Chairman's Report – April 2022

Spring has reached Coddington! The Allotments are in full thrust and the bordering hedge at Page's Wood has been improved with some new planting.

Significant clearance has been done by a working group at the Millennium Garden, including some new planting and it has been suggested to continue this with the planting of red, white and blue flowers for the Jubilee. The village sign is also in the process of restoration.

It was good to see the new picnic bench at Thorpe Close being used, one of several benches installed so far by the Parish Council using money from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). The Parish Council is also working with the District Council on installing more play equipment on Thorpe Oaks, again using CIL money.

Regarding future burials within the village, the Parish Council is actively seeking to purchase land in Coddington for a new burial ground as the churchyard will soon be full for burials.

As some of you will have seen/heard already, Councillor Lee and the late Councillor Dobson have worked together to obtain an agreement for a much needed "Puffin Crossing" to increase the safety of crossing the Beckingham Road (C208) at The Plough crossroads.

Thanks to all those who contributed their opinions on the Road Safety Survey. This has been collated, analysed and in due course will be actioned as appropriate. The highest scoring concern was the speed limit on Beckingham Road, and signatures in a petition will be collected to be tabled at the County Council by our new County Councillor Debbie Darby. Further petitions will follow after this first one has been completed.

Clerk of the Parish Council Yvette Wellard is retiring and we would like to thank her so much for her loyal, efficient, stalwart, (and sometimes tolerant!), work over the years. I am sure we will all miss her enthusiasm, interest and support for the village and hope that she retires knowing that she been such an integral part of the functionality of Coddington Parish Council.

We now, naturally, welcome our new Clerk, Dawn Hockenhull, who we hope will find the position both enjoyable and rewarding. I am sure Dawn will find the post interesting and we look forward to her future with the Parish Council.

As always, a warm welcome to all new residents of Coddington, whether permanent or temporary. By the time this CVN edition is published we will have had the Annual Parish Meeting but at present look forward to hearing the issues that you may want to raise. The Agendas for the monthly Parish Council meetings are published as always on the notice boards around the

village and the public is welcome to raise any issues/contributions at the start of the meeting.

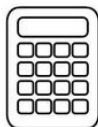
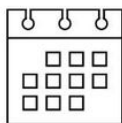

Mumbo Jumbo 15th April 2022



Good Friday saw the return to the Village Hall of the self-styled “No Hit Wonders” - Mumbo Jumbo.

Despite the impact of the holiday weekend and the continuing surge of COVID, there was a good audience to hear the band's opening song - their unique take on Joe Cocker's classic, 'The Letter'.

But their set-list contained very few covers and they delighted us with their own writings, delivered in a distinctive and compelling style at the same time as mixing blues with witty humour.

But everything was not all frivolity and Oliver, Chris, Rich and Andy skilfully explored different moods with a performance that never failed to entertain. Their repertoire ranged from the superbly evocative 'Those Frail Few' to the jolly 'Bald Spot' and an extremely original 'Drunk in Charge' before challenging us to remember the Homefront with the tribute-laden 'Six Million Women' written especially for VE Day 75.

Mumbo Jumbo are notably a tight-knit, yet very friendly outfit and they combined intricate playing (note the almost instrumental 'Hold On') with engaging banter reminiscent of their last visit to Coddington in 2018.

They intrigued with arguably their biggest claim to fame; one of their British Blues Awards Final 10 nominated songs 'Nice Work' – hinting at a story that came close to undermining their “No Hit Wonders” status.

After they announced their 'final' song the audience-demanded encore was well earned and they obliged, quite literally, with their song 'The Final Encore' before 'Rocket' sent everyone flying home very happy indeed.

Coddington Schools in the 1950's

We first moved to Coddington in 1954. My father was a Master Technician in the Royal Air force when he was posted to RAF Winthorpe. The airfield at Winthorpe had not been used since its days as a Heavy Bomber Operational Conversion Unit in WW2. It was resurrected in 1953 as a Central Servicing Development Establishment (CSDE) unit, with the mission of developing the complex maintenance schedules for the vastly more complicated equipment which was being developed for the new “jet-age” Royal Air Force.

At the beginning of RAF Winthorpe’s “rebirth”, there was a housing problem as many families arrived before the family quarters were complete. We were one such family and initially we lived in a tiny caravan situated on the base’s caravan site. Five of us lived in a caravan that was about 16 feet long! Though we were cozy and happy we needed more room, and in searching around for local accommodations we made the acquaintance of Henry and Mabel Pethig, the publicans of the Plough Inn. For a few months we rented two bedrooms from them and learned to appreciate their kindness and perpetual good humor. For many years afterwards, my parents stayed in contact with them, and indeed, Mabel became the God-Mother to my sister who was born in 1955.

