Chairman's Report September 2023

It has been rather unsettled weather this summer, but I hope all residents have managed to enjoy those days which have brought more sunshine than rain!

Thorpe Oaks playing field, as usual, has been busy – dog walkers, football and in those sunnier days residents simply enjoying the open space. The Parish Council have been working with NSDC over the summer on the new play equipment. We are waiting on the District Council to inform us of the works schedule, and we will let residents know once the date is confirmed.

I see both "Book Swaps" are being used and thanks to all who helped populate the Thorpe Oaks Swap - in record time!

I would like to thank Coddington C of E Primary School, pupils, parents and carers for their patience and tolerance during the short time the Community Centre car park was closed. The Parish Council and Community Centre are working together to install a height barrier on the car park entrance to stop further encroachments.

The Parish Council have met for a "walkabout" with County Councillor Darby and Via, primarily to discuss the speed limits and weight restrictions on the C208 and the speed limits on the A1 slip road. Regarding the weight restriction, Via have verified that the weight limits are extant and remind us all, that should you believe vehicles are misusing the route you can bring this to the attention of Trading Standards through the following 'Lorry Watch' link'

Via have also logged the Newark Road footpath and the C208 cycle/footpath for inspection.

Regarding the Archaeological Site, the Parish Council have been in touch with Simon Mortimer, the lead archaeologist, to ascertain a potential date for the visit around the site. Work is currently behind schedule due to the weather, but a finish date of mid-September looks likely. We will be posting out a time and date once it has been confirmed - however access numbers will be limited.

James Thorpe 28th August 1823 – 13th July 1902

James Thorpe the 3rd the only son of James and Ann Thorpe was born 28th August 1823 at Newark. On the 1841 census James snr. lived in Mill Gate, Newark, his occupation being corn merchant and malster also living in the house was his wife Anne their son James jnr. The family moved to Beaconfield House, Coddington shortly before James snr. Died in 1843. Before he died James snr. made extensive alterations and improvements to this stately home. The estate in Coddington was very large and included 234 acres of farm and Park land, houses and a public house; James snr. had built up a very prosperous business in Mill Gate, Newark as wharfinger, malster and coal merchant. James jnr. was only 19 when his father died and had quickly to accustom himself to being the owner of a large country house and a responsible businessman. Like his father he was talented and energetic.

He was in business with his uncle and their business became known as "John and James Thorpe". They were Malsters, Corn Merchants and Millers (Newark Water & Steam Mills).

James joined the Sherwood Rangers about 1849, passing through various grades of Cornet, Lieutenant, Captain, and Major and becoming Lieutenant Colonel in 1881. Retiring with the rank of Honorary Colonel in 1882.

About 1850 James aged 26 married Mary Ann Spence aged 22 from Tidworth, Yorks. He had a new house built for his recently widowed mother Anne near the church and named it "Coddington House".

Gradually he assumed a major role as a local landowner and by now he became known as "The Squire".

On the 1851 census he lived in Coddington his occupation: - merchant also living in the house was his wife Mary Ann, three visitors and six servants. On the 1861 census his occupation was corn merchant and malster, also living in the house was his wife Mary Ann and six servants.

In the 1863 valuation list the firm owned in Newark a tanyard, sheds, house, shop, offices, flour warehouse, coal yard, coach house, stables etc. and several maltings.

In 1864 he spent £2000 virtually rebuilding Coddington church employing the London architect Bodley who employed the young William Morris and Firm to decorate the interior.

Unfortunately his wife Mary remained childless and became an invalid before dying in Buxton on the 28th August 1868 after a long and severe illness. She was buried in a family tomb in Coddington churchyard.

By the 1871 census James 47, had married (in 1869) Annie McDougal, 24, born in Argyllshire and they had a son James IV born in August 1870 at St. Georges, London; sadly he died in 1873. They soon had another son John Sommerled Thorpe followed by another 8 children: -Harold, William, Gervase, Muriel, Cicely, Helen Mary, Archibald James and Elspeth Margaret.

By 1872 James was a County Magistrate, High Sheriff, a JP and D.L in Argyllshire. He was greatly interested in farming and forestry, had a fine herd of Lincoln Red Shorthorns, and he was also interested in Horticulture and Floriculture.

James's mother Ann died on the 22nd June 1877 aged 86 and was also buried in the family tomb in Coddington churchyard. Eventually Coddington House was sold to the Tallents family. Around this time James changed the name of his stately home from "Beaconfield House" to "Coddington Hall".

James's unmarried uncle John died at his home Elston Hall on the 15th August 1881, his personal estate was £500,000 and James Thorpe was the sole Executor. John left bequests to his sisters and many family relatives.

On the 1881 census his occupation was Malster and Landowner Farmer of 320 acres employing 9 men and 3 boys, also living in Coddington Hall was his wife Annie 34 and their children John L 8, Harold 6, William 4, Gervase 3, Muriel 2 and Cicely 10 months, Richmond McDougal (mother in law), Mary Stewart (Niece), Stewart Macrae (cousin) a governess and 13 servants.

From 1881 until at least 1886 James was Chairman of The Newark Hospital Governors. In June 1882 and for several years afterwards he was President of Coddington Cricket Club.

In March 1885 James began building a Working Men's Reading room on the paddock next to the school, the building was officially opened on the 12th November 1885. (This room is now the kitchen in the village hall).

James was a wealthy businessman with a large estate in Coddington and Ardbrecknish House, Loch Awe, Argyll, his town house was 59, Eaton Place, London and his club the Junior Carlton.

In 1886 he sold the Flour Mill to Thomas Farnham and by now the Malting business had branches in Louth, Market Rasen, Peterborough and Newark and was one of the largest in the Midlands.

