Rev'd Louise writes:

Dear Friends,

I love this time of year; it reminds me so much of the hope we have of new life in Christ. I am always amazed and encouraged by the persistence of the natural world, as what has lain dormant over the winter months emerges with fresh energy and a new beauty.

As we move through the months of March and April not only do we witness the gradual changes in the seasons, new growth in the garden and the gentle change in the temperature, longer days and a sense of the hope of spring; we also move through the church calendar and into the season of Lent and look forward to the celebration of Easter.

Lent is now just around the corner. It is of course the time when we begin to think about Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness, as he was preparing to begin his ministry. For him it was a time of fasting, focussing on his Father, spending time in deep prayerfulness and of course being tempted.

For us it is a time when we can think about how we are living as followers of Jesus. It is a time for us to think about our own "spiritual spring cleaning", to see if there are things in our journey that we need to change, give up or take up, clean out or do more about. We tend to do this, traditionally, through our own time of fasting, self-denial, penitence, (regret and sorrow for the things we have done wrong) and simplicity, in order to get closer to God. Journeying with Jesus is something I encourage all of you to do. Perhaps for you it might be a time for reading. Maybe you could ask someone who knows you well to buy you a spiritual book that wouldn't be your own choice. Lent for you might also involve times of study, and extended times of prayer either alone or in groups.

There will be opportunities to join together for study, quiet times in church and prayer walks throughout the season of Lent, look out for more details on our website, Facebook pages and Bitesize news.

It is important to remember that our 'disciplines' throughout Lent are supposed to ultimately transform our entire person: body, soul, and spirit and help us to draw closer to Jesus. The more quiet time we can get, the better.

Whatever you choose to do or not do this Lent I pray that you will feel God's presence at a deeper and more personal level throughout the season and that you may be transformed by his presence in body, soul, and spirit.

Can I also encourage you to tell others about your Lent journey. It's really good to hear what God is doing amongst us.

There will be services across the benefice to mark Holy Week and Easter, the details of which can be found on our website, Facebook and Bitesize News, but I would like to especially invite you to our Easter Sunrise Service at 6am on Easter morning, at All Saints, Barnby. We will be gathering for a celebration of Holy Communion, down by the river, surrounded by nature. What could be better!!

Stay visible while cycling at night

When the days are shorter it is more important than ever to ensure your bicycle is not only road worthy but also kitted correctly for night use.

There are also several legal requirements you must adhere to when thinking about taking your bike out at night:

Cycling and the law

If you are on the roads when it's dark your bicycle is legally required to have both lights and reflectors fitted.

Your front light must be white and have a 110 degree visibility

Your rear light must be red

Front and rear lights are allowed to flash

You must also have a red rear reflector and BS6102/2 amber reflectors on the front and rear of each pedal

Although the legal requirement is for the front light to have a 110 degree visibility, in practice not many cyclists are fully aware of this. Ensure that your front facing bike light meets this requirement to help ensure you are more visible from different angles. To give you extra visibility from the side also consider spoke reflectors.

What you need to know when sharing the road with motor vehicles and cycles

Instilling mutual understanding and respect between all road users, asking them to reconsider their attitudes on the road and

remember that even the most experienced people make mistakes.

Make motorists, pedestrians and cyclists more aware of one another, and to counter the intolerance that can develop between them by changing their competitive mind-set to a more considerate one.

Make the first steps in establishing a climate of mutual courtesy and care.

Contribute ultimately to a reduction in road related accidents, an

increase in cycling and walking and a reduction in road congestion

The Code gives positive advice equally applicable to all road users and, where necessary, specific positive advice which only applies to one group of users.

General cycle safety at night

It is good practice to use your rear light when cycling during the autumn and winter months as the weather can change quickly and being as visible as possible on the road should be a priority.

Hi-viz clothing is also an ideal way of staying visible during dusk and dark nights. Reflective clothing is a highly effective way of being seen on the busy roads, especially when it is worn on parts of the body that move.

What to consider

Hi-viz clothing is very effective at making you visible at night

Add reflective items to body parts that move, i.e. shoes with reflective strips, reflective wrist bands and gloves

If wearing a back pack or rucksack ensure it has reflective strips or areas for greater visibility

Wear a rear light on your back pack or your helmet for extra visibility. The additional height of the light will be at eye level for most motorists.

