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#### Chairman's Report – September 2021

As requests for help under the Coddington Volunteer scheme have dried up as more people have been fully vaccinated, it has been decided to close the scheme until it is needed again. A big thank you to the many people who volunteered to help self-isolators with shopping, prescriptions or a friendly phone call during the Covid19 pandemic.

I would also like to thank the Trustees of the two charities that manage the Community Centre and the Village Hall, providing an essential service as volunteers keeping these important facilities in the village open for us all to enjoy.

The Parish Council has continued to follow up ideas from the Annual Parish Meeting, with proposals for new benches around the village to encourage walking, and also new litter bins in locations where there are none nearby to reduce littering. Thank you to Councillor Theo Parkhouse for cutting back overgrown hedging restricting footpath 3A from Beckingham Road to Drove Lane, following concerns about unsafe access.

Funds have been allocated by County Council Highways to provide a safer pedestrian and cycle route to Stapleford Woods, as support for this was very strong from residents to improve access to this local amenity.

Highways are waiting until traffic levels return to normal before installing monitoring equipment prior to developing the proposal for a one-way system on Post Office Row / Main Street.

We look forward to hearing more from the District Council on their proposals for securing access to Thorpe Oaks playing fields following the recent repeat visit by travellers.

#### A PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM MR MIKE BACHE



I have recently had the opportunity to reflect upon my time at All Saints' Coddington.

I have been the Reader, a Licenced Lay Minister, at All Saints' Church since 2004, and I have been preaching and taking services at Coddington for over 15 years,

At the age of 74, I have taken the decision to retire from my duties as a Reader, so that I can spend more time with my family.

Coddington church is uniquely placed and is well known for its famous William Morris windows and its significance with Constance Penswick Smith and Mothering Sunday, and it has been an absolute pleasure to be a part of it.

As a Reader, I realise that we have come a

long way since I first started.

In 2004 Reverend Jim Healey encouraged me to enter training as a Reader. He also retired in the same year, and the church was placed 'in vacancy' (we had no vicar).. After 3 years of training, I gained the Bishop's licence, and with the help of retired Clergy in the village – the Reverend Christine Eagger and Reverend Sylvia Stevens, between us we provided a service each week at Coddington.

The church did not join Newark Parish until 2009.

The church was again placed 'in vacancy' in 2016 and did not join the united benefice of Balderton, Barnby-in-the-Willows and Coddington until 2018. Again, a period of 2 years when retired clergy and myself ensured that the church continued to receive a service each week.

My personal connection to the church, however, goes back for over 40 years.

My youngest daughter Helen, was baptised at Coddington and as adults both Dawn (my eldest daughter) and Helen were married there, and their children have also been baptised at Coddington, in their turn. It is in essence our family church.

I have lost count of the number of services I have taken but, for many years I led services for Mothering Sunday, Good Friday reflections, Harvest Festival, Remembrance Sunday, Christingle, Lessons and Carols, as well as leading regular services of Evening Prayer. There were special services for the commemoration of World War 1 and days for quiet spiritual reflection on many occasions. It was always something special when the children visited the church, whether it be for curriculum visits, end of term service, or festivals, where the school choir sang for us. Working with the children at our services was always a pleasure. Giving out flowers on Mothering Sunday, the receiving of harvest produce for the benefit of others, and who can forget Bodger and Bodge and the remaking of the Christingle!, or the alternative Christingle made from a red cabbage and broccoli stalks.

Christmas saw sketches from disturbed shepherds seeking help from psychiatrists and all manner of other plays put on for special occasions.

It was a pleasure to administer Holy Communion to those who could not attend church, and we even started a café church at Well Green on Monday mornings for those who didn't make church the previous day.

My records show that I was involved with over 100 funerals, at Coddington and the surrounding parishes, and this was a ministry which was particularly important for bereaved families.

For the last 7 years I have been the church representative on the Coddington Trust Fund

In all my time, my mission has been to put a new perspective on the church and take a fresh approach to talking about scripture, to make it friendly, welcoming, warming, and refreshing.