James Thorpe was always interested in the "Anglican National School" in Coddington being for many years a school manager. He was present at the school managers meeting on the 23rd March 1883 when a new 23-year-old Headmaster Joseph Chauntry Hunt was appointed. The Thorpe family treated the school children and their mothers to a half-day out every year and provided prizes at school events.

In 1891 James financed the building of a church on a hill on the south side of Loch Awe, as a private chapel.

On the 1891 census he was living at Coddington Hall with his sons: - John 19, Harold 15, William 14, Gervase 13, Archibald 9 daughters:- Helen 6, Elspeth 3 a governess and 7 servants. His wife Annie was at their London home with daughters: - Richmond E 12, Cicely 10, 3 visitors and 9 servants.

James Thorpe JP on the 1901 census he was living at Coddington Hall with his son Harold 25 and 5 servants, his wife Annie was at their London home with her children Archibald 19, Cicely 20, Elspeth 13, Helen 16, Richmond 22 along with 10 servants.

On the 13th July 1902 Col. James Thorpe died at Coddington Hall. His obituary in the "Newark Advertiser" occupied one and a half columns, and contained the words, "He was a fine type of English gentleman, honourable and upright".

His wife Annie and his son Captain John Somerled Thorpe were his executors, and his will gave his fortune as £213,582-19-7, with personnel estate £162,856-6-1. He left his son Harold one third of the profit and goodwill of the business as a Malster, and the other two thirds and the capital to his son John Somerled, his son Gervase was to have £5,000; and £32,000 was put in trust for his four daughters. The lease of the London House 59, Eaton Place and furniture went to his widow, and his Scottish estate to his "right heir".

NOTICE ON DOG FOULING

The Parish Council are aware that dog fouling on green spaces and pathways is a problem in Coddington.

We have a duty of care to all residents and so we have requested Dog Wardens to patrol the village. It is an offence to not clear up after your dog and the Dog Wardens can issue an onthe-spot fine of up to £1,000.

Dog bins are provided at several places around the village. Normal litter bins can also be used, or you could of course dispose of it at home.

Please be assured that this course of action is taken with public safety in mind and the Parish Council will continue to monitor the situation closely.

Canterbury Tales by David Mynne

Dave Mynne, veteran Cornish actor, arrived in Coddington as a very 'old' friend of the village because he's remembered for successful performances at the Village Hall going back to 2013 with impressive interpretations of some great classics; Great Expectations (2013), The Odyssey (2017), A Christmas Carol (2018) and now he's brought his latest Canterbury Tales show to the village hall. His reputation was the draw on such a balmy night



in the village and those previous performances had the audience expecting something akin to at least more of the same. This time, the script was billed as very loosely adapted from the Chaucer original and is a collaboration with Simon Harvey and Anna Maria Murphy

So maybe different to previous helpings from Dave, this time we were promised "It's rude! It's ribald! It's ridiculous! and we were warned to expect "naughtiness, nonsense and medieval swearing!"Ultimately the latest gig-night in the village hall was teased with: "Let's party like it's 1387!" Dave began with a poignant and

dramatic entrance that combined

performance with [warm] wardrobe as he processed through the audience to the stage swathed in a proper medieval bathrobe - his powerful Middle English dialogue setting the scene with the evening's prologue.

To be fair, he assured us that these were 'right words, impossible to understand', before introducing us to his narrative character; Harry Bailey, a landlord who was keen to welcome the audience to 'his place - The



Canterbury', an Olde English Inn, infamous around these parts for villainy and sin'.

Dave skilfully used Harry's character to explain that "the floor is caked in sawdust for soaking up the spit, and the air is thick with stories "told with wisdom, guile and wit". Indeed, this ribald hostelry was known for playing host to story-telling competitions, along with the offer of overnight accommodation in the available 'penthouse hovel'. This cleverly set

up scene after scene for Dave, using his trademark method of minimal

props, to weave-in his compelling and enthralling extracts from the range of Chaucer tales. Ultimately this was the basis for the whole of his evening's performance and the audience lapped it up.

Dave took the chance to draw in the audience even more with some quick-fire daft dad-type jokes such as "Q. What does a medieval person say when they see an alien UFO? A. Oh, that's a Flying Chaucer!" Corny perhaps but it helped get the audience relaxed and made Harry's character very likeable indeed.

As the stories emerged, starting with The Miller's Tale where Dave's version of Absolon was clever, witty and quiet Blackadderesk, and the smartly constructed interaction between John and Nicholas incorporated the hilarious portrayal of building a boat with medieval power tools - quite brilliant in its humour.

All through the performance Dave portrayed Harry as a great continuity announcer, helped by 'ale by the flagon' and 'medieval bar snacks' such as his own invention of crispy slug bites, bags of which would feature 'deliciously' later in Dave's set.

What followed was the interpretation of Franklin's Tale transporting us to Yorkshire and labelled as Trouble at t'mill. Told with dramatic dexterity, Dave switched effortlessly between Averagus, Aurelius and Dorigen taking us nicely to the half-time break.

After the interval, Dave's intricate trickery with three more flagons brought to life the tale of brothers; Thomas, Richard and Harold and their hopeless attempt to put one over on Death.

As his final yarn, and positioned as being after the watershed, Dave's performance was capped with a highly amusing take on The Reeves Tale including some energetic corn-grinding and lots of sourdough all wrapped up in the story of students John and Alan on a rumbustious romp.

There is no doubt that Dave's typical dramatic performance with minimal props provides a superb evening of entertainment and many members of the audience were left trying to imagine which classic he will conquer next. Whatever it might be, Coddington will be very keen to welcome him back.




Hello my name is Jayan
