

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1).

Village Hall News

We hope you have admired our smart new path to the main door at the hall. This was an enabling job for our next ambition which is to have the outside of the hall refurbished, including much-needed insulation. The hall will retain its now rare green corrugated iron exterior (as it must anyway as it is in the Conservation Area) but it will be NEW! Yes, it is still available. We will also renew windows with double glazed wooden ones but also hope to improve the look/location of them – subject to the vagaries of the planning system. We have had a pre-planning meeting with the Conservation and Planning Officers and are currently awaiting their written response.

We will need drawings etc for planning permission so if anyone could help us with that it would be most useful – please! We will also need to get grants as our Improvement Fund is now exhausted. It didn't help the finances by discovering that the shed roof was leaking, partly because the rear fence leaning on it had distorted the gutter, so it couldn't be repaired until the fence was replaced; fortunately the paving contractors also did fencing so also made a good job of that. Because of the urgency we were unable to apply for grants in advance but fortunately the Parish Council agreed to part fund the repair.

We have also paid for repairs to the main hall front doors, the skirtings in the small room and adjustments to the hall door.

The **Volunteer Maintenance Team** then fixed the leaky roof with roofing felt and gutter, both donated.

The change of paving level meant the adjacent garden needed reorganising so we have now embarked on an Autumn planting "sortout" – to be continued. Also various painting and small repair jobs have been done in the hall and the existing slabs have been jetwashed – they are the same as the new ones but didn't look it! With Autumn come the leaves so gutter cleaning is always on the list!



We generally do one morning per month, it's a sociable occasion naturally with the inevitable tea/coffee/biscuit break! More hands make light work so please get in touch if you might like to join us, no particular skills needed but woodworking or electrical experience/knowledge would be particularly helpful.

Bookings are quite strong and there's a few changes on our timetable – we've managed to source a Tai Chi class which is proving very popular so do check out the list in the centre pages. They will be pleased to see you and your support at the hall is always appreciated.

Review: Churchfitters at the Village Hall - Thursday 18th September



Brittany based trio, Churchfitters are proud of their album *Old Friends*; released to celebrate over 40 years of being a self-proclaimed "folk band like no other".

But old friends is also an apt portrayal of their many visits to Coddington and they made their seventh appearance at the village hall on an unseasonally warm evening.

Such is the long association with the village; siblings Rosie and Chris Short, along with the French wing of the band, Boris Lebret, chose Coddington to be the first date in their latest tour 'over here'. On the night they were welcomed by a keen audience, quite eager to be entertained by the band's eccentric folk once again.

With a stage packed with instruments (but missing Chris' fabled glass harp) they opened with *Open the Door*. As expected, they brought to life a very quirky collection of madly transformed items that Boris had somehow adapted to be good to strum!

Rosie was soon at her percussive best with a rapid penny whistle alongside her well-travelled bodhrán-inspired tea tray. This made their song *Eyam*, written by Rosie about the Derbyshire ring-a-ring plague village, rise above the tragic episode. It benefited very nicely from a converted frying pan - played by Chris and made by Boris - alongside a cinefilm-cannister and spanner mash-up bass from Boris (also made by Boris!). Quirky, yes! But comical, certainly not! The resulting sound was vibrant and even rock-like, possibly a bit more so than all the times we've seen the band before.

And then, just to slow the pace a little, Rosie acknowledged the influence that Fairport Convention, and particularly the late, great Dave Swarbrick, had on her early folk career by producing a delightful version of *To Althea from Prison*.

After the interval the tempo upped to foot-stamping with *Kerry* performed as a duel between Rosie (whistle) and Chris (violin), while Boris worked fluently to beat out the rhythm with powerful force. The effect was another example of a more rock-like sound from the band. With Rosie introducing their staple, *Farm (We Know Better)*, she was careful to give creative credit to writer, Anthony McCartan. Every time they perform this song it reveals the full range of versatile vocals from Rosie once more.

Then came the moody *Strangest Stones* where Chris literally fashioned ethereal sounds from a musical saw while Rosie & Boris played skilful banjo and acoustic solos to tie everything together.

Boris returned to his uniquely built bass guitar for *Spring-heeled Jack*, his dashing rhythm telling Jack's tale at speed. Almost acting as a one-man rhythm section, his nimble playing was interlaced with backing of folksy jigs & reels from Rosie and Chris.

For the last song we had Rosie's tin tray drumming again, this time combined with a clever and quite dramatic thunder machine along with stage-thumping from Boris and deft finger work from Chris, all supplemented by their demonstration of coordinated stage craft; all synchronised in-time steps reminiscent of the Shadows in their foottapping heyday.

Following well-deserved and encore-requiring applause, Chris spoke up to note that the Churchfitters have been coming to Coddington for years and in that time have seen consistent improvement to the village hall. It was a satisfying tribute to the continuing efforts of the village team involved in developing the venue.

To finish - and following a quick chorus-lesson for the audience - the final sweet and moving encore of *Sing for our time on Earth* featuring 'old friends' prominently in its lyrics, left everyone going home with a warm glow.

