The Revd. Phil Smith writes:

Dear friends,

The joy of living in Coddington is that you can go for a walk and without leaving the village or even Thorpe Oaks in my case - feel that nature is very close at hand as well as our fellow neighbours – a perfect blend that makes Coddington the community that it is – we are truly blessed.

I remember my excitement when the other week I saw my first bumblebee of the year and realised that we have turned the corner and are now heading towards spring.

In the church of course our focus is towards Easter – particularly Easter Day on Sunday 31st March when we rejoice in the greatest celebration of them all - The feast of the Resurrection of our dear Lord Jesus Christ from the dead.

Prior to the celebration of Easter we travel through the season of Lent, a period of preparation, reflection and self -denial, a period of 40 days – the time our Lord spent in the wilderness where he too resisted temptation.

During this period of Lent however we do have an occasion to celebrate, which is of course Mothering Sunday – a celebration very close to our hearts here at All Saints'. Towards the beginning of the last century there was a real danger that 'Mothering Sunday' as a Christian festival would be overtaken by an American import 'Mother's Day' which although recognising mothers was not based on Christian values.

Alarmed by this the daughter of the then vicar at All Saints' Coddington – Constance Penswick Smith together with a close friend Ellen Porter launched a 30-year campaign to successfully revive Mothering Sunday to make it what it is today.  - It's cheaper to reheat your home than keep your heating on low when you're out, unless you own a heat pump.
- 3. Fit draught-proofing strips to your windows and doors and save around £45 a year.
 - This can be a quick DIY job. Keeping extra heat in your home will leave you feeling warmer and more comfortable.
- 4. Get a hot water cylinder jacket and save roughly £50 a year on energy bills.
 - Jackets are easy to fit, typically cost under £30 and you'll also spend less on a hot shower or bath in the future.
- 5. Keep furniture away from radiators and heaters to feel warmer at home.
 - Don't overwork your system by blocking your course of heat and remember to remove radiator covers to get more value for money.



Coddington History Group

Coddington - in the news 100 Years ago.

This is a mixture of Natural and Historical interest!

It is an extract from an article in The Mansfield Reporter and Sutton in Ashfield Times (*snappy title!*) of April 18th 1924 – which cost a bargain "Three Halfpence"! The article is rather long and has much flowery description so here is just the part relevant to Coddington. The article is headed "Natural History and Country Life" by W.N. Saril, it seems to be a regular feature in that newspaper. It starts with general information that the nightingale is a summer visitor to Britain and that generally it is found further south than here, and goes on to describe its nesting behaviour etc. before getting to the more interesting part:

"The Nightingale" by W.N. Saril "

The only time I have heard the birds singing in these parts was near Newark, over twenty years ago. I was a guest for a day or two at the camp of the Sherwood Rangers, at Coddington, the camp being by the side of Stapleford Wood. The tent allocated to me was on the outskirts of the camp, close to the wood. When the batman showed me the tent, furnished with a camp bed, plenty of blankets and a pail of water, he said, "You'll be alright here sir, if the nightingales will let you sleep." I replied that as I hadn't heard one for years, I should be delighted to hear one again."Well, you'll hear plenty tonight" he replied, and his words came true, for I had scarcely made myself comfortable in my blankets before a nightingale stuck up close to the tent. I lay and enjoyed it, and shortly another challenged him, and another, and away in the distance others were faintly heard, until the whole wood fairly rang with their music."

He then continues to say he couldn't sleep and describes the singing with much flowery language – which I will spare you!

I wonder if there are nightingales in Stapleford Woods these days? I have my doubts and perhaps the woods were still mixed deciduous then rather than conifers.

The local history interest is that we knew that Col. Thorpe allowed the Sherwood Rangers to have camps on his land - we have a couple of postcards of them. But we have not had any information as to where they were situated so at least this article gives a clue. The date on this card ties in fairly well with "over twenty years ago" as it is dated 1905/6/8 - it's not clear.

Review: 2nd December 2023 - A Christmas Cracker. The Churchfitters at Coddington Village Hall



On a night coming in the middle of the first real cold snap of this winter, The Churchfitters appeared at the Village Hall for what they affectionately reminded us was their sixth appearance at Coddington.

In their previous performances Rosie Short, her brother Chris Short and self-described 'part mad-inventor', Boris Lebret (from Brittany in France) have collected such local support that it wasn't surprising that the hall was packed again this time. This may have been further evidenced by the entry on their current on-line tour-list where this evening's gig was labelled as "Back in Coddington – We love you!"