I have worked with 12 different clergy ministers during my time at Coddington.

All this has been achieved with the fantastic support of my wife Sheila, who has stood by me and encouraged me throughout my ministry, and the support given by the people of Coddington village.

Upon my reflections, I can honestly say that I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as your Reader/Lay Minister, leading you in worship at All Saints.

My thanks to everyone at All Saints for the retirement gifts and cards.

I hope to see many of you in and around the village from time to time.

I wish all those who are to carry the church forward all my very best wishes and under their steerage hope that the church continues to thrive well into the future.

#### Brant Broughton CE Methodist Primary School's Refugee Project

Pupils at Brant Broughton have been learning about the work of the Mandala Trust charity and have completed a sponsored walk to raise funds for this.

During the Summer Term, the Pandas class (Year 5 and 6 pupils) had been studying the work of the Mandala Trust Charity as part of the 'Where is Home?' project. They have studied the effects of homelessness and in particular the plight of refugees across the globe.

The children replicated a refugee experience by bringing their possessions to school in a bag during the evening and carrying them, and containers of water, as they hiked around the village. After their walk, they returned to school to visit the soup kitchen where they could have pasta, lentils and rice before playing their homemade refugee games on the field and settling round the campfire to reflect on their experiences so far. As the stars came out, they prepared their bedding and slept outside on the field with only a hedgehog for company!

Refugee Jack, said, "At one point I did some sketching to take a moment away from the hustle and bustle of the evening. This helped me to reflect on the tricky times other refugees might be going through while moving or living away from their home."

The children collected sponsorship money from family and friends for the Mandala Trust charity and this is already over £400 – they are aiming for £500 before the end of the term.

The experience is typical of the ones pupils have at Brant Broughton CE Primary where the focus of all termly projects is on one of the United Nations Goals of Sustainability.

"Here at Brant Broughton CE Methodist Primary School, we work hard to ensure that children understand that not only are they part of a community here in the village, but also play a big part in the global community who we seek to support in any way we can. We want children to grow up understanding that they can make a big difference in the world." Mrs Bedford (Headteacher).

Brant Broughton is a small, friendly primary school of around 100 pupils. We have spaces for Reception pupils in September 2021 and in some other year groups. #### Keeping you and your family safe

The chances of you or a member of your family becoming a victim of a violent crime, a robbery or another crime against the person, are low. Crimes against a person by strangers in public places are still rare and account for a very small part of recorded crime.

However, you can make yourself even less likely to be the victim of a personal crime by taking a few sensible precautions. Many are common sense, and may be things that you already do. Making yourself safer doesn't mean changing your entire lifestyle, personality or wardrobe, and it doesn't mean never going out at all.

You should think about how you would act in different situations before you are in them. Think about whether you would stay and defend yourself (using reasonable force) or simply get away as quickly as you can. There is nothing wrong with doing either, but you should think about the options.

Follow the advice on this page to improve your personal safety.

#### General personal safety

You will be safest in bright, well-lit, busy areas.

Appear and act confident - look like you know where you're going and walk tall. Concentrate on where you are going, not on your mobile phone or gadgets.

You might like to spread your valuables around your body. For example, keep your phone in your bag, your house keys in your trouser pocket and your money in your jacket.

If someone tries to take something from you, it may be better to let them take it rather than get into a confrontation and risk injury.

You can use reasonable force in self-defence. You are allowed to protect yourself with something you are carrying (for example keys or a personal alarm) but you may not carry a weapon.

If you decide to defend yourself, be aware that your attacker might be stronger than you or may take what you are using in self-defence and use it against you. It is often better to shout loudly and run away.

If you use a wheelchair, keep your things beside you rather than at the back of the wheelchair.

Try not to advertise your valuables such as mobile phones, laptops, notebooks, tablet or iPod/MP3 player, jewellery or watch.

When out walking, be careful not to make your personal items, as mentioned above, an easy target for robbers. Try to keep them hidden.

