The Tritax Big Box Unit 1 on the A17 has now been completed and is ready to rent. The community fund has been fully allocated directly to the village this time. We are pleased to announce they are providing £40,000 worth of funds to the village, this will be spent on the Community Centre, Scout Group and to supply two defibrillators to the village.

The allocation of the money will be used as follows

More funds could become available depending on the success of the next planning application, we will update on any developments.



Village Hall News



Hopefully by the time you read this there will be a smart new path to the main door at the hall. The old 1950's concrete was well past its sell-by date but more importantly it had been laid at too high a level which had a negative impact on our historic corrugated iron. This was an enabling project since our next ambition is to have the outside of the hall refurbished, including much-needed insulation. The hall will maintain its now rare green corrugated iron exterior (as it must anyway as it is in the Conservation Area) but it will be NEW! Yes, it is still available. We will also renew windows with double glazed wooden ones but also hope to improve the look/location of them – subject to the vagaries of the planning system.

If anyone can help us with the necessary drawings for planning permission that would be most helpful – please!

Minor repairs continue to be undertaken by our volunteer Maintenance Team helping to keep the costs down. We have renewed the popular but faulty "fairy" lights, kept the garden tidy and done various small DIY tasks to make the place smarter and more functional.

We generally do one morning per month, it's a sociable occasion naturally with the inevitable tea/coffee/biscuit break! More hands make light work so please get in touch if you might like to join us, no particular skills needed but woodworking or electrical experience/knowledge would be particularly helpful.

There's a few changes on our timetable with new classes so do check out the list in the centre pages. They will be pleased to see you and your support at the hall is always appreciated.

Citizens Advice gives advice on water bills.

Many of us have seen an increase since April in the amount we pay for our water supply. Below we talk through the difference between using a fixed rate for your water or having your water on a meter and other ways you may be able to save money on your water bill.

You either pay your water bill based on a fixed rate or on the actual amount of water you use, measured with a water meter. When is it a good idea to consider changing to a water meter?

Changing to a water meter may benefit you if you don't use much water.

It may also be worth changing to a meter if your property has a high rateable value. This is because some water bills are based on the rateable value of the property. Before April 1990, every property in England and Wales was given a rateable value, based on how much the property could be let for. A good rule of thumb is that you could pay less if there are fewer people in your property than there are bedrooms.

If you change to a water meter, the company will come to read your meter. You won't know exactly what you're going to be charged in every bill because the amount of water you use could increase if extra people come to live with you or if you buy any new water-using appliances.

You will be responsible for paying for any water that leaks. However, a water company won't normally charge for the first leak in an underground supply pipe.

Many water companies have water usage calculators on their website, to help you work out how much you are likely to pay if you have a meter. If you do not have access to the interest you can give us a call on the number below to arrange our help with this.

If you find you are not better off after changing to a meter, you can usually change back to how the bill was paid before within twelve months. You can't do this if you have moved into a property where a meter is already installed, or if universal metering has been introduced for everyone in your area.

If you don't own your home and are a tenant in a property you can still ask for a water meter. If you have a fixed-term tenancy agreement of less than six months, you must ask the landlord's permission. If your fixed-term tenancy agreement is longer than six months, you don't need your landlord's permission to have a meter but your tenancy agreement may require you to ask their permission for alterations to the property.

You may need advice if your landlord doesn't agree to you having a meter, as any disagreements could cause problems when renewing the tenancy. You can reach out to us for help with this.

Help Paying your water bills

Many water companies offer social tariffs for customers on a low income, claim benefits or if you have to use a lot of water due to medical reasons. To find out more on if your water company offers any discounts or low rates for water you can contact them and ask or alternatively get in touch with Citizens Advice on the details below. We will be happy to help enquire about your water bills or any other issues you may have with your water supply.



The Pubs of Coddington: A Historical Journey

Although Coddington has two vibrant pubs today; the **Plough Inn** and **The Inn on the Green**, there have been several others over the years....

Beer production, and its subsequent availability for sale, can likely be traced back in Coddington to the origins of the village itself. There's an early reference to ale selling in the village court records from 1654 where Goodwin FOREMAN and William CROSLY were named as 'common brewers' at Coddington when they were each fined 4d (less than 2p) for "not selling their ayle according to ye statute"!