Ensure the batteries in your lights are always in full working order and not running low

Staying visible on the roads during the winter months is important; it doesn't cost the earth and can help you have many hours of safe cycling.

Maureen planted an oak tree at the Centre in memory of Vincent, and the Parish Council will plant another fastigiate oak for Maureen which together will symbolise two pillars of our community that we shall remember with great affection.

Cllr Linda Cox adds:

Maureen was a crusader and cared about Coddington. She was able to galvanise, cajole, support and negotiate a route through problems. This was a considerable gift. Whether supporting or opposing planning, forging links, applying pressure or setting up meetings she worked tirelessly for the parish. As I take my daily walk, I see all she achieved because she cared.

She was strong and courageous, kind and supportive, truthful and honest. Even when she was getting weaker, she continued to put others first, by actions and suggestions for them.

She will be greatly missed and will be remembered with affection and a smile as a formidable woman.

Coddington Parish Council would like to understand residents' main concerns



about safety on roads and pavements around the village that are managed by Nottinghamshire County Council. You can enter five safety concerns per form, providing your street name and post code, and use additional forms if needed.

We will collect and assess the concerns submitted and propose petitions where concerns are widely held, to be presented by our County Councillor to the County Council for their response and action.

This survey will be open until the end of March 2022. Please note your email address is not stored with the responses submitted. A partially completed form will be

stored in your Google account for 30 days until you submit the form.

If you do not have access to the online survey, you can write in with your concerns to the Parish Clerk and drop them off at the Community Centre post box.



Thorpe Oak Estate - Road Names

The land was part of the parkland of Coddington Hall, owned in the 1800's and early 1900's by the Thorpe family, a prosperous family from Newark in the trades of malting, flour, coal and wharfingering who developed strong links with the army. We owe to them the wonderful mature trees that are such a feature of the estate.

From 1940 to 1969 the area was also part of RAF Winthorpe, which had also given military names to the roads of the Harvey Avenue Estate – the predecessor to Thorpe Oaks.

The Parish Council wanted to name the roads on this new estate after men of the village who died in the First and Second World Wars and also planes that flew in the 2nd World War. The names chosen were submitted to Kelham and Sherwood district council for approval.

The names approved were:

Soldiers and Sailors:

Bryans Close – named for all the soldiers with this surname, three of whom received Military Medals during WW1:

- Alfred Bryan M. M (killed in the battle of Pozieres on the Somme, March 1918, aged 26)
- Joshua F Bryan M. M (captured a German machine gun)
- Walter Leonard Bryan (killed in the battle of Loos, September 1915) (Alfred, Joshua F and Walter Leonard Bryan were brothers)
- Ernest Bryan MM (decorated for retrieving a wounded officer from 'no-mans land')
- Albert Bryan, Cyril Bryan & Ernest James Bryan

Claricoates Drive – named for George Henry Claricoates, lost on 'HMS Good Hope' November 1914, sunk in the first naval engagement of World War 1, at the Battle of Coronel off the coast of Chile.

Henton Close – named for all the soldiers with this surname who fought in WW1:

- Albert Henton (Severely wounded in France, discharged 1915)
- Alfred Henton (killed in France 11 April 1918)
- Arthur Henton, David Henton, Harry Henton, John Thomas (4 brothers)

Thompson Close – named for Albert Thompson (the only village man killed in WW2, killed in July 1944, aged 26)

Young's Close – named for all the soldiers with this surname who fought in WW1:

- Charles William Young (died Palestine, November 1917)
- Charles Young (killed in France, October 1917 aged 19)
- George Richard Young (killed in action at Flanders, September 1917)

RAF Plane Names:

Hampden Close – named after the Handley Page Hampden (twin-engined) bombers used by 455 Squadron (Coastal Command) during 1941-2.

Lancaster Road - named after the Lancaster Bombers used by 1661 Heavy Conversion Unit, and "Operation Target Berlin" of 16.1.1943.

Stirling Drive – named after the "Short Stirling" 4-engined bombers used from the autumn of 1943 by 1661 Heavy Conversion Unit.