Stay alert - your phone is a valuable item. When you are out, be aware of your surroundings and don't use your phone in crowded areas or where you might feel unsafe. Don't be distracted by it!

If you feel anxious consider carrying a personal attack alarm.

#### Personal safety apps

Smartphones can be utilised for personal safety. Apps such as bSafe, Life360 or Send Help allow you to track and locate family member, send a text message alert when in danger, securely store the voice, location, and time stamps of any incidents that occur to assist police and prosecution. PanicGuard is a personal safety smartphone application that achieved ACPO 'Secured by Design' accreditation.

#### Theft and robbery

Street robbery is generally known as mugging. It can also cover snatching bags.

Pick-pocketing is slightly different, as you will not be aware of the offence taking place.

Robbery is more likely to take place in quiet or dark areas, and pickpocketing where it is busy, for example on a busy train in rush hour.

Tips to avoid becoming a victim:

Remember - be aware of your surroundings. Concentrate on what and who is around you. Don't be distracted by using mobile gadgets and MP3 players. If you are listening to music, use just one headphone so that you are aware of someone approaching you.

Don't give thieves the chance to take your valuables from you. Don't put them on show.

Don't leave your bag, wallet, valuable jewellery, mobile phone or MP3 player on display to thieves.

If someone tries to take something from you by force, it may be best to give it to them. This will help you avoid getting injured.

Don't leave bags or pockets open or unzipped. It's easier for a thief to dip into an open bag. Purse bells are a great way of further protecting your purse.

Keeping your credit and bank cards safe

Keep your cards separate from your cheque book.

If your cards are stolen, call your bank or credit card company as soon as possible. Most banks put the number to call if your cards are stolen on your statement. They are also often shown on cash machines.

Treat your cards like cash - never let them out of your sight and never keep your PIN number with your cards.

#### Transport safety

This section offers some general tips on how to keep yourself safe and secure when making a journey - either catching a bus, taxi or train, or when you're in the car.

#### Public transport safety

As with everything, you are safest where there are other people and where it is well lit.

Plan your route.

Try to wait in busy or well-lit areas.

Sit near other people, near the driver if you are on a bus or near the guard if you are on a train.

If someone makes you feel uncomfortable, get up and move away.

Take extra care at crowded bus stops and on crowded buses and trains. Keep your bag closed and make sure your pockets are not accessible.

#### Getting home safely - Taxis

If you are going to be out late, try to arrange a lift home or book a taxi in your name.

Always keep the number of a reliable firm handy. Avoid minicabs or private-hire cars that tout for business and are unlicensed.

If you can pre-book your taxi, make a note of the company you are using and the phone number and leave it with a friend.

When the taxi arrives, ask the driver to check it's the one that you booked.

Always sit behind the driver in the back seat. If you feel uneasy, ask to be let out in a well-lit area where there are plenty of people.

If in any doubt, don't get in the taxi.

#### Coddington History Group

Coddington village through the years, more detailed information can be found on Coddington History Group web site :- https// www.Coddington.org.uk

1066 Domesday Book:- Is the first record of the village. The Anglo-Saxon name for the hamlet was Coddas Farm. From 1086 throughout the following decades the village grew and its name changed. It was known at various times as Cotintone, Codintone, Codingtone, Codyngton eventually being called Coddington.

1320 Record of Coddington stone used to help build Newark Castle.

1532 ROBERT BROWN'S CHARITY

Robert Brown Esq, by will September 1532 left in Codynton, a cottage and garden, situated on what is called "The Green" and four closes situated in Drove Lane containing in all 15 acres 33 perches now invested in the Corporation of Newark for the benefit of the poor of Coddington.

1619 Coddington Races started.

1636 Commons agreement . E. Goodyeare & Robert Burch, Overseers.

1644 The Relief of Newark:- Prince Rupert of the Rhine camped in Coddington.

1677. Court Roll Hallemot surrender of cottage and croft.

1713. Old Manor farm built

1718. Old Manor farm Dovecote built

1723 Garrett Ordoyno born Coddington.

1738. JOSEPH BIRCH Charity

Joseph Birch left 90 acres of agricultural land for a trust fund to be started and the trustees distributed £90 per annum to the poor of the village.