In those earlier times, drinking establishments could often be humble affairs, sometimes no more than a farmhouse with a room set aside for passing travellers and thirsty local agricultural labourers. Others, like the Plough, were more substantial, often operating as coaching inns or postal stops.

Coddington's **Plough Inn** holds its place as the most enduring hostelry in the village with historic references dating back to at least the early 1800s. There is also a detailed description of its building and facilities when it was advertised for sale in 1928.

As the 19th century progressed, the wider authorities tried to reshape drinking in society and the **Beerhouse Act of 1830** was enacted, partly seeking to curb the population's reliance on strong spirits like gin. The Act allowed any householder to obtain a licence to sell beer and cider, making it both affordable and widely available. This inevitably led to a proliferation of beerhouses. Unlike established pubs - which typically served a broader range of beverages and provided food and entertainment - beerhouses were usually modest affairs. In Coddington, beer production was mostly connected to local farmers and their malting activity, much of which featured as part of the development of the huge maltings industry in and around Newark.

Eventually, the sheer number of pubs and beerhouses became a political issue which alarmed many social reformers with concerns about drunkenness, crime, and public disorder. This led to waves of regulation as local magistrates held the power to grant or withhold licenses. The Licensing Act of 1872 imposed stricter closing hours, penalties for serving intoxicated individuals, and requirements for better recordkeeping. Beerhouses, in particular, came under close scrutiny and many were gradually absorbed into the more tightly regulated pub trade or shut down altogether.

But the apparent over-availability of drink became a feature that worried licensing committees. Two Coddington pubs were caught up in this policy just before the Great War. After a particularly rocky period in its management, the **Plough** faced having its licence withdrawn. At the same time, Ben GREEN, the landlord of the **Globe Tavern**, also in Coddington, offered to take over the **Plough** and improve its running. After careful and public consideration, the magistrates allowed his application but on the understanding that he could do so only after closing the **Globe**.

This was significant because the Globe Inn, or Old Globe, (and later the Globe Tavern) had stood on Main Street opposite Hall Farm for at least 75 years. When it ceased trading in 1913, the local Licensing Committee had acted under the Licensing (Consolidation Act) 1910 as they had done with others to reduce the number of pubs and beerhouses across Newark. As licensee at the Globe, Ben GREEN, was paid £50 and the owner, Capt. John Somerled THORPE received £358 15s in compensation. Afterwards, the buildings on the site were converted to cottages but were later demolished. As for Ben GREEN, he did become landlord of the Plough and rescued it from the troublesome threat that so worried the authorities.

But other Coddington watering holes have existed over the years and although it is hard to determine exact dates for opening and closing, there is evidence of the part they played in the village history.



Coddington Community Centre

Hello Everyone,

The Community Centre is coming up to 20 years old, bookings are looking good with a few daytime spaces available and weekend party bookings coming in on a regular basis.

As mentioned earlier in this edition Tritax have agreed to support some of our projects.

Firstly, you may not realise but we are not on mains drainage, we have a waste water treatment system which is getting old. When it was installed it was up to date with technology but now there are better options and ways of doing things. We will be replacing the processing equipment.

When the building was originally completed there was no path from the rear of the main hall to the safe area, this will be put in place.

The bridge access to the school was not in place, this was put in after completion of the Community Centre using funds donated to the school. As such the access area where people stand was not fully prepared for the foot traffic that it now receives. This will be sorted out to make accessing the school entrance cleaner and easier. We will also be linking this foot area with the path at the front of the building improving disabled access to the school.

As we do not need an external hot water tank of the size that we have this will be replaced with 2 more locally sited water heaters which will reduce our operating costs.

We have more projects that we would like to get done, let's finish the ones we have first.

As usual we are looking for help in the decision making area of our Community Centre. The Trustees meet every 2 months for about an hour and a half to discuss what is going on behind the scenes with respect to the management of the facility. Occasionally there may be something to do in addition to this but not very often. Being a trustee and volunteering can be a useful item on your CV, additionally we can give you an understanding about what it takes to run a building of this nature.

If you think this is something you would like to be a part of we would like to hear from you. Our next meeting is on 3rd Sept 2025.