Bristol Close – named after the aircraft manufacturer – although no Bristol aircraft were based at Winthorpe, Bristol Blenheims were based at Balderton for a short time in late 1943.

Winthorpe Airbase

The airfield was built in the late 1930's as a satellite station for Swinderby airfield and was opened officially in September 1940. RAF Winthorpe was attacked in Nov 1940 using parachute landmines for the first time, but although the runway was damaged there were no casualties. We have been told that defences for the airbase were sited at The Bungalow on Cross Lane, Barnby in the Willows, Newark. During 1940 to 1959 a variety of RAF activities took place:

1940 - 42

Polish bomber squadrons initially used the aerodrome for training. They operated from the grass airfield, flying Fairey Battles and Vickers Wellingtons. In July 1941 the Polish squadrons moved to Hemswell.

Next 455 Squadron of Coastal Command arrived with Handley Page Hampden (twin-engined) bombers. In 1942 the airfield was closed to lay concrete runways to accommodate heavy bombers. Because the bearing factory Marles was in the direct line of the airfield, Winfield was not developed as a bomber base.

1942 -45

Between 1942 - 45 1661 Heavy Conversion Unit flew Manchesters, Halifaxes and Stirling Bombers for training replacement crews for other RAF bases. A large number of men passed through RAF Winthorpe because the losses at the other bases were so high. Ten Lancaster Bombers were also used, and on the 16.1.1943 Lancaster bombers from Winthorpe took part in "Operation Target Berlin".

The "Short Stirling" 4-engined bombers arrived in the autumn of 1943. In late autumn 1943 sixteen Handley Page Halifax bombers arrived but they did not remain very long as they were needed by bomber command.

On the 3rd December 1944, there were 1,613 personnel stationed at Winthorpe. In early 1945 Hurricane and Spitfires arrived but only for training purposes.

After the war 1945 – 59

When the war finished the aerodrome was passed over to Transport Command on 25th September 1945. 1441 Heavy Transport practised air drops from there.

From 1955 to1959 the RAF Research Establishment took over and the Technical Servicing Manuals for new equipment were written here (before the Research Establishment moved on to Swanton Morley). In July 1959 the airbase effectively closed, after which the Site was transferred to Maintenance Command care.

1960s onwards

The site was used to create a housing estate for RAF Families in the 1950s. The state of the airbase buildings worsened and most were demolished in the late 1960s – the bulk of the airfield site was sold off in 1969 and the District Council took over the houses. From c. 2000 the former Harvey Avenue Estate was demolished and Thorpe Oaks was built in its place.

The Community Centre has lost a dear friend and benefactor. Councillor Maureen Dobson, who died at the end of November, was an instrumental part of the provision of the Community Centre and will be greatly missed.

At the Community Centre we are very busy both with paying customers and non paying customers. However we do have some issues to get on top of.

The use of the car park is being abused by a select few who are parking on the double yellow lines and think that it is OK to do this.

The car park is managed by Newark and Sherwood District Council, if they visit and find vehicles parked incorrectly they will issue a parking ticket.

The yellow lines have been put down to keep the car park safe by maintaining unobstructed vision for drivers as they move around the area, allowing drivers the space to exit from spaces without obstruction and allowing the emergency services access should the need arise.

Please use the car park with respect, recently complaints were made directly to the local councillor who requested the enforcement officers attend. The result was a vehicle was issued with a ticket.

The car park has 38 regular parking spaces which are marked by the orientation of the brick weave. Please endeavour to park in the centre of the bay to allow the space next to you to be used and the person to have access to get in and out of their vehicle. I know it can be tight with some of the larger vehicles but not parking in a bay properly may also be given a ticket by the district council.

We are currently looking at updating the lighting in our function room to give either warm light for meetings or day light for craft activities. We hope this will improve the facility we can offer to local groups that may want to hire the building.

We are still looking for people to join our trustees to help with the running and management of the center. If you can give a couple of hours every 2 months to join us please get in touch. We have an interesting agenda for each meeting covering things like Building maintenance, Finance - income and expenditure, Policy review, Car park safety and Bookings to be covered.