1762. The Enclosure Act for Coddington.

1786 JOSEPH BELL's Charity

The Parliamentary returns of 1786 states that :- Bell by Will (the date of which is not stated), gave to the poor of the Parish per annum, vested in his overseas.

The sum of 40 shillings (supposed to be interest of the Charity thus recorded) is paid to the trustees of Birche's Charity, by Thomas Fisher Rsq. The proprietor of a farm, called Beaconsfield, in the parish of Coddington and carried to the same account with rents of that Charity. It forms part of the fund distributed on the Tuesday before Easter.

1809. Ordoyno's Charity

Mr Jacob Ordoyno in his will left £20 the interest of which was to provide income to Coddington Charities (for the money/coal for the poor).

1827. Chapel built.

1843. Beaconfield House bought by James Thorpe 111

1846 C of E National School built

1850. Coddington House built as a Dowager house.

1857 - 1888 Brownlow house built.

1858. Chapel school built

1862. Tornado in the village on the 10th May 1862

## Coddington History Group "Hough's Yard" and the Houghs

Those of you who walk around the village will have noticed this new road sign at the top of Brownlow's Hill which names the new close of houses which is set back behind Post Office Row and Brownlow's House - but not all of you will know the reason for that name. The Houghs were agricultural contractors who owned the land behind Brownlow's House where they stored their traction engines and threshing machines and which was known locally as Hough's Yard.



Houghs have been in Coddington for many years. In the Parish records the earliest instance is Ann Hough's burial in the 1790s, she does not have a gravestone but there are two for Houghs in the churchyard – Richard Hough in 1904 and for George and Minnie Hough in the 1930s.

In the earliest census of 1841 William Hough aged 15 is already a Blacksmith, he is living with the Draytons and (presumably) his brother John aged 14. The 1851 census shows he has married Ann and it indicates that both were born in Coddington although there is no record of them marrying here nor of his baptism. However, this story relates to the agricultural business of the Houghs, which seems to have started with John Hough (born 1828) then passed down to his son George (born 1863) and hence to his sons Harry (born 1883) and Herbert (born 1902).

John Somerled Thorpe, the owner of Coddington Hall and much property in and around the village died in WWI and in 1918 his properties were put up for auction sale. It was then that the Houghs bought what became known as Brownlow's House; prior to this time the Brownlow family lived there from when the Thorpes had it built around 1870 – probably replacing an earlier dwelling.

In the 1939 Register Harry aged 57 and Rebecca Hough aged 55 lived in the house although it has no name at that time and the address is Newark Road - the naming of streets and houses has been rather changeable over the years! His occupation is given as Agricultural Engine Driver. Harry and Rebecca had previously worked for the Thorpes at their estate in Scotland where at least two of their three children (Frank, Mary and Patrick) were born, they moved to Coddington in 1914 and he joined the family business of threshing, going from farm to farm.

Harry was not just an engine driver; with his younger brother Herbert (who lived in one of the semis opposite what was until recently the shop in Newark Rd) they diversified into demolition works.



In 1922 they were involved in demolishing the old timber bridge over the Trent – presumably Muskham Bridge on the former Great North Road (now diverted and known as the A1). They kept the base of one of the piles (left, now upside-down) that the bridge had been constructed on and this stood in the front garden of their bungalow on Balderton Lane until it was sold following the death of their daughter Mary. Son Frank had had the bungalow built for his parents, possibly when the Handburys/Daybells bought Brownlow's House in 1967.

Later on the Houghs were also involved in the demolition of Coddington House; a small rem-

nant of the conservatory there survives as the porch to Brownlow's House - some woodwork and the leaded glass. These materials were also used for the bay windows of the pair of semis where Herbert lived, the Houghs had bought the land there in the 1918 estate sale and constructed the two houses – but not much if anything is there now following alteration works.