This season, The Churchfitters are touring with *Christmas Cracker*, a show including 14 songs that span poignant, multi-instrumental, multi-prop and even wonderfully silly pantomime.

Of course – the evening was very 'Christmassy' – where the cosy inside of the hall contrasted with the outside chill. Most tunes were obviously utterly familiar to the whole audience, making the show easily accessible for all. From the opening song (*Wassail*), the on-stage action was brilliantly choreographed, eclectic and certainly eccentric. The result was a quite joyous elevation of their material, lifting spirits in the room quite audibly.

We have become used to some of their 'standard fare' but under the backdrop of tinsel and twinkle lights, the trio managed to deliver an extravaganza big-stage dance musical (*Riverdance*), a truly dramatic shadow puppet show (*King Wenceslas*), a very gregarious tribute to Doris Day (where the band was joined on stage by horse, Silly Billy for a whipcracking and hilarious version of *Deadwood Stage*). All this finally peaked as Boris gave us his balletic take on *Over the Rainbow*.

But within all this frivolity there were standout performance elements: Chris was beguiling as he picked out a magical atmosphere using his unique glass harp: 27 individually selected and differently-sized wine glasses, carefully tuned to resonate perfectly. Not content with this mesmeric sound and on top of his trademark fiddle work, he also demonstrated his carpentry skills with bow and cross-cut saw – why did we ever need the synthesiser?

Seriously, you needed to be there! Right in the middle of the set, Rosie treated us to her own composition (*Annie*) based on the Little Match Girl fable. It was delightful and had the effect of keeping the audience grounded without taking the pace out of the band's performance. Along with all this, it was notable that no one mentioned the infamous upcycling prowess of Boris (homemade scrap metal instruments) thus, almost normalising his unique approach to the bass section. This uniqueness still causes much interest by on-lookers though – often leaving folk awestruck by the sound he gets out of an ex-frying pan or a former car wheel.

Another great event at the village hall, marked out by someone remarking that the last Churchfitters' Christmas gig was seven years ago! Let's hope we can get them back before another seven years have passed.

Review: 20th January 2024 – Flatworld at the Village Hall



Flatworld describe their sound as "Vibrant world music from all points East" and their Live and Local appearance at Coddington on 20th Jan didn't disappoint.

As a band they have been around since 2001, with a gig-list spanning many festivals - including Glastonbury - but this was their second outing in 2024 with a relatively new five-piece line-up; Neil Poulter (guitars, Laúd mandolin and vocals) was joined by Olly Blanchflower (double bass), Rachel Bridgen (oboe), Garry Low (drums, and percussion) and Kimberly Turnbull (violin and vocals).

But their relative newness as a unit was not obvious and their playing sounded effortlessly in-step with tightly formed melodies - as if they'd always been playing together. So the audience were quickly enjoying some very fine rhythms, sometimes lead by guitar/mandolin, sometimes by oboe combined with spirited violin and all kept together by double bass and distinctive well-timed percussion.

They began with a tune called Eden, followed by the Serbian folk song Ajde Jano.

Neil, as a founding member of the band, was careful to explain the origins of each tune. He was grateful for acquiring a lot of material, often taught to him by original artists as they toured over here. After the first six numbers, Neil let slip that the set-list seemed to contain all the slower numbers in the first half and that all the "hooligan" ones would be at the end. But this

looked like a tease as the band skipped through a jaunty Makedonsko Devojče and it worked out to set up the second half nicely.

It's fair to say that the whole performance reflected a wide-ranging journey around many cultures - with tunes and songs that either originated in the east and were given a western influence, or were obviously West European and fused with Eastern sounds and styles.

At the interval, it was clear that Flatworld were being well-received in Coddington with flattering chatter from the audience during half-time refreshments.

This positivity continued when they began the second half with an English interpretation of the Shantel song, Disko Boy, which really should have been rather incongruous but was worked so well by the band that it added to the audience's growing applause.

What followed was songs such as the haunting Sun during which Gary's chimes added a shimmeringly atmospheric tone throughout the hall.

But any sense of calm was soon dissipated with a tune that Neil introduced by explaining that whilst we are used in this country to Folk Rock, they would tackle another, maybe less-known genre – 'Folk Pop'! Then the band demonstrated this with what they noted had been a huge Macedonian hit titled Mashala.

Just to hammer home the theme of Flatworld's fusion of World, Roots and Folk, they then produced a "sandwich" of tunes, none of which, by their own admission, sounding like where they originally came from! Thus, this energetic medley was fronted by a French tune (not sounding French) with a middle from Hungary (Sétalós Kopogós, and apparently not sounding very Hungarian) then finishing with an Irish slip-jig (claimed not to sound very Irish but actually turning out to be unmistakably emerald) – in reality though it all moved through with a foot-tapping pace that quickened as the tempo did.

