals or as community, that hasn't been impacted by Covid-19. Back in March, as the first lockdown began, we were hopeful that by this time in the year things would have returned to normal, or almost at least, but here we are, facing the prospect of a very different kind of Christmas.

And yet, in the midst of the anxiety and despite personal hardship, members of the community have rallied to offer support and step in where national provision has fallen short. Out of the darkness has emerged the light of neighbour caring for neighbour, new friendships and groups joining forces to take care of the most vulnerable members of society. As time passes it is becoming increasingly clear that we cannot go back 'to normal' but we can look forward together to a 'new normal' and we can all play a part in bringing that about.

On 1st December the Church begins the journey through the season of Advent. This time offers the opportunity to reflect on what we hope for as we prepare for the celebration of Christmas Day, not in the sense of what gifts we hope to receive, but what good we hope for in our lives and the lives of our loved ones. As we prepare to remember the birth of Jesus, who was heralded as the Prince of Peace, we are invited to consider what makes for a peace-filled life.

Perhaps more than ever, this year, we would benefit from taking time to think about that. Of course, Advent can be a very busy time too, with the preparations for Christmas; the shopping for presents and food. It can also be a time of heightened anxiety for many, with the added financial pressure, alongside the prospect of spending time with family members with whom we don't always see eye to eye.

So, I wonder if this year, in response to the restrictions and the changes we are facing, we think about how we can celebrate the season of Christmas in a way that brings light to our community.

Maybe as well as our chocolate Advent calendar, we could have an Advent 'To Do List'. Each day through December, we could commit to doing something to help our community. It doesn't have to be a grand gesture; a litter pick, a donation to a local charity, a phone call to a lonely neighbour, a smile.

Research suggests that helping others is good for our own well-being and now, I believe, is the time to consider what kind of community we want to live in and take action to make it our reality.

Perhaps you could think about having an Advent candle this year too, as well as a calendar, and as you light it each day remember that Jesus called himself the light of the world. The thing about light is that it dispels darkness, but darkness cannot dispel the light. We can follow in his footsteps by committing ourselves to being a light in the darkness for others through our acts of kindness. Let's do that together this Advent.

Have a peace-filled Christmas.

BONUS BALL FUNDRAISER

To date we have had several different winners all receiving £25 each.

How it works - the bonus ball drawn on the National Lottery on the 1st Saturday of each month is the winning number for our fundraising scheme. BURIAL SURVEY



The churchyard of All Saints, Coddington has a limited number of burial spaces remaining and once they have been filled the Church may apply for closure of the churchyard when responsibility for maintenance of the grounds would pass to the Parish or District Council. There would still be provision for interment of cremated remains.

The only piece of land which is owned by

the Parish Council is Page's Wood on Balderton Lane, and it has been suggested that the area could be partially cleared to provide a green burial site as an environmentally-friendly alternative to traditional burials and for scattering of ashes.

Before any discussions go ahead, the Parish Council would like to know the views of residents on how important it is to them to have the capacity for new graves within the village and what type of provision they would prefer.

The following questions can be answered through a survey on the village website, by email to coddingtonpc@hotmail.com or delivered by hand to the post boxes at the Community Centre or the Village Hall.

How important, on a scale of 1-5 (where 1 is very important and 5 is of no importance) is it to you to have a burial plot in the village?

How many years have you lived in Coddington?

Which road do you live on?

Would you expect your Parish Council to provide an additional burial ground within the village?

If so, would you prefer a formal cemetery or an environmentally-friendly green burial site?

CODDINGTON VILLAGE HALL NEWS

Covid 19

There is much to report despite the limitations of Covid.

The hall is available for hire to any group who can legally meet under the regulations in place at the time.

The trustees have taken steps to ensure that the building is as Covid secure as is possible.

We have reduced the available hire space to the main hall with one male and one female WC.

The kitchen area and small hall becomes an emergency room for the isolation of anyone developing symptoms while at the hall and must not be used for other purposes. Users requiring refreshments must bring everything they need to prepare and consume them and take them away afterwards.

The hall is professionally cleaned weekly and once a month is treated with a fogging agent which prevents the virus settling on all the surfaces. Users must still wipe down after use with the materials provided. The move to professional cleaning has meant that the hourly rental has been increased to £10 per hour fully inclusive, still good value for the facilities available.

Governance

As reported in the last CVN the trustees are in the process of changing the trust to a CIO.

A Charitable Incorporated Organisation is an incorporated form of charity which is not a limited company

It only has to register with the Charity Commission and not Companies House

It is only created once it is registered by the Charity Commission It is a legal entity that can enter into contracts in its own right It has trustees who will not have any liability for the debts of the CIO in normal circumstances.

The procedure is lengthy and involves creating an entirely new charity to run in parallel with the existing one until the assets are transferred and the old charity is wound up. We are grateful to our secretary Carolyn Whiting for doing all of the paperwork to achieve this outcome.

The new trustees (in practice the same people) will serve with myself as chairman and the same officers in post.

Bernard Allen had already decided to stand down at this time but will continue to serve as chairman of the old charity until it is wound up in the new year.