Here we are then, Churchfitters have delighted Coddington once again. Rosie sustains with her expressive voice, Chris is flawless, not only with his fiddle but with everything he plays and what can we say about Boris? Unrivalled probably?

The conclusion from another great evening from this band is that Coddington Village Hall continues to host quality live music and drama at ticket prices that make it hard to pass up.

Nicholas Collett presents "Mettle"

Set in November 1942, the HMS Vanessa is detached from Convoy HX213 to join Convoy SC107, which faces devastating attacks from a wolfpack of U-boats over four days, resulting in the heaviest loss of ships from any trans-Atlantic convoy that winter. Gordon Collett, a 19-year-old from Sheffield, volunteers for the Royal Navy in 1940 to combat fascism and serves on the HMS Vanessa during these perilous times.

"I know this because I am his son, and I'm going to tell you his story," says Nicholas Collett. This moving and often humorous odyssey takes audiences from Liverpool to the USA, via Freetown, highlighting the courage of those who braved the sea's perils.

The story spans from 1930s Sheffield through the outbreak of war, U-Boat attacks, and treacherous weather, to the relative calm of West Africa and even a Glenn Miller concert.

The Pubs of Coddington: A Historical Journey (continued)

Fortunately we still have two thriving pubs but have lost some:

The Catch'em Inn – once stood at a bend of the Newark Road, close to where a tollbar once stood. It was also known as the **Blue Bell** and was part of a smallholding. In September 1786 the **Stamford Mercury** refers to a Mr Richard POYNTELL being "master of the Bell public house, generally known by the name Catch-'em-inn".


Other documents held by Notts Archives, quote Thomas GOSS as keeper of The Blue Bell in the mid 1820s and a notable and delightful article from the Nottingham Review proclaims in 1833 that: "Mr. James MARSHALL, the jovial landlord of the Bell, commonly called Catch'em Inn, in the parish of Coddington, near Newark, in taking a hive of bees, in full profit, found to his inexpressible surprise, the astonishing weight of 40lbs weight of honey and comb, the produce of the industry of this little tribe. What a lesson is to be learned from this, being diligent in business."

By the time of the 1918 Thorpe Estate Sale, the inn had ceased to be a pub, but the area was still known as "Catch-em-Inn corner". It had become a smallholding and the buildings there were eventually demolished to make way when the A1 was built.

The Rose and Crown was once sited "north on Turnpike Road ... in Linger Leas". There are records of Thomas WAITE holding the property in the 1780's as "victualler" or "servingman" and, following his death at the end of 1788, it's possible that his widow, Anne (née DAWS) kept the pub before marrying John BIRKETT in 1794 at which time he became landlord. Shortly after, William CARBY (the younger) would take possession and close the public house before subsequently building a cottage and a blacksmith's shop on the site.

Intriguingly, in Oct 1815 the Stamford Mercury announced "To be Sold by Private Contract, All that old-established & well-accustomed Freehold Public-House, the Carpenter's Arms, in Coddington". The advert described the property as consisting of a "Stable, Outbuildings and Appurtenances" and being in the occupation of likely tenant-publican, Benjamin JOHNSON "who is under notice to quit at Old Lady-day next". Frustratingly, we have found no other references to this pub name in Coddington records although the year before, Benjamin himself is noted in the Coddington Parish Baptism Register as living in Coddington and is described as a publican.

The Red Lion Inn was a more long-lasting Coddington drinking place, once well-established on Main Street, almost opposite the lower entrance to Church Lane and it was kept into the 1960s with beer supplied by Warwicks Newark Ales. However, it and the nearby cottages were demolished in the so-called "improvements" to the village in the 1960/70s.

The Victorian era saw a transformation in village life as industrialisation and the arrival of the railway in Newark gave rise to greater mobility, and Coddington's pubs adapted to changing times.

During this time, beer houses became subject to increasing licencing regulation from local magistrates. In an attempt to restore some order, landlords could be prosecuted for watering down drinks, being open outside licencing hours and the drunken behaviour of customers and there are numerous examples where Coddington licensees were caught out.

Right up until the 1960s, the Plough and The Red Lion existed as pubs at the heart of Coddington, both being hubs for local gossip, celebrations, and the occasional village dispute.

But as pubs, they had developed almost as community centres. They hosted meetings for parish matters, accommodated various clubs and societies, organized local sports and games, and, during harvest time, became the venue for much-anticipated feasts. They even served more formal purposes, often becoming the venue for inquests and sometimes public meetings such as political electioneering. They retained their central place in village life by hosting darts leagues, music and quiz nights, and supported village fêtes and flower festivals. At this time the Plough Ladies' darts team were frequently local league champions.

But once the Red Lion closed in the 1960s, the previously private Dice House Country Club changed hands and the licence was changed from club to public house and the business was turned into a steakhouse, for a short time called the Stableford (or Stapleford) Inn before becoming the Inn on the Green. Over several years it traded as part of the wider restaurant chains of Rob Roy and Hungry Horse before returning to independent management.

There are many advertising examples of The Plough conducting a wide variety of themed events in the last years of the 20th century.