Out of enjoyment rather than just politeness, the audience demanded and received an encore and the band obliged by wrapping things up with their interpretation of Maseltov.

There's no doubt that Flatworld's first visit won them some new fans at Coddington Village Hall and their eclectic brand of Eastern folk sounds was keenly received by a very satisfied audience.



Donald James Walster Born 08.11.1921 Died 09.07.1993

Don was born in Coddington, Newark, his father was George Rowland and his mother was Ruth Annie (nee Hough), Don was the youngest of five children.

Don was educated at Coddington School and the Grammar School in Newark.

He joined up a week before the war when he was seventeen (he lied about his age but was determined to join the forces) and joined the Sherwood Rangers (no.557905). Previously, he had been in the Territorials. He was made up to

Corporal before they left for France this was the first time he had travelled abroad. They travelled to Marseilles by train and took eight hundred horses. Many of the horses suffered during the journey and several of them died. The regiment was shipped across to Palestine although they didn't see any fighting there. He saw Jerusalem and Galilee. By this time, he was the most senior corporal in his unit but he wasn't promoted because of his age.

He heard that they were recruiting for the SAS and volunteered. He joined *Dett* 1st SAS Regiment at Kabrit, Egypt. He had to drop rank to trooper but that didn't bother him and his training began at Bitter Lakes at Kabrit. Part of his training was unarmed combat, desert survival, attaching bombs to underside of ships & tanks etc and parachuting. He parachuted a number of times behind enemy lines.

He served under the command of David Stirling; they lived in the desert for months at a time mostly in the Qatari Depression. Don went many raids the "Malta Convoy Raids", he also went on many raids inside German held Territory. He was on the Benghazi raid and took a bullet. He was taken prisoner at the same time as Col. Stirling during the final push up the desert near Tripoli. They were taken to an Italian compound (Camp number 70 Monturano (Parma), postal mark number 3300) where he and other SAS were beaten and some killed. They were then taken to German headquarters where Rommel was in command. The order from Berlin was that all captured SAS were to be executed Rommel fortunately disobeyed the order. They were moved out of Tripoli and shipped to a prisoner of war camp outside of Capua. He was then taken by truck into Germany to Dachau where he spent ten months of hell. He was then sent to another prisoner of war camp Stalag

344, Lamsdorf, Poland POW 220843. When the Russian advance drew nearer, the men were given two days warning that they were marching west as were thousands of other prisoners. Eventually they arrived at Gorlitz near Hanover and were rescued by the allies, taken to a Belgian airport and flown back home. During his service abroad of six years and 186 days he had served in Palestine (19-1-40 to 1-10-40), Cyprus (2-10-40 to 13-1-41), Egypt (14-1-41 to 26-1-41), Crete (27-1-41 to 31-5-41), Egypt (1-6-41 to 16-12-42) Libya, Italy & Germany (POW)(17-12-42 to 20-4-45) and received two medals (The King George VI 1939 – 1945 Star & The Africa Star).

Don was in poor state of health by this time having been beaten, starved, travelled in cattle trucks with eighty-six men other men, made to dig out mass graves, walk for miles & miles in feet of snow and ice, and starved again. By now he was attached to the Royal Armoured Corps.

The army classified him as 'Ceasing to fulfil Army Physical Requirements' and he was finally invalided out in March 1946 with a disability pension of £2 a week. The pension continued for two years! On his discharge Certificate his military Conduct was stated as Exemplary.

It took him almost a year to get well enough to work again and he decided to start his own painting and decorating business with his father to help him. Donald and his father did all the joinery work on the village hall (Coronation Hall) when it was built in the early fifties. Years later he launched his own taxi service and eventually worked in the car industry at Wadham Stringer until he retired.

He married Kathleen Mavis Burton in July 1947 at St. Mary Magdalene church in Newark. Kathleen died April 1989. There were no children...

His nieces & nephew took his Ashes to be scattered at the SAS Regiment in Hereford on the 29.07.1993

Four of Don's uncles served in WW1:-

Walster, Fred Aged 32, Notts & Derby Regiment

George Henry Walster married Mary Wood Roberts in Coddington Church on 17 Nov 1877. George Henry was a carpenter and Mary had been Sewing Mistress (when her father John Roberts was headmaster). The family lived initially with John Roberts on Chapel Lane, but later moved to Charity Farm.