Work parties

We have continued with 'socially distanced' work parties during the pandemic, the concrete floors in the 1885 building have been repainted and the usual autumnal task of removing leaves from the gutters and pruning the overhanging hedges and trees completed. The gardening team have engaged in the mystic task of moving plants around.

All maintenance activities are balanced against the plans to restore and insulate the older building and replace the toilets and entrance with a new block at the rear of the old building.

Fundraising for this project continues but most grant monies are currently directed toward Covid related activity.

Coddington History Group WW2 Memories Irene Bell

I was born in 1935 at Bootle, Liverpool, my father was Harold Southward a fireman and my mother was Elizabeth (nee Toy) and she was a fire watcher. Ours was a modern house with electricity, gas, hot & cold water,

To help with the war effort they both collected scrap metal which could be melted down, railings and



any scrap metal eg old kettles. They both helped to put fires out after bombings. One of the first things I can remember is my mother making Blackout Curtains with her sewing machine.

In those days everything was recycled:- milk was delivered to your house every day in glass milk bottles which had to be returned, when you returned beer and lemonade bottles you got a penny, old newspapers were taken to be used as wrapping paper for your fish and chips, nothing was wasted. Nobody wasted food, if you did not eat it at one meal you got it for the next one.

I had a sister Edith and I had a much older brother Edward who was in the army regimental number 3782911 Royal Corps Signals, Paratrooper 1st Airborne. Unfortunately he was killed on the 20th September 1944 aged 21 at Arnhem.

I went to Roberts Drive Junior School in Bootle, when I was eleven I went to Bootle Girls Grammar School, my favourite subject at school was reading, I played Hockey and Netball for the School. I remember the school issuing us with gas masks and I thought they were horrible things.

Presents were thin on the ground at Christmas and birthdays due to little money being available, like most children. The presents were books and small gifts in a stocking.

One of my early memories was my brother lifting me out of bed and talking me down stairs in to the garden to the "Anderson Shelter", along with mum, dad and sister Edith, along with a kettle, tea etc. I do not think there were any evacuees in our area due to our close proximity to Liverpool.

Most people listened to the news on radio every night and Churchill's speeches. Several people listened to "Lord Haw Haw". The favourite programmes were:- **Comedians**:- Frankie Howard, Tommy Trinder, Arthur Haynes, Charlie Chester, Arthur Askey. **Popular music**:- Flanagan & Allen:- "Run Rabbit Run", "We're going to hang out the

washing on the Siegfried Line", Vera Lynn:- "There'll always be an England", "There'll be Bluebirds over the White Cliffs of Dover" and "We'll meet again", Gracie Fields:- "We'll meet again", "Sally", "Wish me luck as you wave us goodbye", "Bless'em All", "In the mood", "Don't fence me in", "The sun has got it's hat on", "Leaning on a lamp post", "The White Cliffs of Dover", "Sing as we go", "Roll out the barrel", "Biggest Aspidistra in the World", "A Nightingale sang in Berkeley Square", "Fred Fanakapan", Walter Walter", "There'll always be an England", "Kiss me Goodnight Sergeant Major". Richard Tauber:- "Pedro the Fisher man is always whistling", "Girls were made to love and kiss", "We'll gather lilacs in the spring". Glen Miller:- "In the Mood", Bing Crosby:- "Don't Fence Me In", Marlene Detrich:- "Lili Marlene"; there were many other popular songs which I can't remember. There were many other popular singers:- Petula Clark, Ronnie Ronald; Orchestras:- Glen Miller and Tommy Dorsey. Apologies to those I have missed.

I remember the Air Raid Sirens going off followed later by German bombers then the terrible noise when the bombs went off followed by the fires.

Food rationing did not affect us too much, dad grew potatoes and carrots in the garden, our uncle was a farmer in Wales so we got some food from him including damsons, we never went hungry. There were no fruit in the shop which could not be grown in England:- bananas, grapes, pineapples, lemons and oranges.

One night dad lifted me out of bed when I was fast asleep and took me down to the front gate, all the neighbours were out and all of a sudden all the street lights came on and everyone cheered and cried, the war had finished.

The biggest lasting event for all the family was my brother being killed. Mum and Dad never got over it and mum was in poor health for the rest of her life.

My sister and I went to the 50th Anniversary of Arnhem, a big parade and we met some very old soldiers in the Parade who remembered their old mate Teddy. A very moving moment, they were with him when he was killed.

December 2012

Irene & James moved from London in the 1980's to Coddington, they both became very involved with village life.

James worked for Daylay at Bilsthorpe, he became a very active Parish Councillor. Both James & Irene were active members of the church and were very involved in the running of the Village Hall. They both helped run the village Friday bowls club in the village hall then in the Community Centre.

Very soon after she came to live in the village Irene joined the WI and was soon on the committee and for many years she became an excellent secretary. She was always involved with the WI drama group and always helped out at the village Seniors Christmas lunch. Irene was very sadly missed when she moved to Kent.

Irene moved to Farnborough in 2015 to be nearer her family after James died in June 2013.

Very sadly Irene died in October 2020, she is a very much missed in the village life.