Coddington and RAF Winthorpe hold many special memories for me. For almost three years we attended school in Coddington – first in the “old” school at the top of Brownlows Hill, and then in about 1956, some of the older classes were moved to the “new” school at the bottom of the hill. Incidentally, the new school was written up in a local newspaper for its modern features and appearance, especially noting the many different paint colors used in its construction.

Even after moving to the new school, we still ate lunch in Coronation Hall and would walk up in columns of twos to receive our daily sustenance. In the early fifties the country was emerging from the post WW2 austerity programs and the school lunches seemed to be a succession of thinly sliced meat, potatoes covered with watery

brown gravy, and served with either cabbage, swede, brussel sprouts or some other boiled vegetable. I grew to despise these vegetables immensely, and indeed I have not eaten brussel sprouts in over 50 years. The desert that followed was a little better and was often covered with thin, yellowish custard.

The old school had three classrooms with John (Johnny) Fordham serving as the headmaster. Mr. Fordham was a disciplinarian, his ultimate enforcer being a bamboo cane. I was on the receiving end at least three times for what Mr. Fordham euphemistically called “six of the best.”. But in all honesty, he never dwelled afterwards on your transgressions and I really did deserve to be punished. At the new school I sat by the windows and would sometimes use a small mirror to dazzle students when the teacher’s back was turned. Mr. Fordham broke me of this bad habit when he whizzed the piece of chalk he had in his hand at me. He must have had eyes in the back of his head!

Mr. Fordham often taught the older students and I remember learning several of the classic poems from him. Even now I can recite verses from Alfred Noyes’ “The Highwayman” and can readily picture Mr. Fordham’s red face, complemented with sparse white hair and large protruding ears – he looked like a retired puglist to me.

The wind was a torrent of darkness among the gusty trees,
The moon was a ghostly galleon tossed upon cloudy seas,
The road was a ribbon of moonlight over the purple moor,
And the highwayman came riding— Riding—riding—

Mr. Fordham bicycled to work each day and still found time to manage the boy’s football team. We would all meet on Saturday mornings and then would either walk, bicycle or take the bus to our games. We only had a few games and didn’t win many of them because we didn’t practice much.

At this time there was a large influx of RAF dependents that I’m sure strained the school facilities at Coddington. When the new school opened much of the crowding was alleviated. As service brats, we knew that sooner rather than later we would leave for other locations which were often overseas. We were a very lively bunch and generally, with some exceptions, mixed well with the local kids.

My teacher for the last two years at Coddington was Mrs. Otter and she was a dedicated, enthusiastic and kindly teacher. I recall she

drove to work in a Morris Minor. Moving frequently had resulted in some deficiencies in my education. I didn't read well then, and in fact, hated to read. As a reward for our collective good behavior, Mrs. Otter would read to us at the end of the school-day from a series of animal books. All of us enjoyed her reading immensely, and later on she allowed us to borrow the books to practice reading on our own. My reading skills improved and I credit Mrs. Otter for installing in me a life-long love of literature.

Mrs. Otter was also a devotee of mental arithmetic and we would have a daily drill of 50 mental arithmetic problems – to be calculated without resorting to paper or pencil. For example, the questions might run as follows: if one roll cost threepence farthing ($3\frac{1}{4}d$) how much would a dozen rolls cost? Easy, the answer of course was three shillings and threepence (39d). In this day of metric everything there was much to be said for a duodecimal system where both the currency and unit of measure was based on twelves!

In general, I think the time we spent in the Coddington schools were a pleasant interlude for most of us and they provided us with a very good education. Thank you Mr. Fordham, Mrs. Otter and the other teachers for your dedication and professionalism.

In 1958 most of the CSDE staff was transferred to RAF Swanton Morley in Norfolk. In 1959 my family emigrated to the United States and I have only returned only once to the U.K. During my visit in 1986 I passed through and enjoyed a brief visit to Coddington. I hope to return again in the future.

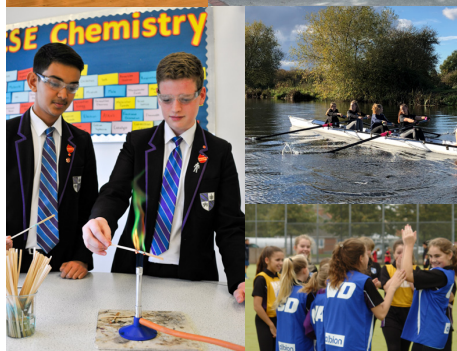

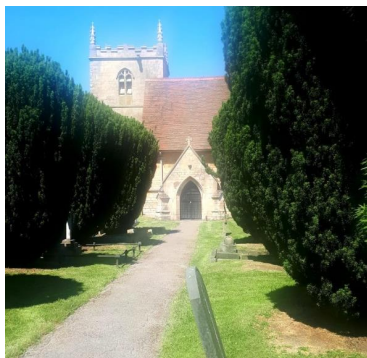

The bad news is that there's just one more speaker meeting before summer, but the good news is that both the March (Lily Ann Dawes, Duchess of Curiosities) and April (The Chilwell Explosion of 1918) evenings had late changes of speaker – so if you missed them, there'll be a chance to see them in the autumn! In March Jeremy Lodge of the Collingham and District Local History Society very kindly stepped in with just a few days notice to give us the history of Collingham Railway Station along with relevant local railway history. April brought us Adrian Gray with an interesting and well illustrated talk charting the changes of the route and moods of the Trent – the Capricious Trent, a well chosen title.