Frederick, the fourth child, was christened at Coddington Church on 12 Nov 1882. The children attended Coddington School. By 1901 Fred was a baker, living in Newark with his employee. In 1911 he was a grocery salesman aged 28, lodging at Southwell.

Military Service record: Regt no 15418, 616162 Sgt.

Fred served in the Gallipoli campaign. Medals: 1914 - 15 Star, British Victory

The 9th Bn Notts& Derby Regt sailed from Liverpool in early July 1915 for Gallipoli, landing at Suvla Bay 7 Aug 1915. It took part on the assault on Scimitar Hill. They were evacuated in December 1915, and moved to Egypt via Imbros. Later they moved to France in July 1916.

Walster, John Thomas MM Aged 36, Royal Field Artillery

John Thomas, the eldest child of George and Mary Walster he was christened at Coddington Church on the 8 Sep 1878.

In 1901, he was a professional cricketer, aged 22, still living with his parents. Later he was a groom. By 1911 with wife and four children he was living at Barnby in the Willows, Newark. John was now a gardener aged 33.

Military Service record: John enlisted on 19 Jan 1915 Regt No L23207, trained in England until 12 Jan 1916. He disembarked at Havre, Army B213 France, was promoted to Corporal 2 May 1915 and transferred to the Royal Field Artillery. On 29 June 1918 admitted to hospital Boulogne with an RI

Hernia injury. He returned to England 31 Mar 1919.



L/23207 Cpl, but A/Sgt Royal Field Artillery), British, Victor



WALSTER, Arthur W. ("Joe") MM Aged 23,

Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry

Arthur W ("Joe"), the six thchild of George Henry and Mary Walster, was christened at Coddington Church on 22 Mar 1891

Arthur married Nellie and they had two children. The photo shows Billy and "Joe" (Arthur W) Walster.

Military Service record: Sergeant Arthur W Walster served with Major Hugh Tallents in the Gallipoli Campaign, and was mentioned in the regimental memoirs Hugh wrote. They arrived Suvla Bay 18 Aug 1915. 27 Aug, on patrol with Maj Tallents to select the position of a new line, Sgt Walster climbed a willow tree to get a better view of the Turkish positions 300 yds away. Unfortunately he left his rifle in the tree, and trying to recover it 'afforded good sport' to



the enemy riflemen, watched by his compatriots in Poplar House. The Regiment were evacuated on 2 Nov 1915 to Alexandria, and served in Egypt (1915 -16), Macedonia (1916 - 17) and Palestine (1917 - 18). On the way to Palestine the troop ship Cestrian was torpedoed and sank.

Arthur was wounded at Mosque Hill near Suffa on 28 Nov 1917, in an action to retake the crest against machine guns. Heavy losses meant the force had then to be withdrawn into regimental reserves. Arthur was wounded again on 30 Apr 1918 in an action at Shunet Nimrim on the east side of the Jordan Valley.

Sgt. 275025 William A Walster was awarded the MM: London Gazette 10.4.1918. Page 4392.

WALSTER, William (Billy) Aged Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry

William, the ninth child of George and Mary Walster, was christened at Coddington Church on 31 Jul 1892.

By 1911 Billy was a groom aged 19, living at The Stables, Stanford Hall, Loughborough. He married Daisy Crampton and they had two children.

Military Service record:

Regt No. 1744 Pte; Corps of Hussars Regt no 275182 Pte, Egypt. Medals: 1914 -15 Star, British, Victor.



His relation who also served in WW2 Dernie, James H2nd Lieutenant Sherwood Foresters.

In the 1930s Jim joined the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry as a trooper. He went with the regiment (including their horses) to Palestine in 1940 as part of the 2nd Cavalry Division (read Lady Ranfurly's book War "To Whitaker"). He was in Palestine for his 21st birthday and was selected for Officer training, I think this was in Egypt. He was then assigned to the Sherwood Foresters and ended up in Tobruk where he was taken prisoner at the end of the siege. Thereafter he was taken to Italy and then Germany. I believe he was on the same transport



as the late Col. Derry. Whilst in prisoner of war camp he took his Land Agency exams courtesy of the Red Cross. He also learnt to play bridge! He was repatriated at the end of the War. There is a photograph taken in Newark Town Hall by the Newark Advertiser, at the end of the war, of the men of the Newark area who had been in prison camp and returned home. Uncle Jim is on that. He died quite young in 1973 but his Widow, Monica (Pacey) is still with us aged 88 and I speak to her every Sunday.

Military Service record:-

Reg No 235300. In 1943 he was a Prisoner of War in Italy:- P.O.W. Camp Number 21, Cheiti Old Convent, Postal Mark Number 3300