Since the turn of the century the Plough and the Inn on the Green have continued to support the village - apart from a short period where the Plough closed before transformation into the business that exists today.

Appointment GP form online - More ways to get in touch with your GP practice

You can now use an online form on your GP practice website to request an appointment between 8am and 6.30pm, Monday to Friday. This is one of three ways to get in touch, alongside phoning or visiting your practice.

The online form will include a few questions so your practice staff can ensure you get the help that's right for you.

They will help you with the next step of your care, tailored to your needs: it could be a face-to-face appointment, a phone or video consultation, or a simple text or email message. These can be more flexible and often mean we can help you sooner.

When you get in touch, practice staff will ask you what you need help with. They will use the information you give to choose the most suitable doctor, nurse or other health professional to help you.

FURTHER INFORMATION

Beaumond House is a registered charity that has been committed to providing supportive palliative care to patients and their families living in Newark and district since 1987. We have four in-patient beds for people with palliative care needs, Day Therapy and Wellbeing service, as well as Hospice at Home providing compassionate support in the community.

Providing care and support to patients and their families costs Beaumond House around £2.8million every year. This means that around £2.2million of this needs to be raised through donations, our shops, and local businesses throughout Newark and Sherwood.

This year, Beaumond House will receive £555,000 towards the cost of delivering our in-patient, day therapy and wellbeing service and hospice at home commissioned through the End of Life Together Alliance (funded from the Integrated Care System), which contributes to our overall operating costs.

Each year we provide care for over 550 patients and support to their families, caring for around 100 patients at any one time. All of our direct care services are provided free.

We are registered with the Care Quality Commission. We offer care and support for people with any diagnosis who have a palliative care need whether this is a cancer, long term condition, neurological disease, frailty or are naturally coming to the end of their life through old age.

Christmas Message from Councillor Johno Lee

As we approach the festive season, I'd like to wish everyone in Coddington a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. For many, this is a time of celebration, family, and reflection — and it's also a chance to look back on what we've achieved together as a community.

It's now just over 14 years since I was first elected to represent Coddington. When I started, many people didn't know who their local councillor was or what they did. Over the years, I've worked hard to change that — being visible, approachable, and active all year round, not just at election time. My goal has always been simple: to make sure Coddington's voice is heard and that we see real improvements on the ground.

We've achieved a lot together in that time. From protecting our green open spaces against illegal access, to investing hundreds of thousands of pounds into play equipment across our parks, I've focused on projects that make a lasting difference to families and to our village. I've also made sure that you're kept informed about what's happening locally — because open communication and trust are vital in public service.

I'd like to take a moment to thank Councillor Emma Oldham, who recently stepped down due to personal reasons. Over the years, I've had the pleasure of serving alongside David Payne, Betty Brooks, and Emma Oldham — each of whom made their own contribution to Coddington. Through all those changes, I've been proud to provide consistency and to continue representing our community's interests year after year.

Working closely with the Parish Council, we've fought unnecessary developments, supported the extension of our primary school, and maintained high standards in keeping our roads and pavements clean. We've won some battles and lost others, but we've always stood firm in protecting what matters to local people.

Looking ahead, there's still work to do. Speeding through the village remains a serious concern — especially with Coddington now the only route out of Newark still above 30mph. I'll keep pressing for change on that. We must also stay alert to the upcoming changes in local government through the proposed unitary authority, and to the ongoing discussions around gravel extraction, which could again bring challenges for our area.

As I write this, we're in the middle of a by-election, and by the time you read this, a new councillor will have joined me in representing Coddington. Whoever is elected, I look forward to working constructively with them to keep delivering for our community.

Over the next two years, I'll continue doing what I've always done — working hard for you, being accessible, and making sure that Coddington continues to have a strong and consistent voice.

Hello Everyone,

The planned projects are now complete. Thank you for your understanding during this time, we worked hard to minimise the disruption.

We have upgraded the pump and control systems in our waste water handling system, you can see the new control box at the end of the car park and hear it humming to its self.

We have had the new block paving put down to improve the area for access to the school. We have also had the footpath installed to the rear of the building.

The last project involved decommissioning the large hot water tank and placing 2 separate water heaters in the roof space which are smaller in size and will not need to recirculate the hot water around the building.

Regular bookings are increasing and weekend adhoc bookings are doing well.

As usual the car park is not being respected by parents during the afternoon pick up. I have personally witnessed a car parked in a manner which blocked the exit for another parent who had to wait 10 minutes for them to return to their car before they could leave. I ask you to think, what if that were me and I needed to get somewhere. I would not be happy.

I am working with the Parish Council trying to find a solution to this situation which does not involve restricting the access to the car park.

As always we are looking for help in the decision making area of our Community Centre. The Trustees meet every 2 months for about an hour and a half to discuss what is going on behind the scenes with respect to the management of the facility. Occasionally there may be something to do in addition to this but not very often. Being a trustee and volunteering can be a useful item on your CV, additionally we can give you an understanding about what it takes to run a building of this nature.

If you think this is something you would like to be a part of we would like to hear from you. Our next meeting is on 7th Jan 2026.