We will be holding 3 Saturday morning flu clinics on

Saturday 26 September 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 10 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 31 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm

We are aiming to vaccinate 100% of eligible patients this year, as defined by NHS guidelines. We may be able to open our offer beyond those eligible after 31 October 2020 (dependent on stocks/uptake).

Due to COVIDsocial distancing measures, our Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand unaided for up to 20 minutes. No seating available. Vaccinations will be administered with patients stood up and a strict one-way system through the Practice will be in operation.

Face masks must be worn. Please attend alone, unless a family member is also booked for flu vaccination.

For patients with mobility issues we will be holding weekday flu clinics. Our PCAs will triage at the time of booking.

MyNotts App.

Nottinghamshire County Council has launched a new mobile phone app — MyNotts which is now available to download.

The MyNotts app will make it quicker, easier and more convenient to access council services. It can be used to:

- Receive updates on school closures, check when holidays are and apply for school places.
- Report highways issues including potholes, faulty streetlights and overgrown vegetation.
- Find household waste and recycling centres and see what can be taken there.
- Access information about care services offered by Nottinghamshire County Council
- See what events are happening and keep up to date with news from across Nottinghamshire.

This is only the first phase of the app's development. Nottinghamshire County Council welcomes feedback on areas for improvement which can be sent directly via the app's 'feedback' section.

A Virtual PPG

The Patient Participation Group (PPG) with Collingham Medical Centre(CMC) had a virtual meeting recently. Due to the Covid-19 situation regular PPG events and activities have been suspended for the rest of the year. However, members are busy keeping the posters on village notice boards up to date and sharing information within the parishes.

The CMC has welcomed some new staff members: Dr Jatin Shar and Dr Anangoor Suresh. CMC continue is a Training Practice and are supporting 2 GP Registrars - Dr Freddie Reynolds and Dr Catherine McGillivray for the next 3-4 months and they will return to CMC for their final year in GP Specialist Training.

The CMC continue to operate a full telephone triage system to support patients and signpost to the right support incl. red, amber or green entrances to the building. We will continue to use the car park and patients' cars for waiting (rather than entering the building) for our amber and red triaged patients. This will continue throughout Winter.

Masks

Patients are asked to wear a mask when entering the CMC. As a clinician needs to support you within 2 metres the clinical team are wearing full PPE for all consultations. The non-clinical staff can maintain 2m distancing (i.e. behind the sneeze screens) and can work in a COVID safe way without masks. All areas are well ventilated and touch points in communal areas cleaned 3 times daily and after every patient in a consultation room.

Flu clinics

In addition to weekday clinics, three Saturday Flu Clinics are being held on

26 September; 10 October and 31 October - 8.15am - 12.30 pm.

Due to Covid-19 distancing measures the Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand for 20 minutes. There will be no seating available. Vaccinations will be administered whilst standing and a strict one-way system will be in operation. Face masks must be worn and please attend alone unless a family member or a 'bubble' member is also booked for a vaccination. Patients with mobility issues will be able to attend a weekday flu clinic. Please telephone to book your flu vaccination and the PCAs will signpost you to the appropriate clinic for

your needs. Housebound patients and those in Care Homes will be vaccinated ahead of the flu clinics.

* Please note that people in the 50 to 64-year-old age group will not be vaccinated until November and December, providing there is sufficient vaccine, and no appointments will be offered for this age group until then. This is to ensure that those who are most at risk are vaccinated first. If you are 50 to 64 and you are in one of the other groups which is eligible for the flu vaccination, for example you have a health condition which puts you at risk from flu, you will be invited earlier.

Pharmacy deliveries

Government funding for pharmacy delivery for those who were shielding has come to an end. CMC and Collingham Pharmacy continue delivery for those who are deemed high risk. Collingham Village Care (CVC) continue to collect prescriptions for some patients and will continue to do so if requested by a patient.

Befriending in conjunction with the Newark Live at Home scheme continues with 17 patients being supported. Good news is that a further 4 volunteers came forward from the Collingham Community Conversation virtual meetings.

The next PPG meeting is not until December when we will hold the AGM but, in the meantime, we will focus on support for communications to relay key messages for patients via newsletters, magazine articles and posters.

The Centre is ideally positioned just off the A1 to cater for organisations to use us for meetings and training sessions. Under current conditions our main hall can accommodate around 25 people and our function room can accommodate around 10 people with social distancing. Our car park can hold 35 cars and has 3 disabled bays.

In order to recover from the lockdowns we plan to start fund raising. We have some ideas and would welcome more. If you enjoy running fund raising events then please get in touch.

We need more trustees, please do not think we will suddenly give you work to do - this is not the case. Our Trustees meet every 2 months to discuss our responsibilities and how best to achieve them.

The changes to our constitution along with the setting up of a new charity to continue the work is in progress. We are moving from an organisation which relied on a voting membership to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation which has many benefits for us.

We have set aside an area of the car park beside the school to allow for socially distance gathering of parents at school times. This area is normally segregated by cones. If they have been moved and are not in place at school time please put them back out if you are first there. Sometimes we may have a need to remove them out of school hours and cannot always get back to replace them.