The Hough business story ends c. 1963 with a news cutting that relates that the last of the machinery was sold when Harry was 80 - but according to the article Harry had no intention of retiring fully. "Farmers in the Coddington area know they can call on him if they have any problems".

#### **Coddington Community Centre**

The Community Centre continues to welcome back our regular users with only a few yet to restart. Our new users are settling in with more starting in September. We are also welcoming our party bookings.

The Pizza van on a Thursday evening has been popular, the proprietor has seen custom settle down to his expected level so he may change things a little. He has other options to bring to our area.

During August we have carried out some maintenance on the car park, it has been pressure washed, had weed killer applied and fresh sand placed between the bricks. Hopefully this will help with the drainage.

As a safety and security precaution we have had CCTV installed on the outside of the building. These images are kept for no more than 31 days before they are deleted.

The building is now 15 years old and as you would expect some of the light fittings are beginning to give cause for concern. We plan to replace the lighting in the main hall during the last week of October. The light fittings in the roof will be replaced with up to date LED units for sports activities. Additionally we are investing in the building by adding low level lighting for other events that may use the main hall but not want the sports lighting. The remaining lights which have easy access will be replaced as they fail over the next 2 years

As usual finding volunteers is an issue. We have the core people who do most of the essential work along with some who are on the Board of Trustees and attend the meetings every second month. We would benefit from some more volunteers who might be interested in fund raising. I know this is a lot to ask but we would consider members of local charities who would combine the event so the proceeds are split evenly. Think about it and get in touch if you have any ideas.

#### **Collingham Patient Participation Group**

The Patient Participation Group at Collingham Medical Centre continues with virtual meetings but of course is unable to get out and about into the community with meeting and activities at present. We are continuing with poster campaigns so keep an eye on the local notice boards for information. However here is the Practice Report from CMC to keep you informed.

• **Covid** cases of the Delta Variant are not in Nottinghamshire. Completing your full course of two COVID vaccines is your best protection against all variants and to stop new variants mutating. Continue to be vigilant, a new cough means PCR test and household to isolate until result returns, COVID test appointments can be sought same day & results are much quicker usually 24-48 hrs after test.

• All adult cohorts now open – encourage your family members to uptake the vaccine to help stop it mutate in UK. The majority of those hospitalisations and COVID deaths are largely non-vaccinated individuals.

• **Flu Clinics** are scheduled <u>18 September</u> & <u>23 October</u> and, if stocks are announced and released for 3rd COVID, we'll do the Covid vaccination at the same time.

• **Carers' Register** – we do actively seek information about Carer status, whether you have a carer or 'are a carer'. We collect information at the time of a patient registering and we have been updating our information during COVID for our patients who have been accessing services and are known to have a carer. This information means that carers and cared for are eligible for flu vaccines. We're not sure we've captured everyone who may care for someone. There is a carer support pack and PPG agreed that we can prepare a poster for sharing on notice boards.

• As **Shielding** is no longer active or a requirement, we are changing the way we support those members of the community who wish to continue to shield –allot the first appointment of the day in each of our clinical rooms, meaning there is unlikely to be a wait to go in; they are the first patient in a deep cleaned room.

• **Call backs** for routine follow-ups will be given a 2 hr window to receive the call back, i.e. where a patient says they would prefer a call, on Thursday, we would give 2 hr window where the clinician will try to call back during that time. Offering choice to patients on mode of support, call, text or F2F.

• **Electronic Repeat Dispensing** during Medication Reviews we will start to consider for authorising medications for 12 months.

• **Glossary of Terms** – one of the admin team is pulling this together for online users and when writing to patients with extracts of their medical records copied.

• Walking for non-walkers Group – sharing poster information on our virtual board

• **New staff** Respiratory Nurse Sarah now in post and practice being supported over coming months by Emma Gowlett, Phlebotomist, and Elena Caraman, Clinical Practitioner, who are experienced hospital and out of hours healthcare team members.

• Whilst we have said goodbye to Dr Jatin Shah in June, our new GPs join us in September – Dr Kate Rees & Dr Edda Scheurch