Thursday 19th May 2022 Mark Dawson - A Modest Sufficiency.

A look at what farmers and artisan tradesmen from mid 16th century to late 17th century ate and drank and how it changed through the years. This sounds to be a very interesting talk.

History Group News

We have made a start on choosing photos for our Jubilee display (in the Church, Saturday afternoon) and at the same time did a useful sort-out of the 6 folders containing laminated photos from previous displays, next stage is to select a few more to print and laminate plus captions for them all.

Meanwhile Paul B has continued updating parts of the website (www.coddington.org.uk) and ferreting out more miscellaneous information from various sources including the National Archives. Amongst the treasures he has found there has been a number of wills from the 1600s and 1800s, a few Ashwells (who were a prominent Coddington family in and around the 1800s) and some others. We are very fortunate that a personal friend of ours – not a member - is a retired solicitor with experience of old documents and difficult handwriting (we have some trouble reading his!) has very generously been busy transcribing these difficult documents. He did have a refusal on a Latin section but did get the gist of it for us! I hope you will find this will from Agnes Forman of interest. I have modernised the English and added all the punctuation and formatting to help readability – there was no punctuation or formatting! It is very interesting to note the value they placed on their relatively few belongings. We have yet to discover the meaning of a few old English words in the text and also to research further information about Agnes and her family; she was evidently married twice. Anyone interested in helping with this, please contact me.

In the Name of god Amen I, Agnes Forman of Coddington in the County of Nottingham Widow being sick in body but of perfect memory, praised be to God, do ordain and make this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following.

In primis I give and bequeath my Soul unto the hand of Almighty God and my body to be buried in the Churchyard of Coddington aforesaid and I give my goods:

In primis: To my son Edward Crosbie and his children fifteen pounds, whereof the said Edward is to put forth Six pounds for those of his children till they come of Age. That is for his Son Richard Crosby forty shillings and his wife, being with child, for that child forty shillings. I give him also the white hangings for a bed if his wife shall have a daughter, I give them otherwise to my daughters Lettice and Margaret. I give him also one Black Cow three pairs of hemping sheets one pair of Linen sheets and two pairs of harding sheets, three pewter dishes and one frinte dish and one pan upon the cupboard head, also the biggest of the three little pans, two blankets, the great bolster lying upon the press, one pillow, one of the better coverlets and one of the worse, six yards of harding cloth and one mattress lying on the bed over the door.

I give to my Son Edward Forman and his children twelve pounds whereof the said Edward is to put forth for those of his children forty shillings a piece till they come to Age.

I give to my Son Thomas Forman twelve pounds and to his Son Richard twelve pence.

I give to my Son John Forman twelve pence, to his daughter Anne twelve pence and to his Son Edward twelve pence.

I give to my Son Robert Forman twelve pence.

I give to my daughter Lettice fifteen pounds and one Brown Cow, one H/bed in the parlour with the bedding upon it, one feather bed in the Chamber lying upon the little bed, one chest in the parlour, three pairs of Hemping sheets, one pair of Linen and two pairs of Harding Sheets, three pewter dishes and one frinte dish in the great chest in the Chamber, the great brass pot and one of the little pans, two Blankets and the bigger bed (filling?) one bolster lying upon the press, one of the best coverlets and one of the worse, one stone of wool socks, two pillows, one bass bottom chair, one of the bigger joined stools, six yards of Harding Cloth, three yards of hemping and Harding together, four yards of hemping cloth, six napkins, two pillow coverings of the better and two of the worse, one of the worse bedsteads in the Chamber and the cupboards next to the little parlour door.

I give to my daughter Margaret Forman fifteen pounds and one branded heifer, one table in the Chamber, one chest in the parlour under the window, one bed in the little parlour with the bedding and curtains upon it, three pairs of hemping sheets and one pair of Linen and two pairs of harding sheetes,

three pewter dishes and one frinte dish, the great pan with the (?) and one little pan, two blankets, the (?) bed (?) filling and Tirk bolster, one of the best coverlets and one of the worse, one stone of wool socks and two pillows and bass bottom Chair, one of the bigger joined stools, six yards of harding cloth, three yards of hemping and harding together and four yards of hemping cloth, six napkins, two pillow coverings of the better and (?) of the worse, one of the worse bedsteads in the Chamber, the other cupboard and my part of the bed.

The rest of my Goods undisposed of I give to my Son Richard Forman and I make him sole executor of this my Will and testament.
